> Water Authority President Herren, contacted Tuesday concerning the suit, expressed regret that opponents of the municipal water program had taken this step.

He said he did not expect filing of the law suit to interfere with continuing work on the Miller Creek project of the Authority for which contracts were recently awarded. A firm of geologists and engineers is making final core drilling tests at the dam site. and another firm is completing aerial mapping and surveying of the reservoir site watershed, Herren explained.

However, Herren declared that if the current lawsuit delays work on the project causing additional expense or financial loss to the Authority, "We will certainly use every legal means available in recovering damages from those responsible."

Herren pointed out that the Act creating the NCTM Water Authority had been reviewed in detail by the legal authorities of the State before its passage, and that none of the provisions of the Act had ever been questioned before as to their legality.

Herren cited the fact that after the four member towns of Haskell, Rule, Munday and Goree had voted overwhelmingly for a \$3,800,000 bond issue, that the bonds had been approved by the Attorney General's department and certified by the State Comptroller.

Approximately \$165,000 in Water Authority bonds have been issued to date, and of this amount \$65,000 of bonds have been sold and the proceeds used in meeting accrued and current obligations, Herren said Tuesday.



We have just read that in a certain town they have an annual top-spinning contest, in which men, women and children compete We hadn't thought of it for years but we wonder: Where are the tops? Or, for that matter, where are the marbles? Or mumbledy peg? Or the dozen other things that made a long, lazy summer a heaven for boys?

And suddenly, we know, The boys are busy being entertained by adults in "supervised recreation." And we're inclined to be a bit curious why the term "juvenile delinquency" had never been thought of when the kids were so neglected that they went to the devil playing run-sheep-run and shinny and one-o'-cat,

Some of the more venturesome among them hunted wild strawberries, came home with a large pan of berries and a feel ing of accomplishment. A lot of them picked cherries on shares and brought home their share for mom to can, Widow ladies never needed to worry about their lawn-mowing. There were a dozen boys in the neighborhood ready to do the job for a quarter. And it had better be done right or some other kid would get the job

But we suppose it was not good. There were no child-labor laws which said a kid couldn't work without getting permission from the school authorities. The Government had not yet decreed that everybody should be paid a dollar an hour. There was no social security. No forty-hour week, No time-and-a-half. No income

In short, there had been no social progress. But, somehow all the kids grew up to be self-reliant citizens. And they built a great nation. And they now read that the Russians are working harder than we are and their leader has promised them they

The thing we don't know, and we'd like very much to know is whether the Russian kids are spinning tops,

Fraudulent TEC Claims

Sometime this isn't necessary. Some people who are drawing unemployment compensation and secretly working, will betray themselves by their nervousness when they report to the local

There are some, says a veteran TEC employe, who take the attitude: "I've earned it. Now I want to collect, In other words, in connection with a visit to after they have worked long enough and earned enough to qualify for unemployment compensation, they feel they're entitled to quit work and collect it.

Good Fish Pond

By F. W. Martin, County Agent

In talking with pond owners we find that they usually are not convinced that they receive the proper quantity or kinds of fish when fish hatchery deliveries are made. When asked what kind of fish they placed in the pond, a gleam frequently comes into their eyes as they explain that in addition to the hatchery fish, they added a few hundred served during the last hour. grown fish from a friend's pond which was drained, plus some they caught from the creek, etc.

Mechanical Pond Weed Control Methods

With limitations placed on use of chemicals in pond weed control (see Texas Wildlife No. 34, May 27, 1960) there has been increased interest in al ternate methods of controlling undesirable aquatic plants. The following techniques may be helpful in planning your pond weed control demonstrations:

1. Marginal weeds can sometimes be controlled by lowering the water level during the spring weed growing season. The plants sometimes die without water and with direct exposure to sunlight.

2. Submerged weeds can be "shaded-out" by proper fertil-ization in the spring growing season (see B-213 for de-

3 Eliminate, excessive shallow water areas when pond water level is low or when the pond is drained. This method involves the use of heavy equipment in removing sediment which has accumulated or which was left in the basin originally.

4. Temporary weed control can be accomplished by use of mechanical weed cutters.


