The petitioner asks for judgment enjoining the NCTMWA Water Authority from assessing and collecting taxes on property in the four towns of Haskell, Rule, Munday and Goree.

The Water Authority had announced a tax rate of 50 cents on each \$100 of taxable property in the district this year, and tax rolls are now being completed in preparation for beginning tax collections on Oct. 1.

Officers and directors of the Water Authority, as Defendants, have 20 days in which to file answer to the plaintiff's petition, after which a date for hearing the case can be set, a court official explained.

Since the lawsuit involves taxable property in Haskell, it is presumed as a matter of law District Judge Ben Charles Chapman as a resident taxpayer will be automatically disqualified from hearing the case. In such an event, a judge would be appointed from outside the 39th District.

Water Authority President Herren, contacted Tuesday concerning the suit, expressed regret that opponents of the municipal water program had taken this step.

He said he did not expect filing of the law suit to interfere with continuing work on the Miller Creek project of the Authority for which contracts were recently awarded. A firm of geologists and engineers is making final core drilling tests at the dam site, and another firm is completing aerial mapping and surveying of the reservoir site watershed, Herren explained.

However, Herren declared that if the current lawsuit delays work on the project causing additional expense or financial loss to the Authority, "we will certainly use every legal means available in recovering damages from those responsible."

Herren pointed out that the Act creating the NCTMWA Water Authority had been reviewed in detail by the legal authorities of the State before its passage, and that none of the provisions of the Act had ever been questioned before as to their legality.

Herren cited the fact that after the four member towns of Haskell, Rule, Munday and Goree had voted overwhelmingly for a \$3,800,000 bond issue, that the bonds had been approved by the Attorney General's department and certified by the State Comptroller.

Approximately \$185,000 in Water Authority bonds have been issued to date, and of this amount \$85,000 of bonds have been sold and the proceeds used in meeting accrued and current obligations, Herren said Tuesday.

**CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER THREE ON THE BALLOT**  
Dollars and Fifty Cents (\$2.50) for every twenty-five (25) miles, the distance to be computed by the nearest and most direct route of travel, from a table of distances prepared by the Comptroller to each county seat now or hereafter to be established; no Member to be entitled to mileage for any extra Session that may be called within one (1) day after the adjournment of a Regular or Called Session."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the 8th day of November, 1960, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1960, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment giving the Legislature authority to classify loans and lenders, license and regulate lenders, define interest and fix maximum rates of interest; and providing for a maximum rate of interest of ten per centum (10%) per annum in the absence of legislation fixing maximum rates of interest."

# Our Fabulous Friend, The Spider

Spider silk looks fragile but no man-made product can equal it for combined strength and lightness and for elasticity.

The web of the garden spider has tensile strength three times that of iron. Or put it this way, spider silk, twisted into a rope one-inch thick could lift 74 tons. It is also the lightest solid known. A continuous fine thread circling the earth at the equator would weigh under six ounces. Spiders spin not only snares but cocoons for eggs, linings for burrows, hinges and doors, moulting sheets and gossamer threads for aerial flights. The finest strans can be seen only with a magnifying glass. Some used in cocoons are fantastically—millionth of an inch thick.

The spider has three pairs of spinners at the tailend of its body. Each pair may have up to 100 finely pointed tubes from each of which comes a single minute thread of silk.

Though insects are the chief prey of spiders, their strong springy webs occasionally make freak captures of small birds, bats, lizards, frogs.

With their radar-like toes, web spiders measure the vibrations made by an object striking the web and know instantly whether it's supper, a leaf, or an enemy such as a wasp.

No marriages in Nature are more incongruous than these in the spider wonderland. They are circus romances in which the fat lady always marries the midget. Spider wives are generally many times as big as their husbands. One tropical spider wife in 1300 times as big! This is as though a man 6 feet tall and weighing 196 pounds married a woman 90 feet tall and 90 tons in weight.

Spider wives have bad reputations for eating their husbands after the nuptials. But not all do. Husbands and wives of some species live amiably together.

Billions of spiderlings emerge simultaneously from the cocoons. If they hadn't acquired a unique way of dispersing they would soon overrun the local food supply and take to eating themselves. They pay out little silken lines into the warm air in spring and autumn and are soon airborne. They often reach great heights; naturalists have scooped them up in nets at 15,000 feet; a pilot saw some in the stratosphere—higher still.

They cover big distances. They have settled on ships 300 miles from land. Some probably go much farther. About 90 different kinds of spiders are found in Britain and North America. Some made the journey by land bridges but possibly others soared across the 3,000 miles of the Atlantic.

Extremator, engineer, camouflager, deep sea diver, space explorer, mountaineer, hunter and trapper, spinner and weaver these may have been some of the amazing accomplishments of the spider that Emily Dickinson recognized when she wrote: Neglected son of genius, I take thee by the hand.

