Shaud takes charge of **Air Training Command**

RANDOLPH AFB, Texas-Headquarters U.S. Air Force officials in Washington, D.C. have announced that Gen. Andrew P. Iosue, commander ATC, retires Sept. 1 and will be replaced by Lt. Gen. John A. Shaud. The change off command ceremony is slated for August 28 at Randolph AFB, Texas. General Shaud is currently serving as the Deputy Chief of Staff, Personnel, Headquarters U.S. Air Force.

Maj. Con. Thomas J. Hickey, commander, Keesler Technical Training Center, will replace General Shaud. General Hickey has been nominated for promotion to Lieutenant General.

General Iosue, who has been the commander of ATC since June 1983, has served 36 years on active duty. He is a command pilot with more than 6,500 flying hours. General Iosue entered Pilot Training during 1953 and - career. He has served as

earned his wings at Reese AFB, Texas, in March 1954.

General Shaud is a command pilot with more than 4,000 hours flying time. He was graduated from the U.S. Military Academy, West Point, N.Y., in 1956 with a Bachelor of Science degree. He also holds a master's degree in Public Administration from George Washington University, and a doctorate in Business Administration from Ohio State University. He attended pilot training at Reese AFB, Texas, and later at McConnell AFB, Ariz. from April 1957 to February 1958. He is a graduate of the Squadron Officer School and Air Command and Staff College, both located at Maxwell AFB, Ala., and the National War College, Washington,

General Shaud has served in a variety of positions throughout his military

An ATC spokesman said the commander's position was being changed to a Lieutenant General authorization to keep the Air Force within grade limitations imposed by Congress. 

As required, I had the braces on my teeth removed for my AF entry physical. I'd like to have braces put back on, but I can't afford the price quoted to me by an orthodontist downtown. What I'd like to know is, why can't CHAMPUS pay for the braces?

Since you are a military member, you are ineligible for CHAMPUS benefits. Also, since your teeth meet Air Force dental standards, and since there is no medical justification for the braces, the Air Force will not do this for you. If, for personal reasons, you want braces again, you must pay a civilian orthodontist.

Neighborliness is next to Godliness



Care line

The CARE Line is prepared by Col. James McIntyre, 64th Flying Training Wing commander, on a weekly basis. All information provided to the CARE Line will be held in strict confidence. Callers are urged to give their name and duty telephone number so that a personal reply may be made; however, neither are mandatory. Callers should use the CARE Line only after all possible means to air their views or complaints through the chain of command have been exhausted. The CARE Line number is 885-(Ext.) 3273.

Why won't CE give feedback?

When CE responds to a call for nelp, they do good work, but I'm bothered by the lack of communication between CE Job Control and their customers. CE can take as long as 30 days to answer some of their calls. In those cases they should call the customer to tell them when the work will be scheduled. When the work is done, they should check with the customer to let them know that the job is complete and to see how satisfied the customer is with the work. Can we put in a policy like that? I appreciate your concern. Thank you very much.

The CE service desk receives between 500-600 emergency or urgent calls a month. On any given day, 250-300 job orders are "open," and these are subject to constantly changing priorities, which makes it virtually impossible to keep each customer updated on the status of their request. On the other hand, your suggestion to have CE call the customer when a job is complete, to see if the customer is satisfied, is a real good idea. I have asked the CE Customer Service people to implement this procedure. You should hear from them soon.

Base garden-picked clean

We have a garden plot over by the hospital and we have had produce, garden equipment, a sprinkler, and some hoses stolen out of there. I suppose it is our fault for leaving it out there, but we do like to water at night sometimes. A lot of other people have equipment of that sort out there all the time. I have not been able to weed my garden for a week or two, it does look unkempt. Apparently some people think that we don't care. We would just like the people that took our equipment to read this in the Roundup and maybe feel a little guilt. Thank you for your time.

the garden plot manager, at Ext. 3710, and he will see if the missing equipment can be located and returned to its proper owner.

The garden plot program is extended to military personnel as a courtesy and a privilege and is managed by volunteers. We have no way of providing additional security for this area; therefore, it is the responsibility of each individual to monitor and secure his own equipment. Each individual is also responsible for properly maintaining his garden plot and ensuring it is kept free of weeds.

