County ratifies employee pay cut

Scurry County commissioners vices were to be held at 2 p.m. at today unanimously voted to East Side Church of Christ. ratify their administrative decithe five percent raise given to and bills payable for the week. county employees in the 1990 budget.

Last week, at the urging of Scurry County Judge Bobby Goodwin, commissioners took administrative action to rescind the five percent cost-of-living raise that employees received in the 1990 budget.

The recent tax rollback issue which passed calls for a \$435,000 reduction in the county budget. TEAMS test Some \$113,000 will be cut with the raise deletion.

Precinct 3 Commissioner C.D. Gray, Jr., made a motion to hold a sale of surplus equipment March 20. The motion died due to the lack of a second. Other commissioners questioned whether they had enough items to hold a sale.

Gray listed eight pieces of equipment from his precinct that need to be sold because they are not being used. After the motion died, Gray said he will place the areas of mathematics, reading equipment in the county barn for storage until a sale date can be agreed upon.

He said the county can sell the items only to another taxing entity without going out for sealed bids or having an auction.



Four are dead

JOLIET, Ill. (AP) - A gunman with a history of psychiatric problems took four family members hostage early this morning before killing three of them and committing suicide, authorities said.

The fourth hostage, believed to be the assailant's wife, was injured in the attack, said Lt. Steve Rathbun of the Will County sheriff's office. He said authorities believed, but had not confirmed, that those killed were the couple's teen-age children.

RCA is fined

ALEXANDRIA, Va. (AP) - RCA Corp. pleaded guilty in federal court today to two felony charges and was fined \$2.5 million as part of the continuing probe of contractors who acquired and passed along secret Defense Department plans for weapons systems.

One former and one current RCA employee also entered guilty pleas to charges of illegally conveying government property.

The government told U.\$. District Judge James C. Cacheris that in the years 1978-1985, RCA acquired copies of a wide range of Department of Defense documents dealing with program objectives, internal decisions and budget estimates.

Bush speech

WASHINGTON (AP) -President Bush cautioned an international gathering of scientists today against seeking solutions to global warming that would burden major industries.

Bush promised U.S. support for "aggressive and thoughtful action" to solve the problems posed by global warming and announced he is calling a meeting at the White House this spring bringing together top environmentalists, economists and ecologists to grapple with the issue.

CIA said tied to S&L failures

fraud produced evidence that suggests CIA and organized crime involvement in the failure of 22 thrifts, including 16 in Tex-

The Houston Post cited court documents, sworn testimony, law enforcement records and interviews with key government investigators and prosecutors in its report Sunday. Those sources suggest the CIA may have used part of the proceeds from S&L fraud to help pay for covert operations that Congress was unwilling to support publicly.

The CIA denied that the agency has used savings and loans to fund covert activities. "That would be a violation of U.S. laws. and we do not violate U.S. laws,' said CIA spokesman Mark Mansfield.

The Post, however, said it found evidence that the CIA has intervened in criminal investigations involving agency operatives accused of S&L fraud.

Lloyd Monroe, a former prosecutor with the Justice Department's organized crime strike force, said the federal agencies responsible for investigating S&L fraud are "being precluded from investigating wrongdoing that is possibly being conducted in the name of national security.'

SAN ANTONIO (AP) — An American woman deported from El Salvador after being accused of stockpiling weapons for leftist guerrillas says the United States should withdraw its support of that Central American country's government.

"I believe peace is the fruit of justice," Jennifer Casolo said at Trinity University Saturday night. "Without justice there can be no peace."

Ms. Casolo, 28, was arrested in San Salvador in September after security guards dug up a stockpile of weapons and explosives buried in the garden of her rented three-bedroom home. She was deported after 18 days in

"You listen to the screams of other prisoners all night. Salvadoran justice. You see people sign confessions they never read. Salvadoran justice," she said of her time in prison.

She spent 41/2 years in San Antonio-based Christian Education Seminars, showing U.S. congressional delegations around the country.

"I have very strong hopes that there will be a negotiated settlement (to the civil war)," Ms. Casolo said. "I have strong hopes that the right thing will be done."

Ms. Casolo was interrupted once during her presentation by Knox Duncan, an Anglican priest and former chairman of the Bexar County Republican Party.

"If you can't return to El Salvador to spread your word, perhaps you could administer ministry in Cuba," Duncan said to little applause and expressions of disgust from the audience.

"I love people and respect their right to think what they want to think," Ms. Casolo replied.

