## Haskell Group Attends WTCC Session

A group of Haskell businessmen were among the more than 125 members of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce who heard the federal domestic aid programs lambasted, both from the floor and from the speakers' platform, at a WTCC meeting in Abilene at the Wooten Hotel last Thursday. Attending the session from Haskell were Dr. T. W. Williams, Haskell WTCC director; R. C. Couch Sr., Jetty V. Clark and Alvin Ballard. The gathering heard S. Howard Evans describe a U. S. Chamber of Commerce plan to substitute local self-help for federal aid. Federal program were labeled as "a paved road to socialism" and Evans declared that government agencies are "approaching immorality." Purpose of the day-long meeting, according to Fred Hubshaus, executive director of the West Texas Chamber, was to review the federal aid programs and analyze private enterprise's solutions to the problems. Evans, Community Development specialist with the U. S. Chamber, said federal government agencies are approaching immorality when they tell local leaders that all they have to do to get federal money is to sign a statement saying they need the money. In many cases, Evans said, this is perjury. But since the government agency has implied that the need will not be investigated, the leaders sign the papers.

## More Candidates Enter Political Arena

Local politics continued in the spotlight this week as four additional candidates announced as candidates in the 1962 Democratic primaries. Also, considerable interest is developing locally in the special Congressional election due Dec. 16, in which five candidates are seeking the post vacated by Congressman Frank Ikard. Local supporters of at least three of the candidates are actively working in their behalf and have advertisements in this issue of The Free Press. On the local political scene, three of the candidates announcing this week seek reelection: District Clerk Carrie McAnulty, for a second term. Commissioner Leon Newton for re-election in Precinct 2. Justice of Peace Virgil A. Brown of Prec. 1, for a full elective term in that office. Also, Slover Bledsoe, well-known Haskell resident, enters the race for Commissioner in Prec. 2, this week, third candidate for the post.

## Farmers To Vote Dec. 12 On 1962 Cotton Quotas

Tuesday, Dec. 12, is the date set for the referendum on marketing quotas for the 1962 cotton crop, the State ASC Committee reminded cotton growers this week. At least two-thirds of the upland cotton farmers voting must approve the quotas if they are to be effective. Polling places will be located at O'Brien, Rochester, Rule, Sagerton, Paint Creek School, Irby, Weimer and Haskell. Polls will open at 8 a. m. and close at 6 p. m. The State ASC Committee points out that the national cotton acreage available for distribution to growers for the 1962

upland cotton crop totals 18,101,718 acres, including an allocation of 700,000 acres from the national acreage reserve to take care of minimum farm allotments. The national acreage allotment is apportioned to States, the State allotments to counties, and the county allotments to farms according to provisions of law. Individual farm allotments in Haskell County were mailed Dec. 1. If marketing quotas are approved in the referendum, price support will be available to growers who comply with their 1962 upland cotton farm allotments at a level within the range provided by law—between 65 and 90 per cent of parity. If quotas are not approved for the 1962 upland cotton crop, the allotment program will remain in effect, and price support will be available to cooperators at 50 per cent of parity, as provided by law. Under a quota program, growers who exceed their 1962 farm acreage allotments would be subject to penalties of 50 per cent of the cotton parity price as of June 15, 1962, on the farm's excess production of the crop. In addition, none of the upland cotton produced on the farm would be eligible for price support.

Knox for eight weeks. Upon the completion of the course he will be assigned to the 82nd Airborne Division at Fort Bragg, N. Carolina. Lt. Overton was commissioned as a 2nd Lt. in the army in exercises following graduation at Texas A&M last May. He received his degree in Agronomy. He is a graduate of Paint Creek High School and is the son of Mr. and Mrs. M. E. Overton.

Mr. Raney was a member of the First Christian Church and was a veteran of World War I. He is survived by one brother, Vernon Raney of Lockhart, and two sisters, Mrs. Hal Feeland and Miss Evelyn Raney, both of Houston.