Village drainage poses problem

The history of Reese Village has a lengthy chapter on drainage problems. It only takes a couple of people sweeping dirt and grass into the gutters before the drains stop up. It also helps alleviate the problem if people would turn their lawn sprinklers off before the water starts flowing into the street.

The dumpsters are up against our backyard, and when people throw unbagged garbage in the dumpsters and leave the lids open, the summer heat creates an unbelievable fly problem. I'd appreciate it if someone took a serious look at our situation. Thanks

Unfortunately, the layout of our houses, carports, and access roads limits our dumpster locations. A realistic solution to your problem is keeping the kids on the dumpsters closed. This is a base-wide problem, aggravated by the summer heat. Therefore, it's imperative that we all be good neighbors and keep the dumpster lids closed in order to control both insects and odors.

Hook up Wood Hobby Shop equipment!

I use the wood hobby shop frequently. When the shop was remodeled, most of the machines were moved around but CE has been unable to finish hooking up some of them. Could you check into the situation and get the hookups moving?

CE has ordered special "under voltage protector" hookups for the equipment. This is a required safety feature that has automatic shut off handles. Because of safety requirements for work on this high hazard equipment the project must be worked by CE. Completion is scheduled for November 1st, but we are trying to rearrange priorities to speed things up. Thanks for the call.

Sprinkler spray—a complaint a day

I'm a second time caller about the problem with water being sprayed on the streets and sidewalks, but apparently nothing was ever done about it. I've known people who got sprayed when walking down the sidewalk and when riding bicycles. Driving down Mitchell in the daytime, water in the road sprays all over my nice car and I get little white spots all over it from sitting in the sun. I just wish that you all can do something about that.

If you read this column regularly, you know that this subject is a frequent topic of concern to our base people, myself and the Civil Engineering Squadron's Plumbing Shop. The crux of the problem is twofold. First, sprinkler heads can be adjusted to compensate for the wind, but we know it's tough to do that in West Texas. Second, a kick, a bump or heavy footsteps can alter the spray pattern, requiring an adjustment.

As a repeat award winner for our well kept grounds, and because of our excellent reputation, Reese is constantly in the spotlight brought by visitors from other bases. We are not going to shut off our sprinkler system because water flows across streets and sidewalks. Instead, we must rely on people who observe misdirected sprinklers to call the CE service desk at ext. 3647 to report the problems. Also, people who walk, ride bicycles or drive autos through wet sidewalks

and streets need to show a little flexibility and understanding and, if possible, take an alternate route. Thanks for the call again. We continue to work for a solution to the problem.

No curfew for teenagers

Why is there no curfew for teenagers in base housing? I've seen an increasing number of teens out between 3:30 - 5:30 a.m.

There is no curfew in base housing because it has never surfaced as a major problem. I checked with our Security Police chief about juvenile incidents this year and none of them involved after-dark activity. So, for the present, I am willing to take the position that the children's whereabouts and conduct are parental responsibilities. If this should become a problem area in the future, we can always re-examine our present policy, and change it if need-be.

Stash trash-in dumpters

We need another dumpster for the 111-113 Arnold area. The dumpster is full and people are leaving their trash on the side.

Campaign ends

Our main emphasis has always been directed toward providing the active duty and retired member and their family a general clearing house for a variety of services. Just what services do we provide?

• We voluntarily staff the center's office some 30 hours

• We loan out basic household and kitchen utensils, baby items, car seats, futons, etc.,

• We maintain current files on every Air Force base, ConUS or overseas, as well as most Army, Navy, and Marine installations for any member to borrow to learn about a base's general location, schools, housing, etc.,

• We host the annual Spouse Orientation Workshop to enable a military spouse to become better informed about Air Force programs.

• We provide welcome and sponsor packets to all newcomers and squadrons.

Once the AF Form 1000 is completed by the suggester, it should be forwarded to XPMTS, Stop 45. Once here, it is given a suggestion number and a copy of the suggestion is returned to the suggester with a number typed or written in on the top right of the form. If you don't receive a copy within five work days after your submission, please call to ensure we received it.

The next step is for us to send the suggestion to the office of primary responsibility (OPR). The OPR has 30 days to evaluate the suggestion. Their responsibility is to accomplish an AF Form 162. The 162 evaluates only and determines if approval or disapproval is within their authority. If the suggestion only relates to Reese, then in most cases, the authority will rest here on base. Tech Orders or regulation changes are exceptions to this rule. If the suggestion is approved for implementation and the amount to be paid is under \$500, we can pay that on our signature. If the amount is over \$500 but under \$5000 then the Base Suggestion Awards Committee must meet and authorize payment. Payments over \$5000 must go to command headquarters for

approval. This is the easy and fastest method. Unfortunately, if you want a rapid response, the other routes a suggestion can take require additional time.

