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Hunt Deaths Decline For First Time

AUSTIN — Final incomplete returns from the last major Texas hunting season added 10 previously unreported deaths, raising the total to twenty-eight but falling short of the 35 fa-talities for the previous season.

The Executive Secretary of the Game and Fish Commission said it was the first year on record that the seasonal aggre-gate fell below that of the preceding year.

"Twenty-eight Texans still is a pretty heavy toll to take during one hunting season," he added, "but if we did gain seven lives as compared to the year before maybe our gun safety efforts are being rewarded at least in a modest way."

The Executive Secretary noted

least in a modest way."

The Executive Secretary noted that an increasing number of sportsmen's groups are fostering actual training periods for youngsters, and that Commission field personnel are helping out where time permits in most of these programs.

"Our principal safety work certainly rests with the young-

sters," said the Executive Secretary. "For example, seven of the last ten fatalities were youngsters, mostly in the 10-14 year age bracket."

Not until the Fifteen century did Europeans put much stock in last names. Most had none. If need be, they used their given names, and now and then their fathers' given names (like John John's son) or their home towns or heighborhoods' (like Thomas of Aquinas).

But mostly they went by their given or baptismal names. Some churches today still call their members by their first names (Sister Joan and Brother Albert) like royalty (e. g. Queen Elizabeth). In certain European countries you can register a beth). In certain European countries you can register a child's name if it is one of an approved list. High nobility goes by its last name (de Medici, Marlborough), but knights take their given names (Sir Winston). Since people had little property interests in their last names, English and American law gave them little or no protection. Trade names, of course, are another matter.

another matter.

But in France and Germany the law gives one a property in-terest in his name; you may get a court to keep somebody from adoping your name by showing it would harm you. But not as a rule in America or England.

For instance, on the ground that by his writing he had earn-ed a property right in his name, Samuel Clemens (Mark Twain) once sued a man for printing a work called "Sketches by Mark Twain." But the court ruled that Mark Twain had no sole right to use either his own or his pen

This bill would require publication of a classified ad in the hometown newspaper of any veteran applying for a loan to purchase land under the benefits of the Veterans Land Act. It would name the veteran who has made such application, specifically designate the land, and quote the purchase price. "By this method," said Herring, "the public would know what is being done with our Veterans Land Funds, and who is taking advantage of the State's generous offer." Said Anderson, "This simple notice will stop once and for all the false applications for veterans lands. Had it been in effect years ago it would have saved the state millions of dollars." 


