



The Significance of Profits

Some facts

Each year the American work force swells by one million men and women. This huge army wants and needs jobs.

On the average, it takes a \$20,000 investment to provide the plants and tools that result in just one new job in industry. In some major industries the investment is many times that figure.

The Secretary of Labor has said that it will cost \$90 billion to replace our obsolete plants and equipment and make them competitive with newer facilities abroad.

Now, you mak ask, what is the significance of these facts? It is this: Job-creation, at these enormous costs, is vitally dependent on industry's profit situation. In representative enterprise, a high proportion of profits are ploughed back into the business, to build new plants and modernize old ones. And it is profitable industry which attracts investment capital.

So the health of profits is a key to the health of the economy. But the profit picture is not healthy in this country. From 1950 to 1961, the gross naional product increased 42 per cent, reaching \$521.3 billion, and wages and other payroll costs rose 96 per cent, reaching \$302.9 billion But profits increased hardly

at all from-\$22.8 billion to \$23.3 billion.

Putting it another way, sales of our corporations doubled in the past 15 years. But earnings declined from five per cent to only three per cent of those sales. Adequate profits buy progress, growth, opportunity for organizations and individuals alike. Inadequate profits lead to economic lethargy, unemployment, the undermining of the strength and security of the nation. It is time-high time-we all understand that, especially our lawmakers

Look at the Wall

We have become accustomed to statements of policy by men in high seats of government which, one way or another, would give government ever-widening control over our lives. fortunes, freedoms and opportunities.

So it is pleasant to be able to quote a top official who takes a very different view.

Secretary of State Dean Pusk, has said: "Either we believe in capitalism, in the freedom of individual enterprise, or we do not. And we do not if we hold with massive government intervention to distort and freeze the market. If we look to government to rig the game. we may as well look to it to play the hands

It will be a sad day for this country if the "massive government intervention" attitude becomes a benign contagion - and spreads to those who are entrusted with domestic policy and administration. The do-all, be-all, boss-all government has achieved but one thing in this world-the destruction of human freedom, and the reduction of each individual to the status of a number. The terrible Berlin wall is its perfect symbol.



WASHINGTON AND "SMALL BUSINESS" By C. WILSON HARDER

As of the start of the fall cows largely neglect to read eason, the U.S. government, government edicts. season, the U.S. government, or in other words, the taxpayers, had tied up in surplus dairy products, i.e., butter, cheese, and dried milk, a little over a third of a billion dollars. In butter alone, there is now piled up some 400,000,000 pounds, and

there is only storage space available for 100 million pounds more. This is sur-

plus in storage, and does not take into

free dairy C. W. Harder products the government gives away. With these costs added, the dairy industry is costing the taxpayers about two-thirds of a billion dollars per year. In the meantime, income to nation's 400,000 dairy farmers has dropped.

It would appear the big problem is that few of the country's dairy cows have ever attended Harvard, thus, have little conception of the principles of a government rigged economy.

In March of 1961, the supplies of surplus dairy products had dropped substantially. So for reasons quite unknown the for reasons quite unknown the through direct ownership, or government raised the support financial control, milk monopprices from \$3.22 per hundred-weight to \$3.40. This encouraged greater production of milk, and at the same time raised the cost to the consumer so that milk sales declined.

A year later, or early in 1962. if the consumer refuses, as is the government dropped the support price down to \$3.11 per the monopoly set prices, the cwt., but much to the surprise of the bureaucrats, production of taxes. In any place other did not diminish. This was perhaps due to the fact that milch be termed ridiculous.

Perhaps some of the Potomac bureaucrats are now prepasing a white paper charging milch cows with having leanings toward Moscow for not cooperating. But the sad fact is that with the government upping the support price in 1961, more heifer calves were started on the road to a career of milk production.

Now once a young cow is started on a lifetime career of milk production, she's going to produce more and more until reaching retirement age. In fact, even the most docile cow. willing to go along with what ever bureaucratic nonsense that emanates from Washington, is just plain unable to turn off the spigots.

In the meantime, the system of rigging consumer prices on fluid milk plus the government assuring the processors both a price level and an outlet for manufactured milk products, has built three large dairy processing and marketing combines into a virtual monopoly.

In the past ten years, over 20,000 independent milk distributors have been driven out of business, unable to find outlets for their product. Either oly is able to dictate in many stores whose milk will be sold, or not sold.