Suppose the suggestion is considered good by the local OPR but the authority is at a higher level. The suggestion then goes to headquarters. The OPR at headquarters has 60 days to evaluate the suggestion. If Air Force-level authority is needed, then an additional 90 days is given. This seems like a long time-however, when a suggestion goes to command or Air Force-level, there is a possibility it will be picked up for other command or even Air Force implementation. This could mean more money in your pocket-if approved, but could take a total of six to nine months to evaluate.

The AF Form 162 is completed by the OPR and returned to our office. If the suggestion is approved, then an AF Form 1037 is sent to the suggester's immediate supervisor. The supervisor determines if the suggestion was within the suggester's job responsibility. The completed 1037 is returned to XPMTS. If it was determined not to be within the suggester's job responsibility, the suggestion was implemented, and it saved money, then payment can be made to the suggester. After your commander signs an affidavit that the suggestion has been implemented, payments can be made to a suggester even if it was determined to be within their job responsibility. However, the savings must be over five times your annual salary.

These are all positive actions. But what if your idea is implemented and you don't get as much money as you feel it was worth or you receive nothing because it ispart of your job. What should you do? Resubmit the suggestion for reconsideration with additional justification to support your claim. Your suggestion will then go to the Suggestion Awards Committee. The important thing to remember is that the Suggestion Program is designed to help the Air Force and at the same time reward the individuals who come up with the ideas. Here at Reese, suggesters have saved the AF over \$200,000 this year alone. The time a suggestion takes to go through the entire process can sometimes be extremely long so it seems to you, the suggester. But ask TSgt. Sammie Vickers in FMS if it was worth waiting 10 months for the \$3,075 he received, or Mr. Lawrence Walker from the Hospital who waited eight months. He received over \$1,200.

"Why should I submit a suggestion? I'm going PCS or leaving the service in two months!" The answer to this is easy. If you are going PCS, leave a copy of your orders with the suggestion office. You will be kept advised of all actions the same as if you were still here. Getting out? The same rule applies. Leave us a copy of orders or an address. Even if you are leaving the service under less than desirable circumstances, you can still receive a monetary award for an approved suggestion. It's just as easy as it sounds. If you have an idea on how to do something better, easier, faster or safer-submit it on an AF Form 1000. The money you save could be some of your own.







Maj. Gen. to speak at graduation

Maj. Gen. (Ret.) Mele Vele Vojvodich Jr. will speak at the graduation ceremony of Undergraduate Pilot Training Class 86-07, Simler Theater, today.

General Vojvodich was born March 28, 1929, in Steubenville, Ohio, where he graduated from Winterville High School. He completed Squadron Officer School at Maxwell Air Force Base, Ala., in 1956 and the National War College, Fort Lesley J. McNair, Washington, D.C., in 1971.

He received his pilot wings upon graduation from the aviation cadet program at Nellis Air Force Base, Nev., in August 1950. From August 1950 to July 1952 General Vojvodich was an F-84 pilot and aircraft commander at Turner Air Force Base, Ga. His next tour of duty was in South Korea as an F-80 and F-86 pilot, and operations officer for the 15th Tactical Reconnaissance Squadron. While there, he flew 125 combat missions. The general returned to the United States in July 1953, and for the next

three years served in various assignments as a pilot and assistant operations officer.

After graduating from Squadron Officer School, General Vojvodich was assigned to the 8th Tactical Fighter Wing, Itazuke Air Base, Japan; then in July 1958 to Headquarters Pacific Air Forces, Hickam Air Force Base, Hawaii, to serve as an air operations officer with the Operational Readiness Inspection Team.

The general was an operations officer for the 4520th Combat Crew Training Group at Nellis AFB from July 1960 until February 1963. He then transferred to Headquarters U.S. Air Force as a special projects officer in the Directorate of Operations. In October 1968 he was named chief of Atmospheric Weapons Division, Aerospace Defense Command headquarters at Ent AFB, Colo.

