Trailing by a point with just 14 seconds left and with an intentional foul called against his Hogs, Richardson headed for the dressing rooms--or at least that's what everybody thought.

Shoot, Snyder fans have seen that strategy before-and it works. Local fans have fond memories of Nolan Richardson when he led the WTC Westerners to the National Junior College championship in 1980.

Against the Longhorns, Arkansas came back for a 103-96 victory in overtime. Those of us who have had the privilege of watching Richardson up close know that-despite the appearance-the Razorback coach was in complete control.

In other basketball notes, we noticed where Gilmer and Atlanta played their district basketball game without any fans. Because of a brawl earlier in the year, the two schools decided to bar all spectators-including the press.

AT&T won approval Jan. 28 from the Federal Communications Commission to offer the discounted Valentine's Day rates on interstate and international calls as well.

HOUSTON (AP) Southeast Texas man has become the first Texan convicted of the new misdemeanor offense of operating a boat while intoxicated.

Harris County Court-at-Law Judge Shelly Hancock sentenced Roy Henry Maghe, 43, on Wednesday to 75 days in the county jail and fined him \$350.

The new law went into effect July 1. Maghe was arrested July 2 after his boat and another vessel collided on the San Jacinto River, injuring 12 people in the boats or skiing behind them. Four people, including Maghe, went to hospitals.







must devise the best way of taking a ninth trick. If declarer had enough time, he could simply play for a 3-2 club split to set up a long trick in that suit. But the opening lead has stolen a tempo. Give up a club, and the defenders knock out declarer's other high heart. Give up another club, and East cashes out, setting the contract two

So declarer must try to make a second trick in spades. There is no 4-3 division of spades that helps declarer, so South must hope that spades are 5-2 or 6-1. The 5-2 division is of course more likely, and if the doubleton spade includes the king or queen, declarer has a chance. And who is more likely to hold a doubleton spade? Of course that player who has already announced a six-card heart suit. Therefore, declarer wins the first heart and cashes four rounds of diamonds ending in the dummy. Then a low spade is played away from the ace. If East plays low, the jack loses to West's king. Subsequently the ace drops East's queen, and the spade 10 is the game-going trick. If East rises with the doubleton spade queen, declarer later plays the jack of spades through West, finessing. Yes, bridge is an easy game ... sometimes.

A Central Committee source said the new platform calls for a president elected by the people instead of the Congress of People's Deputies or another legislative body - a revolutionary transformation for Soviet politics.

That would allow Gorbachev to bypass the entrenched Moscow bureaucracy and take his case directly to the people.

Administrators are expected to ask for funds to initiate the Effective Schools concept in the Snyder school system. Some of the funds will be necessary to send instructors to Effective Schools workshops. The amount of funding necessary has not been determined.

Band Director Walter Reneau is scheduled to present a proposal for new high school band uniforms. Reneau has previously requested the purchase of some 180 uniforms at a cost of \$265 each.

Trustees will also discuss a proposal by Superintendent Dalton Moseley to purchase a bus with federal funds for special education students. The bus would contain a lift, which would meet the needs of a current SISD student who is confined to a wheelchair.

The board will also select a firm to provide the year-end financial audit, which in recent years has been conducted by Joe Morren, CPA from Colorado City. Trustees have expressed their confidence in Morren but decided at an earlier meeting to allow local firms to have an opportunity to make proposals as well.
