Catholics Will Install Bishop Of New Diocese

Of interest to all Catholics of this area is the consecration and installation of Msgr. Thomas J. Drury, 53, as the first bishop of the new Diocese of San Angelo, which has been scheduled for Wednesday, Jan. 24. The ceremonies will take place at 10 A. M. that day in the Sacred Heart Catholic Church in San Angelo.

He will be consecrated by Arch-bishop Robert E. Lucey of San Antonio, metropolitan of the Province of San Antonio, of which the new diocese is a member. Arch-bishop Lucey will also install the new bishop in his see. The installation will follow the consecration in Sacred Heart.

The new bishop's first duties will be creation of a diocesan staff, setting up a chancery office and establishing a diocesan newspaper in San Angelo.

Jones and Haskell Counties are two of the 34 counties comprising the new Diocese of San Angelo.

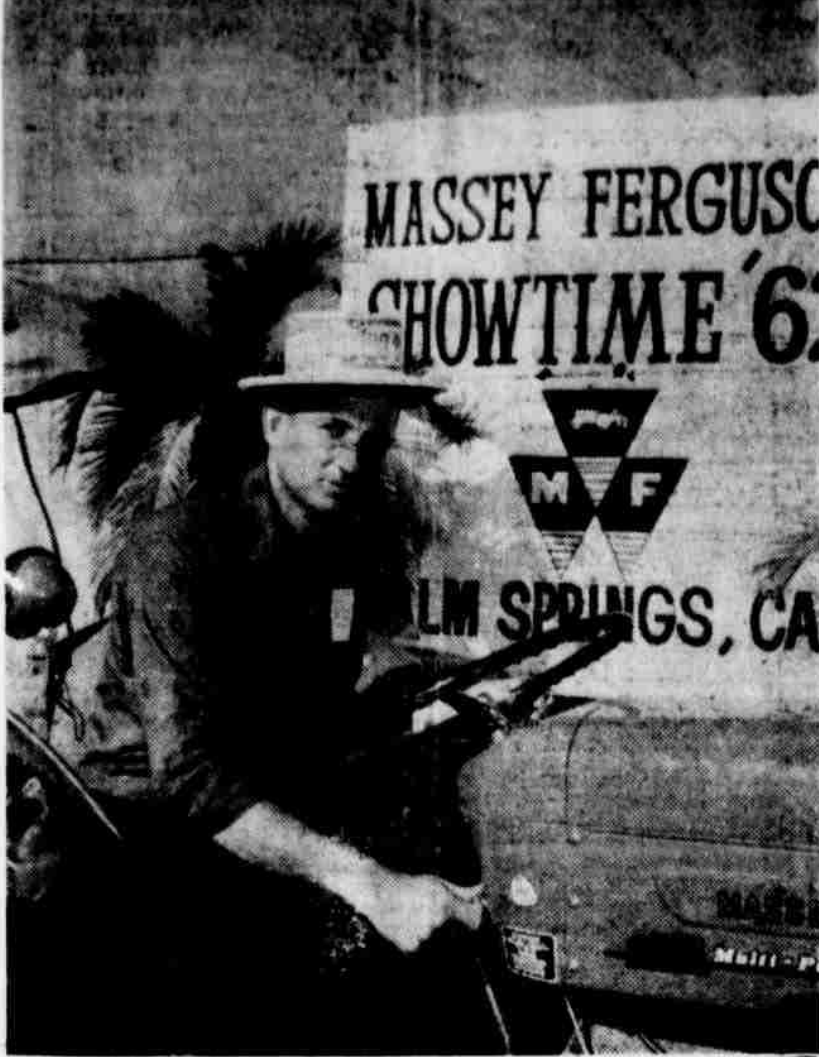