Vegetables rich in vitamin A such as broccoli are good for the birds' feathers, she said. But too much high fiber food - which includes greens, fruits and raw vegetables — overloads the birds' digestive system and should not be more than 15 percent of the bird's overall diet.


Many birds display an affinity for eggs, sharp cheese, spicy spaghetti sauce, poultry and sweet grapes, and "some even display excitement when they smell their favorite food cooking in the kitchen," according to a nutrition statement issued by they group.

Thielepape said he has no major problems with the development, partly because the rural county has been exposed already to disciples of Transcendental Meditation. A nearby subdivision known as "Radiance" was developed several years ago by Transcendental Meditation practitioners.





Veterinarians irked over poor nutrition for birds

are ruffling the feathers of state know what these birds need to veterinarians who say that diet is unhealthy. Feeding any bird only seeds "is

like feeding a human Twinkies for every meal," said Brazoria veterinarian Kathy Dickerson. 'They are omnivores — they should eat pretty much what people eat, the same four basic food Dickerson and other animal

specialists met Friday in Dallas for the annual Texas Veterinarian Medical Associa-Salvador as a missionary for San tion conference. Dickerson also is a member of the Avian Practice Committee, a subgroup of TVMA which promotes a balanced diet and proper nutrition for birds.

The group also is urging Texas A&M University to hire an avian clinician.

Veterinarians are seeing an increase in the number of birds brought to their clinics either dead or dying because of malnutrition, she said. Vitamin A and calcium deficiencies are most common and eventually result in death.

"The devil tried to take my life, Lisa's life and destroy this church," Rev. John Osteen told a crowd of about 8,000 people during morning services at the Lakewood Church Sunday. "The devil did his best, but his best was not good enough.'

A package bomb loaded with 8inch nails exploded in Lisa Osteen's lap as she opened it Tuesday. The burst shredded the office and caused lacerations and burns on Ms. Osteen's stomach.

She underwent surgery Thursday for an abdominal wound and remained in good condition at The Methodist Hospital Sunday.

Police say they have no prime suspects in the case.

During the nationally televised portion of the two-hour service. Osteen told the congregation "it seemed the Lord shook me and woke me way before daylight."

After rousing him from his sleep, Jesus directed him to go to his den and read certain passages from the Bible that he later interpreted to be warnings about an attack on his life, an impassioned Osteen recalled.



A few baskets for South's eggs

By James Jacoby

A good declarer puts his eggs in as many baskets as possible, as did today's South. But he had to be careful to make his contract.

Declarer first tried the jack of hearts from dummy, covered by East's queen. Since South could ill afford a spade shift, he won the trick. Now the straightforward play was king and a diamond, finessing against the hoped-for queen in West's hand. But the hand would collapse whenever East held that card. Instead declarer decided to play the 10 of diamonds the queen from West, he would simply let West hold the trick, and the subsequent five diamond tricks would be enough for the contract. But West played low on the diamond 10. Declarer overtook with the jack in dummy. Once again, if East won the queen, the king would later be overtaken and the diamond suit run for five tricks. So canny East played low, letting the jack win.

Declarer switched to clubs, playing low from dummy and finessing with his jack. When that won the trick, the king of diamonds was overtaken with the ace in dummy. (Maybe the queen would fall.) Another club was played and finessed, and then ace and a club cleared the suit as East won the trick. Back came a heart, but declarer had four club tricks and five other winners for his contract. The key to the deal was for declarer to manage things so that he would either win five diamond tricks or be able to lead twice from dummy to take club finesses in the process of setting up tricks in that suit.

Murphy's movie still 'in the red'

LOS ANGELES (AP) - Eddie Murphy and his assistants ran up \$5 million in expenses during the making of the movie "Coming to America," which has made no profit despite \$350 million in ticket sales, according to studio records.

Two months ago, Pulitzer Prize-winning columnist Art Buchwald and producer Alain Bernheim won a lawsuit against Paramount Pictures in which they said the studio took the concept for the 1988 movie from an idea by Buchwald. Paramount was ordered to pay Buchwald and Bernheim 19 percent of the movie's net profits.

A financial audit is scheduled during a forthcoming phase of the trial to determine how much money Buchwald and Bernheim should receive.

The financial documents released to the Los Angeles Times by court order Saturday were sealed during the trial at Paramount's request, but studio officials had testified that the movie was still in the red.

