Four Races To Be Decided In Second Primary June 4

Haskell County voters polled 2,762 ballots Saturday in deciding all but four district and county races, while in statewide races only one run-off remains.

Miss Williams, who is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Delma Williams served as Area IV president last year and attended the National Convention in Chicago.

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In the race for State Representative, J. C. (Carl) Wheatley of Haskell and Bill Sams of Knox City will go into the run-off in the four-county district.

They were advised that the Community Facilities Administration at Washington, John C. Hazeltine, Commissioner, had approved the loan application of the Authority for \$2,600,000 loan to help finance construction of water facilities to serve Haskell, Munday, Rule, and Goree.

461 votes, Brock 536. Other candidates and their votes were Trav Hadaway 156, W. H. Pittman 179, Lewis Hester 294, Roy Sellers 367.

Re-elected without opposition were District Attorney Royce Adkins with 3,753 votes, Assessor-Collector Elizabeth Stewart with 3,736, Constable R. K. Denison of Rule 535, and County Democratic Chairman Chas. M. Conner with 3,762 votes.

Fourth run-off contest is between incumbent Constable Ace Davis who received 899

For County Attorney, Bill Ratliff, Haskell lawyer, polled 2,439 votes in defeating the incumbent, Curtis Pogue, who received 1,250.

Water Authority Loan Of \$2.6 Million OK'd

Officials of the North Central Texas Municipal Water Authority saw one of the last big obstacles behind them Wednesday in connection with financing their program.

Approval by the Washington agency not only makes it possible for the Authority to proceed with the project immediately, but will also result in a substantial saving in interest rates, it was pointed out.

At a special meeting of the City Council Wednesday afternoon, called by Mayor J. E. Walling, a move to condemn action of the Community Facilities Administration failed.

After discussion of the resolution recommended by Mayor Walling, and resultant expressions from several businessmen present, Aldermen voted to adjourn the session without taking action on the Mayor's recommendation.

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PEOPLE, PLACES AND THINGS

The Census Bureau could have saved a lot of time and money expended in the recent census, had they been willing to accept the estimate of a Haskell woman on the community's 1960 population.

Mrs. Marie Huggins, waitress employed in the Texas Cafe, won the \$5 award for guessing nearest to the 1960 census total for Haskell.

Her estimate was 4,000 population, while the actual figure released by the Census Bureau was 3,968. Hers was the nearest out of scores of guesses turned in.

Most of the estimates were in the 3,750-4,500 bracket. The lowest guess was 3,555, while the most optimistic was 5,590.

Census figures now being released are disappointing in most instances and in almost every case the totals fall below the claims of enthusiastic town boosters.

To illustrate, PPT has been proclaiming to all and sundry that Haskell had a solid population of 4,200 citizens. This was based on the number of gas, water, and electric meters and the number of telephones in Haskell. Infallible, we figured. But here comes the C-B head-count which lops around 200 from our estimate.

Even at that, PPT did a better estimating job than the Texas Municipal League of Austin. In March 13 news release, the League estimated the population of neighboring Seymour at 5,000, a gain of 32 percent over the 1950 census figure of 3,779.

Now C-B comes along, ignores the League estimate, and credits Seymour with 3,743 residents, a loss of 36 since 1950.

When the large bulletin board on the south side of the courthouse is taken down after the June 4 primary, it will be the last time for the heavy, cumbersome board to be dismantled.

Plans are to have it replaced with a similar but lighter bulletin board, one that can be easier erected and dismantled. The present board has been in use for 36 years, having been designed and built in 1924 by John Decker, retired carpenter of this city.

Helping him with plans for it was the late John Couch, long-time chairman of the Democratic county organization.

"When the board was built in 1924, we figured that it might be usable for 12 or 15 years if care was used in putting it up and taking it down each election year," Decker recalled.

Instead, the bulletin board has recorded election results from Democratic primaries for 36 years. And except for being unwieldy and difficult to set up and dismantle, the old board could last for many more years.

Before he present bulletin board was placed in use, re-

turns on election day were announced from the east entrance to the courthouse. Serving as the "caller" would be several leather-lunged fellows who could be heard for several blocks, and they would take time about giving out the results.

One of the most popular announcers was the late Jack Baldwin, rancher and former livery stable operator. His high-pitched voice and distinct pronunciation of figures made it possible to take down the results from a block away.

Approach of "Western Week" to be observed in connection with the annual Rice Springs Roundup and Horse Show will give everyone an opportunity to "let their hair down" and participate in the various activities being planned.

Years ago, Haskell was noted for the outstanding celebrations staged here annually, and for the spirit of cooperation shown by everyone in the community in supporting and taking part in the events.

Many will remember the late Turner E. Campe, who promoted some of the "biggest and best" celebrations ever staged here, and who made the Haskell County Fair the leading exposition in this section for several years.