Thus, competition in the marketing of dairy products has been practically eliminated. But being done at present, to pay consumer still pays in the form

62 Cotton Crop Estimate 50,000 Bales Over 1961

A Texas cotton crop of 4,-800.000 bales — about 50,000 bales above last year's — was forecast Aug. 8 by the Agriculture Department at Wash-

The department placed the Texas area in cotton at 6,580,-000 acres, a 30,000 acre increase over 1961.

The indicated production was set at 350 pounds per acre, compared to 448 last year. If this prediction is borne out, it would be 90 pounds an acre above the 10-year average.

The total crop for the nation was estimated at 15,102,-000 bales. This would be the largest since 1953 and one likely to add more than a million bales to the surplus.

By comparison, production last year was 14,318,000 bales. Production for the 1951-1960 period averaged 13.979,000

year's crop - grown This under federal planting allotments and marketing quotas designed to prevent excessive production - will be supplemented by a reserve and surplus supply of 7,700,000 bales accumulated from past crops. Much of this is owned by the government under price support operations.

The department has forecast foreign and domestic market demands at about 14 million

The estimated yield to the acre of 461 pounds is 23 pounds above last year and equals the second highest yield in 1959. The record high was 466 pounds

The department said that compared with last year, indicated acre yields are sharply higher in the central states, down slightly in New Mexico, Arizona and Georgia, and up moderately in most other

The department said that 709,000 acres of the 16,427,000 acres planted to cotton this bandoned. This indicated a-

Changes Studied

Shifts in the cotton producing areas of Texas and changes in harvesting methods have greatly affected investments in gins, according to Progress Report 2233 of the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station.

The report shows that the Blacklands and East Texas have shown the greatest decreases and the High Plains the largest increases in cotton production. The areas with reat declines in production have had comparable declines in the number of gins and those areas with increased production have had opportunities for expanded investment in gins the report explains.

Cotton harvesting has almost completely shifted from hand picking to hand snapping and mechanical harvesting and thus has created a greater need for cleaning devices in the gin to handle this cotton. This additional equipment has increased the investment that a gin owner must make, the report continues.

There are wide differences in the amount of cotton each gin handles and in the areas of falling production they are not handling enough cotton to be economical, the report points out. The gins in the Blacklands and East Texas are not being fully utilized as are the gins

in the High Plains. These preliminary studies show that model gin plants should be developed as a guide for installing and remodeling gins to get the most efficient operation under different conditions and in different areas

of the state.


Prices of food have risen ess than most other items in the consumer's budget. This is pointed out by the Agricultural Marketing Service of the Department of Agri-

In 1960, retail food prices were about a sixth higher than their average in 1947-49, but the Consumer Price Index—the average of prices paid by consumers for all goods and ser-vices—was up by more than a fourth. Declining food prices helped keep the Price Index from climbing higher during this period.

Retail prices of foods originating on American farms rose less than the average for all retail food prices, which includes prices of imported foods and non-farm foods.

The slower rise in retail food prices than in the Price Index resulted entirely from the decline in farm prices, since charges for marketing these products increased at a faster rate than the Price In-

The simple process of group-ing unginned bales of cotton according to their moisture and trash content is suggested by B. G. Reeves, extension cotton ginning and mechanization specialist, as an aid to better ginning and improved quality. This is especially true during periods of damp weather, explains Reeves.

Here's an example. A bate of fairly dry cotton goes to the gin which can be processed into a low middling grade with a 31/32 inch staple without too much difficulty. But, what happens when this fairly dry cotton is ginned behind a bale with a much higher moisture content? Reeves says a low middling plus grade could result but with a drop in staple length to 15/16 of an inch. There could also be a loss of 19 pounds in weight as a result of the over-drying. Currently, he says, the price of LM 31/32 inch and LM plus 15/16 inch are the same, 29.11 cents per pound. However, the 19 pound loss in weight means a loss of \$5.53 in the bale's value. It makes good sense, points out Reeves, to gin several bales of damp cotton after the heat and machinery have been set properly to handle it most efficiently. When the ginning of such a grouping has been completed, adjustments can then be made easily and quickly to handle dry cotton.

By following this simple process, Reeves says, everyone concerned is better served farmer, ginner and spinner.