Bellmon cancels state of state address

Others extend sympathies to families of crash victims

OKLAHOMA CITY (AP) -Gov. Henry Bellmon canceled today's State of the State address to the Legislature after searchers Sunday night found the wreckage of a plane that was carrying a lawmaker's two children.

"Governor Bellmon feels it would be inappropriate to verbally deliver his State of the State message," said Bellmon's spokesman Sam Armstrong.

"Traditionally, a State of the State address is a very upbeat, joyous address, and in light of the tragedy over the weekend, the governor will deliver only a written State of the State address to members of the Legislature," Armstrong said.

Bellmon has asked House and Senate leaders for permission to address a joint session in the near future to announce his budget recommendations for Fiscal Year 1991, Armstrong said.

Lawmakers returned to the Capitol today for the opening of the regular legislative session, and to wrap up work on a special

House Speaker Steve Lewis said the tragedy would subdue today's events

"We probably will not have the formality we normally have that's associated with the beginning of the session," he said.

Two teen-age children of Rep. Bill Brewster, D-Marietta, were killed in the plane crash, along with a newspaper publisher and the pilot.

The wreckage was discovered north of Coalgate in southeastern Oklahoma, about midway between McAlester, where the plane took off Wednesday night, and Ardmore, its destination.

Those killed in the crash were Kecia Brewster, 16; Kent Brewster, 13; Herb Pate, 32, publisher of The Madill Record, and pilot Jack Kirkpatrick, 43, a businessman.

DALLAS (AP) - An East Dallas restaurant owner who survived a dangerous sailboat journey from Vietnam to Malaysia en route to the United States was fatally shot by a robber who stole his wallet.

Hai Van Tran and his wife, Phan Le Tran, had closed their Vietnamese restaurant about 10:30 p.m. Friday. On the way to their car, a man wielding a handgun approached them and demanded money. Tran, 42, shoved the robber away, but the man came back and shot

Tran once in the chest during a struggle. He was dead on arrival at 11:37 p.m. at Baylor University Medical Center. The gunman also shot Mrs. Tran four times in both hands, grabbed Tran's wallet from his pocket and ran away. Police had no suspects

in custody Saturday evening. "I'm angry," Tran's 18-year-old son, Phuong Tran, said Saturday. 'He came here looking for freedom and a new life. We risked our lives to cross the ocean to come here. This is so terrible. We are so

Three months after the family arrived in Maylasia, Tran, his wife, his two sons and another relative emigrated to the United States. That was seven years ago.

this condition? My main concern is that I'm a 72-year-old male with hip replacement. I'm worried that infection could spread to the hip and cause major problems.

DEAR READER: Diverticulitis is

infection that occurs in one or more small, sacular outpouchings in the lining of the large intestine.

As we age, most adults develop these outpouchings (diverticulosis). However, the sacs cause no symptoms unless they become infected. Then diverticulosis turns into diverticulitis. No one knows why this occurs. Diverticulitis causes abdominal pain, fever, bloating and belly tenderness. It is treated with antibiotics.

Some experts believe the indigestible seeds from fruits such as raspberries, blueberries and strawberries may become wedged in diverticular crevices, leading to infection. However, this has not been proved.

On occasion, diverticulitis causes intestinal bleeding, large abscesses or bowel obstruction. In these circumstances, antibiotics are not enough; surgery, to remove diseased portions of bowel, may be necessary. Diverticulitis will not spread to infect a hip

joint, so you needn't worry.

DEAR DR. GOTT: I'm a 32-yearold female with very dark hair. I recently began shaving my upper lip. My husband says if I don't stop, it will grow back faster and coarser than it already is. Is there any truth to this?

DEAR READER: No. Shaved hair does not grow back coarser or thicker. Because shaved hair is stubbier than normal, it may appear coarser and more abundant, but shaving does not alter the hair follicle (growing portion) itself.

I might add that you have more satisfactory options than shaving your facial hair. Speak with a cosmetologist. Hot wax and electrolysis would probably be more appropriate for you because both methods remove hair, rather than simply cutting it off.

Also if this excess hair growth has developed recently, you should check with your doctor. Glandular disorders, such as a hormone imbalance or adrenal over-production, can cause excessive hair growth.

Bush administration backs tax subsidy

WASHINGTON (AP) - The Bush administration is moving ahead with a controversial plan to allow a new corn-based octane enhancer to qualify for a 60cents-a-gallon tax subsidy for alcohol fuels even though it will cost the Treasury an estimated \$192 million in lost revenue over the next three years.