Coast of California (FHTNC) - Zeldon B. Thomason, chief aviation electronics technician, USN, son of Mrs. Edna Tanner of 106 N. 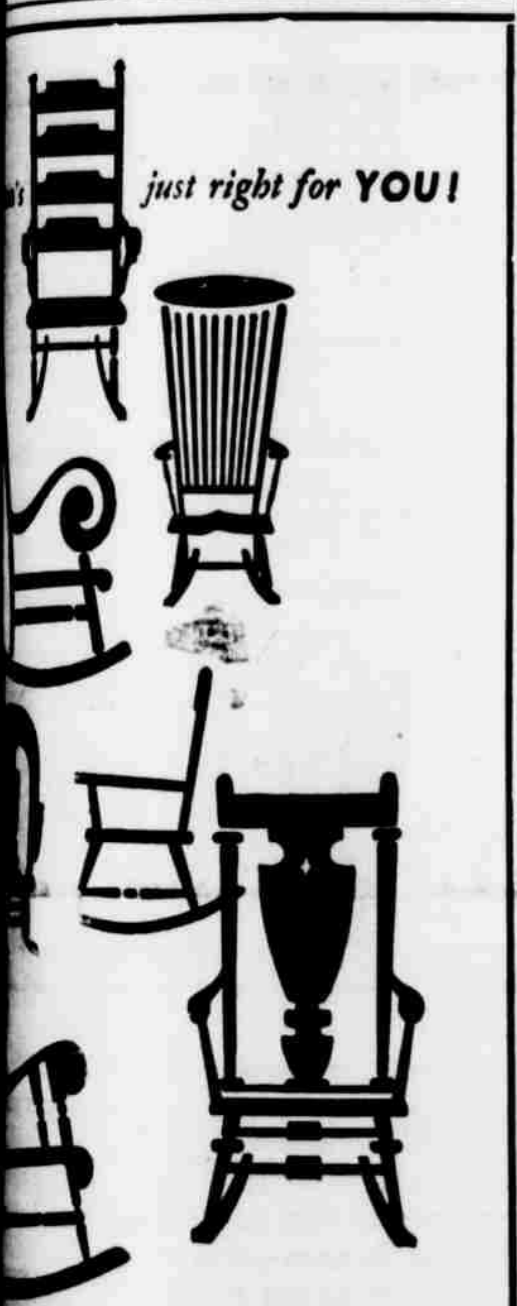

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## A Visit to William R. Hearst's 'Castle' at San Simeon, California

(This is the second and concluding article telling of a visit to the famed San Simeon, Calif., ranch of the late Wm. R. Hearst.)

We started out on the search. We found for one thing that they had about six courts now where they had one about five years before. The first one we came to was a whiz-bang. It was a million-dollar affair, two stories high, but about half finished. We approached the kindly gentleman at the office and asked for a night's accommodation. He said that he had none. All were rented. I asked him if he were not joking. He said he sometimes was, but not then. So with a good laugh we pleasantly went on our way. The next place we stopped was also about half finished and half rented out. No vacancies. The fellow was very kindly and sympathetic so he offers to get on the phone and find if there were any chances down below. I know he did a good job because he was a long time at it. When he came back he told us that he found only one and that was in a certain place down the way. However, it was or had only one room and was \$18.00 for the night. We arrived at the place with some dread and apprehension fearing that it might too, slip away from us. I told the spouse that that was a lot of money for a few hours sleep and that I had been up a lot of nights for less money than that. She said, but you remember that we had a free bed last night with the kinfolks so this will be a good place to put your savings. This place seemed to be finished, and it was new and nice. And so we did. I felt that we would get cheated sure enough if we took off and tried to go to sleep about 8 o'clock. So I went to the office to find some bird that knew something and was willing to tell it. The owner, I suppose, was on hand, and he was pretty well loaded. I was especially interested in the subject of the next day's visit. He told us that after the death of Mr. Hearst in 1951, his 30-year companion told the family that the Castle, so-called by the public, was hers. And after a battle in the courts, the courts decided in her favor. And so it was. But since Marion Davies was a many times millionaire, a liberal giver, and always on the firing line, she joined the family in handing it over to the State of California. But in this transaction the Hearst family reserved one of the three guest mansions for their own and continuous use. And at the present time Mrs. Wm. Randolph Hearst was in the mansion on the magic hill top.