Campe was among the last of the breed of old-time Chamber of Commerce managers whose enthusiasm was contagious when it came to promoting a civic enterprise.

A one-man dynamo, Campe had the knack of a natural-born showman when it came to promoting celebrations to attract people to Haskell.

As a special attraction for the County Fair one year, he convinced conservative Fair directors that a fireworks exhibition, although expensive, was just the thing to draw a big crowd to the Fair's night

program. On the scheduled night, the crowds were there in pleasing number, but the expert who was to set off the complicated assortment of fireworks failed to show up. Fair directors, worried over the possible reaction of the disappointed crowd if the exhibition was cancelled, went into a huddle with Campe.

Campe had the answer. He'd set off the display. Recruiting a few helpers, several hundred pounds of fireworks were laid out in the center of the fairground racetrack, neatly arranged according to size. Fuse strings were laced together and everything was ready.

With a grand flourish, Campe lighted the master fuse, and Brother, Haskell had a pyrotechnics display that defied description. Rockets designed to outline the Statue of Liberty in the night sky had been mixed with others portraying the sinking of the Maine, while rockets reproducing the sound and fury of the Battle of Chateau Thierry were thoroughly intermingled with an aerial presentation of a Garden of Roses.

Although the themes of the various displays were lost entirely, enthralled spectators knew nothing of that angle, and were highly pleased with the spectacular show.

Tom Roberson relates that in a little East Texas town the janitor of a church in the community was fired because he couldn't read or write. Going into business, the ex-janitor was very successful.

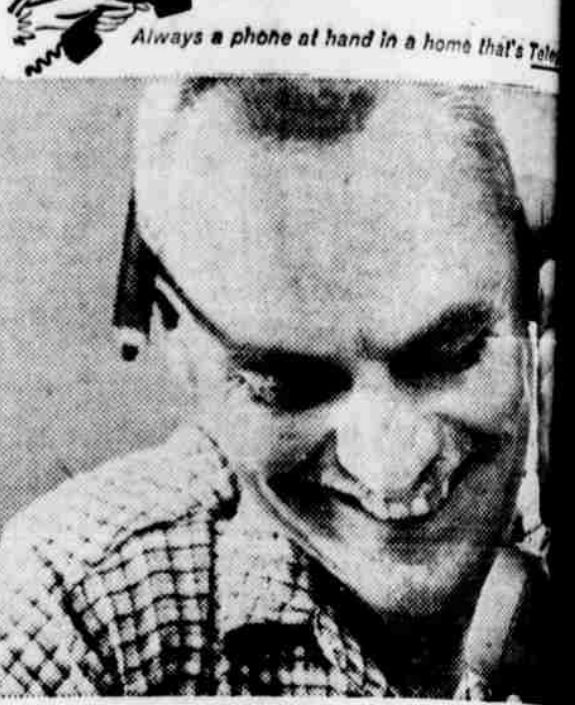

Almost 200 Relatives and Guests Attend 10th Annual Hugon Reunion

With 186 relatives and guests present, the tenth annual Hugon Reunion was held in the Haskell American Legion Hall Sunday, May 1. The meeting was opened officially by the president, Jesse Dean of Haskell. After the singing of a group of hymns led by Bill Reeves and with piano accompaniment by Alta McGuire, the Rev. John Solomon of Houston led the group in prayer. Jesse Dean introduced Alfred Turnbow as master of ceremonies and he welcomed the group in a few well chosen words as well as giving recognition of the people in attendance from out of town.

Miss Lilly Solomon of Gainesville and Miss Margaret Toliver and Miss Polly Terrell of Haskell and Mrs. Wayne Josselot of Weirnet composed the registration committee.

Using the familiar story of the Prodigal Son in Luke 15, the Rev. John Solomon preached a forceful sermon, using as his title, "A Father's Concern," pointing out that the Heavenly Father has a love and concern for His children that is more than mere indulgence, more than mere sentimentalism but is a redeeming love which restores His wayward children to Him. He used a poignant illustration of his own son, at that time six years old, who was temporarily lost in a rock quarry in North Carolina.

Beautiful pot plants were presented in memory of the following members of the various families deceased in the last few years: Mrs. George Turnbow, Paul Josselot, Robert Drinnon, Mrs. Henry Smith of Gainesville, C. A. Thomas Sr., and Jesse Josselot. These flowers were placed later on the graves of the deceased. Acknowledgement was made of the flowers donated by the local florist, Mr. Conner.

After grace was said by Clifford Thomas Jr., the group enjoyed a bountiful repast, a covered dish luncheon.

During the business session, Mrs. Rachel Stubblefield, retiring secretary, read the minutes of the previous meeting of the Reunion. A duet by Donna Josselot and Paula Terrell with Alta McGuire as pianist, was enjoyed. Later, another duet was sung by Janice Medford and Sherry Josselot, with Ophelia Medford at the piano.