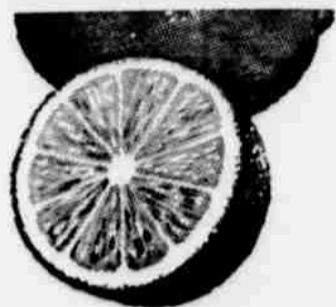

### Former Tenants of Housing Now Own Their Homes

10 per cent of its net shelter rental to the city for fire and police protection. All other revenue goes for the operation and maintenance of the development and retirement of bonds with which the developments were financed. The projects are locally owned, built with money furnished by the government, to be repaid over a period of years.

To qualify for an apartment in Brick Village (the development for white people) or Oasis Homes, developed for colored people) one's income must be limited to an amount which is consistent with the limit approved by the Public Housing Authority. The accommodations are furnished with a stove and refrigerator, and all water bills are paid. Light and gas meters have been installed on each apartment, and are read once each quarter, and the tenant pays for any usage above his allowance, which is based on the size of the apartment and the size of the family. One air condition per apartment is allowed, with the tenant paying a flat rate for any additional air conditioner.

Haskell's low-rent housing developments are administered by the Authority, consisting of five commissioners and an executive director. The commissioners are appointed for two-year terms by the Mayor, and serve without pay. They are prevented by law from benefiting, directly or indirectly, from low-rent housing operations. Mrs. Opal Rose, who is executive director, is assisted in maintenance by one employee, who is paid on a monthly basis.

Returning from a recent newspapermen's convention in Oklahoma, we stopped for a chat with a long-time friend in the drug store business in Anadarko. His name is Albert Connel.

We became friends when I was an adman on the Anadarko Daily News. As a lover of the great outdoors, you'll be interested in what he has done.

Albert is not just an ordinary businessman. He likes to live in a small town. He loves the close contact with the people. He may reside in a small town, but it doesn't mean that he doesn't think big. His thinking is reflected in everything he does. When he buys an ad he buys a big ad. He buys page ads when most other merchants are thinking of quarter pages or less. And the success of his business proves the wisdom of his thinking.

### Hunt, Fishing Licenses Ready To Send Out

New hunting and fishing licenses for the 1960-61 season will be mailed to license deputies throughout the state next week, according to C. L. Friou, fiscal director of the Game and Fish Commission, at Austin.

The licenses will reach these deputies in time for buying by Sept. 1, when a new license is required. They will be available at most sporting goods stores, from county clerks and game wardens.

Fishing licenses will sell for \$2.15 for either resident or non-resident. A license is required of anyone between the ages of 16 and 65 who fishes outside his home county, or fishing anywhere with a rod and reel.

A new hunting license form has been prepared for the upcoming season. The resident license will sell for \$3.15 and is required for all persons between 16 and 65 who hunt outside their own counties.

The new license will not be effective until Sept. 1, and persons caught hunting or fishing between now and that time without their old license will be subject to prosecution.

### 400 Pay Fines For Fishing With No License

There were many lucky fishermen in Texas during August, but 400 of them definitely weren't. Of the 501 arrests made by various game wardens last month, 400 of them were for fishing without the \$2.15 license required.

Unlucky hunters also were arrested for hunting from automobiles, killing deer, ducks, quail and curlew out of season.

Two more fishermen also paid fines for "telephoning," which is the use of electrical device for taking fish.

The 501 arrested paid fines and costs totaling \$8514.80 according to the director of law enforcement, Game and Fish Commission.

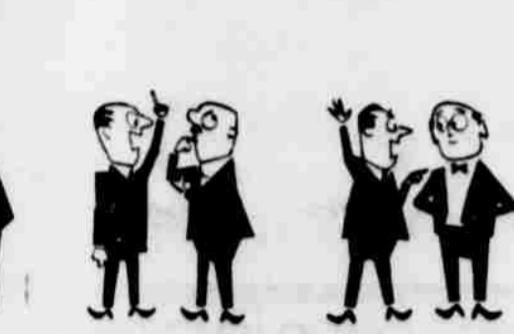
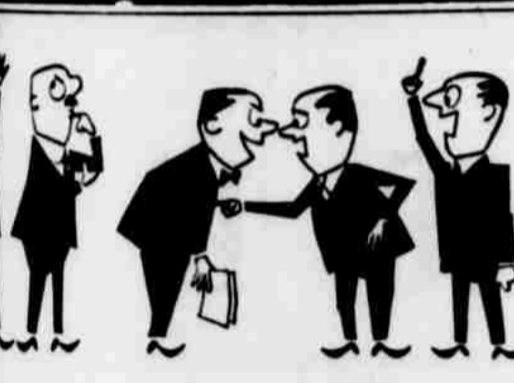