Next day, I was not told whether this Mrs. Hearst was Senior or Junior and I decided to find out if the guide would confirm what this local resident had told me. So at a rest point that we had, I asked Tom (our guide's name was Tom Hudson) if the Hearst family had reserved one of the mansions and was Mrs. Hearst on the grounds. He said yes, that when the deed was drawn to the State of California, covering the 123 acres of land and the castle grounds, this one mansion was reserved for family use and that Mrs. Wm. R. Hearst Jr. was now in that place, and he pointed it out to us. But needless to say, she never showed up. This tourist court informer said that the work of the building of all of the grand get-together took about 25 years, from about 1920 to 1945, and that it covered all of the depression years. He said that most all the people, up and down the coast, for miles had worked for the Hearst family and no doubt because of their liberality they seemed to like the Boss very much. We also learned that this was a good place for high priced realty, if that is what you want. He told me one block, about

200x400 ft., could not be bought for less than \$35,000. I never bought any realty. We had our night's rest was very short. We got up the next morning, as we thought, at five o'clock, but it was only four. I had forgotten that I still had Texas time. We proceeded pretty soon to the Gate entrance. Enroute and at the parking lot we saw numbers of persons crawling out of their cars. The story was fully told when we saw their wrinkled britches, mashed hats and crumpled shirts. A night of rolling around with but little sleep. We may have looked a little better than they did, but I am sure we felt about the same.

We, as quickly as we could, proceeded to the ticket windows where we found about 80 people ahead of us at about 6 a. m., in two lines, one line for each of two windows. To our puzzled mind, we found nearly all the people in one line and just a few in the other one. I went at once to the short line and asked if all the windows operated at the same time and was told they did so. When we got settled in the short line only about four were ahead of us and that assured us passage on the first bus. We were told that the rush last year was bigger on the same holiday weekend. So we take it that as the curious get fed up the crowds will gradually dwindle.

We got started on the trip pretty soon after 8 o'clock, with other buses following every 12 minutes. Each bus carried about 53 persons. On our way up and down we took in the wayside as best we could. At one time the estate had a wide and varied collection of animals, birds, etc., and at the present time only a few of them remain as they had dispersed to various zoos about the state. We found one bunch of beautiful zebras and the driver told us that he had driven that route for years and it was only recently that he found that they had two ends, as they always had the rear end turned to you. But they were sick and fat. One disappointment was the bleak, barren, dead hills. They claimed that they had been enduring a three year drought. The condition of the cattle and desert appearance of the pasture lands were proving the story. The pens, coops, etc., of the once animal collection still remain. About the last mile of our journey was under a grape arbor. It made you want to get out and go to picking grapes, even though we did not see any. On the way back, however, we took a lower road and we got a better view of the first drive way.

We arrived in due time, disembarked, and were introduced to Tom Hudson, the front guide, and a Miss— who was to bring up the rear and to see that none escaped or she might have been busy administering to the tired limbs and aching feet. This is guess work, of course, but anyway she was back there. When you arrive on the grounds you never touch the dirt any more until you get ready to leave. You are on the concrete, tiling, rugs and carpets all the way around. Wm.