Special recognition was given to the following people: to J. E. Solomon of Haskell for being the oldest person in attendance; to Mr. and Mrs. Felix Josselot of Weirnet for being the oldest married couple present; to Mr. and Mrs. James Norman of College Station for being the youngest married couple present—they

were married April 10, 1960; to Mr. and Mrs. Raymond Pickering of Lubbock for having the youngest baby present—(little Don Pickering who was born February 19). Mr. and Mrs. David Josselot of Sierra Blanco and Rev. John Solomon of Houston tied for greatest distance to be present.

The entertainment committee, consisting of Mesdames Bailey Toliver, C. A. Thomas Jr., and Doris Reeves, presented a clever skit depicting the various moves made by B. D. Hugon from 1857 when he left his native village on the Italian side of the Swiss Alps to Montevideo, Uruguay, South America, where he married and became the father of eight children before he moved his family to Barry County, Missouri in 1875, and later to Cooke County, near Gainesville, Texas, where he lived the remainder of his life. Various members of the family, including the Josselots, the Solomons and the Garniers, later made another move in the early 1900's to Haskell where most of the descendants now are living.

Toliver was the narrator and as she read, each of the family ancestors was portrayed by a grandchild or a great-grandchild in early American costumes and took their places on the huge stage which was appropriately decorated to represent a pioneer home with the black wash pot, rub board and clothes line with the then-typical "long johns" and other "long-handled apparel" flapping in the breeze. The narrator further reminisced about humorous events in the lives of some of those taking part in the skit. Such incidents as when Felix Josselot "snuck off behind the barn to smoke a forbidden cigaret and accidentally set the haybarn on fire." Andrew Josselot has a crooked arm because he rode a calf and was thrown when he was quite young. Because he had been forbidden to ride the calf, he was afraid to tell his parents of his broken arm, hence it grew crooked. J. D. Turpen of Denton took numerous pictures of the skit, of various groupings of those present.

During the closing business session the group discussed meeting in Gainesville with the same officers that were elected for 1959. As officers for the 1962 reunion, the following were chosen: President, Richard Josselot. Secretary-treasurer, Doris Reeves.

Expense accounts were read and an offering which more than covered the expense was taken.

The meeting was adjourned with the forming of a circle and singing "Blest Be the Tie" and "God Be With You Till We Meet Again."

The 186 persons in attendance were from Haskell, Olney, Abilene, Tulsa, Munday, Weirnet, Rule, Lubbock, College Station, Quanah, Denton, Gainesville, Houston, Sierra Blanco, Brownsfield, Ira, Wichita Falls, Stamford and Seymour.

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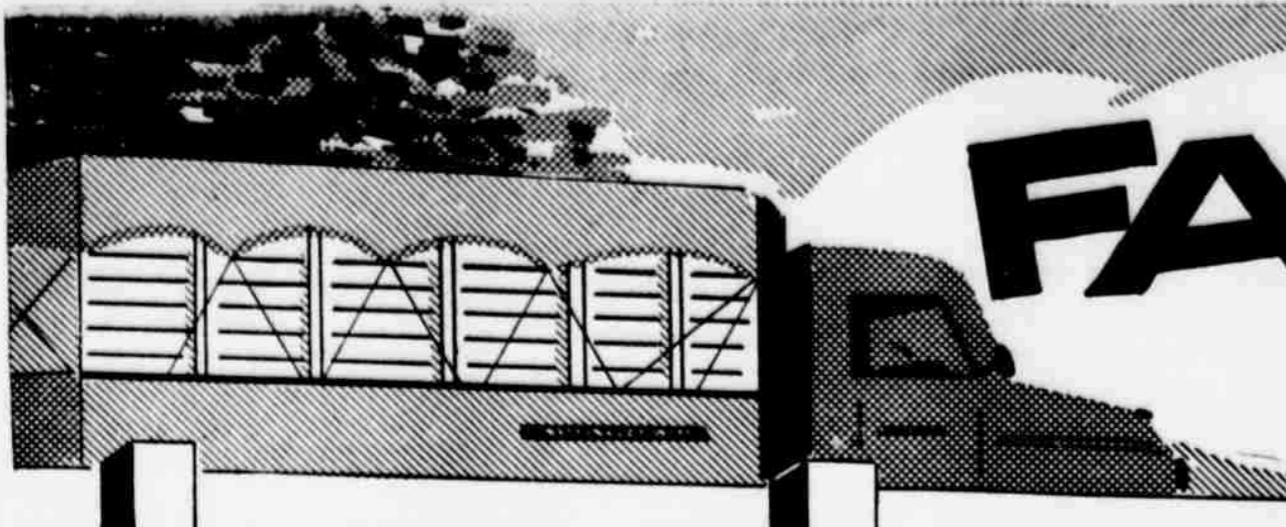
