

Fly Kites Safely!

Warm spring weather will be the rule soon, and with it comes kite-flying season. So some "flight instructions" issued by electric companies to "kid kite pilots" who will soon be racing across fields towing their "paper aircraft" into the "wild blue yonder" are very much in point now.

Here they are:

- 1. Don't fly a kite with metal in the frame or tail.
- Don't use tinsel-string wire, or any twine with metal in it Don't fly a kite in the rain,
- 4. Don't pull on the string or climb a power pole to looser
 - 5. Don't fly a kite over TV or radio aerials.
 - 6. Don't fly a kite near electric or power lines. 7. Don't run across streets or highways while flying kites. 8. Don't touch fallen electric wires.

Paste A Dollar Bill on the Wall

Then as taxes and government debt, local and federal, go higher and higher, mark off more of it with red lines as the dollar value decreases. Also depreciate the purchasing power of your insurance, your savings account, your pension or any other fixed dollar asset as you add red lines to the dollar bill on your wall.

The future value of the dollar rests with the people through the interest they take in politics, labor, industry and economic

Special Handling Fee Speeds Up Parcel Post

"Contrary to popular belief, payment of a "Special Handling' fee does not mean that parcels will be processed more carefully than other mail, nor does it provide for 'Special De-livery' at the office of ad-dress," says Postmaster Harold Spain.

According to Postmaster Spain, payment of a "Special Handling" fee provides only that fourth-class mail (parcel post) will receive the same fast transportation as first-class mail when traveling beclass mail when traveling between post offices. So those who are anxious for their parcel post to go quickly to its destination may pay a "Special Handling" fee and receive first class transportation at less cost than would be involved by mailing a parcel at the first-class rate of postage.

Both "Special Handling" and "Special Delivery" mail receive the most expeditious surface transportation possible between post offices. "Special Delivery" mail is delivered immediately upon arrival at the office to which it is addressed. "Special Handling" parcels are not delivered until the next scheduled trip of the regular carrier.