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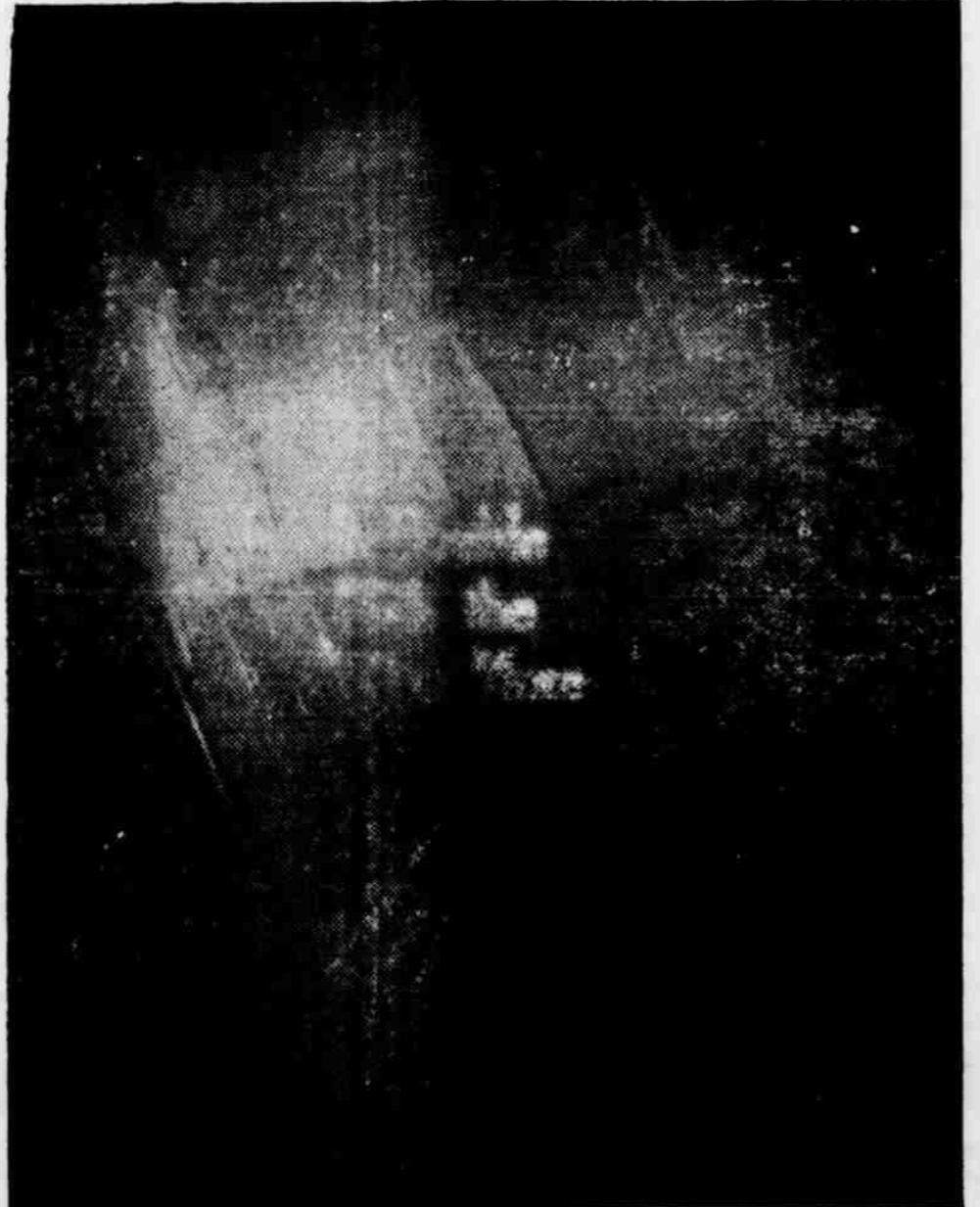
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### HHS Ex-Student, Now GI, Fought On Both Sides in Alamo 'Battle'

### Many Persons Fail to Speak Distinctly

There's a good chance that you haven't learned to speak. That is, you haven't learned to speak out clearly, so that those around you can hear and understand what you say. Millions of people are more or less handicapped in their everyday affairs because of slurred speech, mumbling, swallowing word endings and other violations of vocal expression that leave an impression of carelessness and lack of self-confidence.

Speech is our direct means of communication. Clear enunciation and a pleasant voice are among the greatest assets in modern society. This doesn't mean that everyone need be an orator, or even a public speaker. It does mean that we must make ourselves understood in our everyday dealings with the people around us.