Following graduation from the National War College, General Vojovodich became director of operations for the 67th Tactical Reconnaissance Wing at Bergstrom AFB, Texas. He then transferred to Thailand in March 1972 and served successively as deputy commander for operations, vice commander, and commander of the 388th Tactical Fighter Wing at Korat Royal Thai Air Force Base. He flew 135 combat missions in F-4s while in Southeast Asia.

Upon returning to the United States in August 1973, he served as deputy chief of staff for tactical analysis, Tactical Air Warfare Center, Eglin AFB, Fla. In August 1974, the general transferred to Headquarters U.S. Air Force as chief Tactical Forces and Airlift Division, Directorate of Prgrams, Office of the Deputy Chief of Staff, Programs and Resources. In August 1977 he became Deputy Chief of Staff, technical training at Headquarters Air Training Command, Randolph AFB, Texas. He was initially assigned to the Office of the Deputy Chief of Staff for Manpower and Personnel at Air Force headquarters in August 1980 as director of manpower and organization. In March 1981 General Vojvodich became director of personnel programs. He assumed the duties of assistant deputy chief of staff for manpower and personnel. Headquarters U.S. Air Force, Washington, D.C., in 1982. He retired in March

The general is a command pilot with 6,000 flying hours. His military decorations and awards include the Distinguished Service Cross, Distinguished Service Medal, Legion of Merit with one oak leaf cluster, Distinguished Flying cross with four oak leaf clusters, Meritorious Service Medal, Air Medal with 13 oak leaf clusters, Joint Service Commendation Medal, Air Force Commendation Medal and Army Commendation

He was promoted to major general May 1, 1980, with the date of rank July 1, 1976. General Vojvodich is married to the former Ellie C. Stewart of Sumter, S.C. They have two children.



Taking needed precautions

Many outdoor sports enthusiasts find their motivation waning when faced with a noon workout.

There are several things that can make exercise more tolerable and safe during the summer months. Research shows that much of the advice received from coaches and doctors in the past was wrong, and in some cases, dangerously so. Here are some common sports training myths, followed by some right things to do.

The first myth-add salt to the diet. This advice is dangerously wrong. Taking extra salt before strenuous physical activity creates a saline imbalance in the body. The body trying to compensate for this imablance, pulls moisture from the surrounding tissues and muscles where it is needed most. This contributes to dehydration—the worst enemy of athletic performance. In a three-hour marathon, a runner may lose up to 13.5 milligrams of salt-far less than the 35 milligrams needed to produce even the mildest symptoms of salt depletion.

The second myth-drink sugared liquids before and during exercise. These products were believed to get into the bloodstream faster than water to provide the much-needed calories and to replace lost salts. Unfortunately, studies show that just the opposite is true. The more carbohydrates in the drink, the longer it takes to get out of the stomach and into the muscles.

It also dramatically slows the rate of water getting into the system. Even a very small amount of sugar takes up to 30 minutes to reach the

muscles. The third myth-wear heavy clothes or a Neoprene sauna belt or plastic suit to lose weight. This advice is not only wrong, but extremely dangerous. First, any weight lost through sweating is only temporary. Weight can only be lost by burning calories,



and the best way to do that is by exercise.

Wearing a plastic suit during activity significantly builds up the body's heat stress index and limits the intensity and duration of exercise. This results in fewer calories being burned than would have been if the person had dressed properly, worked out harder and longer, and enjoyed it more.

Most importantly, wearing such garments restricts heat loss, increases dehydration and can lead to heat stroke, kidney failure and death.

The fourty myth-running without a shirt promotes evaporation and more efficient cooling. Unfortunately, on a sunny, hot, humid day this allows the body to absorb infrared radiaton which inhibits heat loss. This can lead to heat stroke more rapidly than if a person wore a light colored, loose-fitting, porous shirt. Also, if it's hot and humid, it's better to run either early or late in the day. Here's what athletes should do-drink a minimum of 64 to 100 ounces of water a day to prevent dehydration.

If a person loses 2 pounds of water during exercise, his ability to perform can drop 15 percent. Athletes who want a special drink should try the drink of champions: two tablespoons of fresh orange juice added to a cup of chilled water. Drink about two cups of this mixture 15 minutes before a workout and two more cups during each hour of exercise.

A person can run and play sports in the summer heat and enjoy it if he takes some precautions. The most important one, however, concerns water-drink lots of it.