Some people are fortunate enough to be born with voices that yield true, pure tones. From this group we obtain most of our vocal talent—singers, orators and radio and television announcers. Most of us have to be content with everyday quality of voice, but we at least can use it to best advantage.

Some can gain from voice lessons. Not to become a singer, but just to develop a better voice quality. Almost everyone can gain from coaching in public speaking and dramatics.

Most important of all is the effort to express ourselves as clearly and as pleasantly as possible. It doesn't require a teacher to tell us that we must speak loud enough and distinctly enough to be understood.

The American Medical Association suggests that you try a simple experiment. Ask two or three close friends or relatives—those who will give you an honest answer—whether they can understand your speech all of the time. The answers may surprise you. Or, you can ask yourself the question: How often does someone ask me to repeat a word, phrase or sen-

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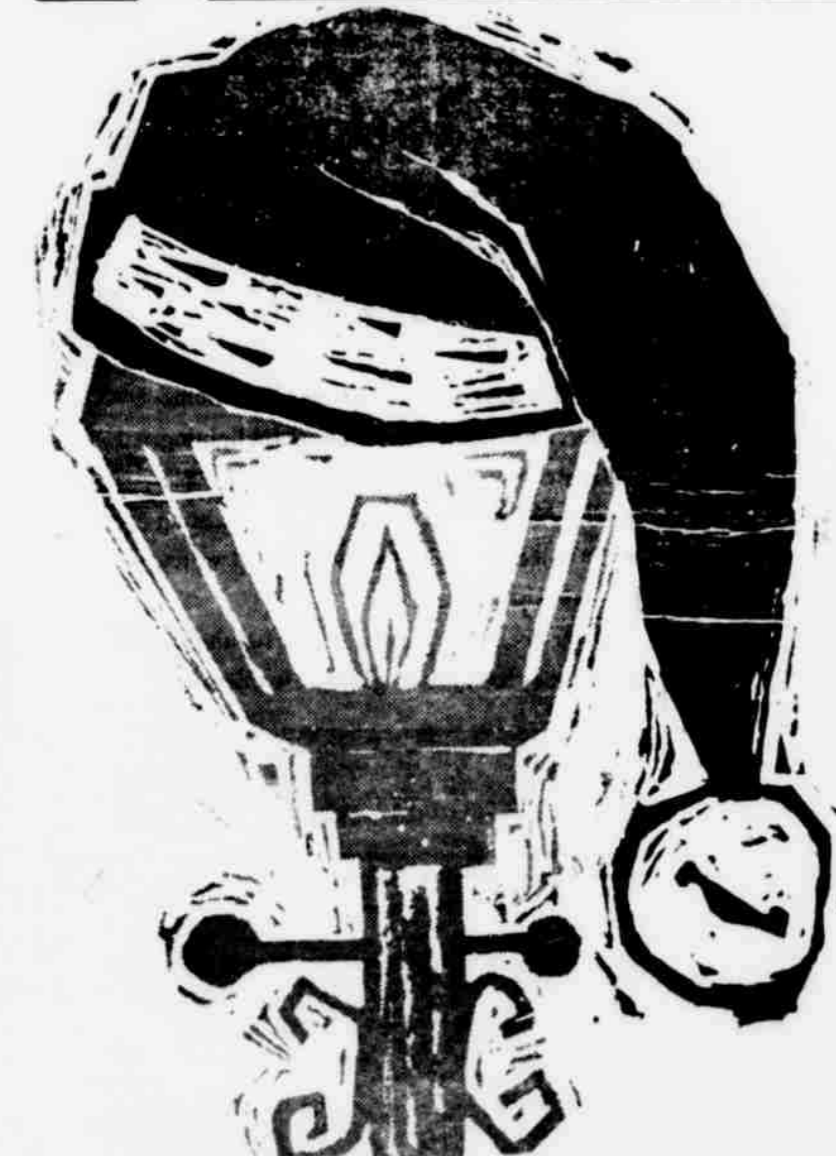
