The Fort Worth Star-Telegram, in reporting our Jaycees' sponsorship of a contest to put a catchy, eyeball level group of words on the signs they're erecting at the gateways to Haskell, suggested in its Texas Round-Up we say, "Home of The Thang." And the suggestion was captioned "Deathless Phrasé. Notin' 'catchy' about our thang, come to think of it. We haven't caught it, but just for the record, since mid-May, we have 11 definite incidents of death attributed to some mysterious carnivore or carnivores carousing our countryside.

Just received the alumni magazine from my alma mater in which there is a group picture of those who made it back to the campus for the silver anniversary reunion of the Class of 1938. The Pencil Pusher, for some inexplicable reason for which he thanks One Greater than us all, never has had to wear glasses, even though he's been readin' and writin' copy good (other people's) and had this most of his life. Guerilla type warfare, unconventional warfare, the Army and Air Force call it, and it is well-named. It's personalized and dirty, with no holds barred.

New techniques are being developed all the time for the most expeditious marshalling of our forces, land and air, to meet the rising tide of "dirty little wars" on a very localized scale. Last August, thanks to the Bearded One down Havana way, our little exercise became more realistic than ever. In fact, we thought a couple of times the distance between South Carolina and Cuba was going to be erased. We were ready then, and can be again. That's what the Swift Strike operation each summer for the past three, the largest peace-time maneuvers in this nation's history, has been for. That's what we're for, we Reservists, like R. C. Couch, Jr., Terry Diggs, and yours truly . . . join-

ing with the Regulars to provide enough, and on time, should the need ever arise.

While we're "gettin' current" in the Carolinas, Of Faithful Al Hinds, man of many hats, as they would say in the military and who wears them all well, will be runnin' the editorial show as well as overseeing the advertising. As Hazel would say, he's a doozie. And the Pencil Pusher is grateful for his indispensable help.

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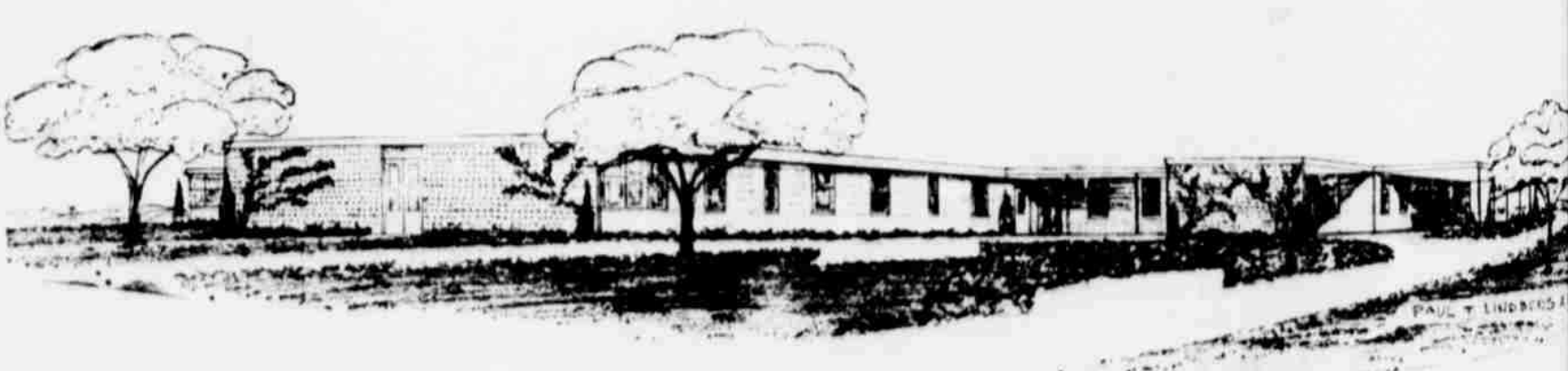

Fire Prevention Project Started By Farm Bureau

A two-point program to support rural area fire prevention has been inaugurated recently by the Haskell County Farm Bureau in cooperation with the Texas Farm Bureau, Clinton H. (Bud) Herren farm bureau director here, has announced.

The principal purpose of the program is to improve fire protection in the rural areas, Herren said.

Under the program, the Farm Bureau has agreed to pay \$45.00 of the \$50.00 registration fee for a volunteer fireman who attends the Fireman's Training School held at Texas A&M each year.

Haskell's volunteer Fire Marshall Earl Correll, who attended the specialist school for fire marshalls on the A&M campus recently, Friday received his reimbursement of \$45 from the Texas Farm Bureau through the local office.

This program will be sponsored annually by the Farm Bureau, along with the payment to any local fire department of \$75 when answering a call outside the city limits to fight a fire involving the property of a Farm Bureau member carrying fire insurance with Farm Bureau on the property involved, Herren explained.

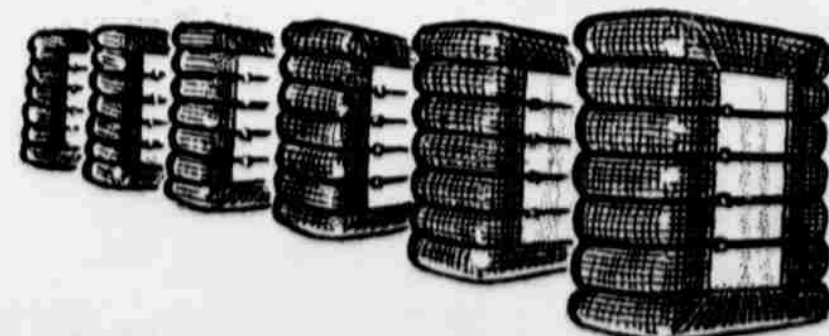

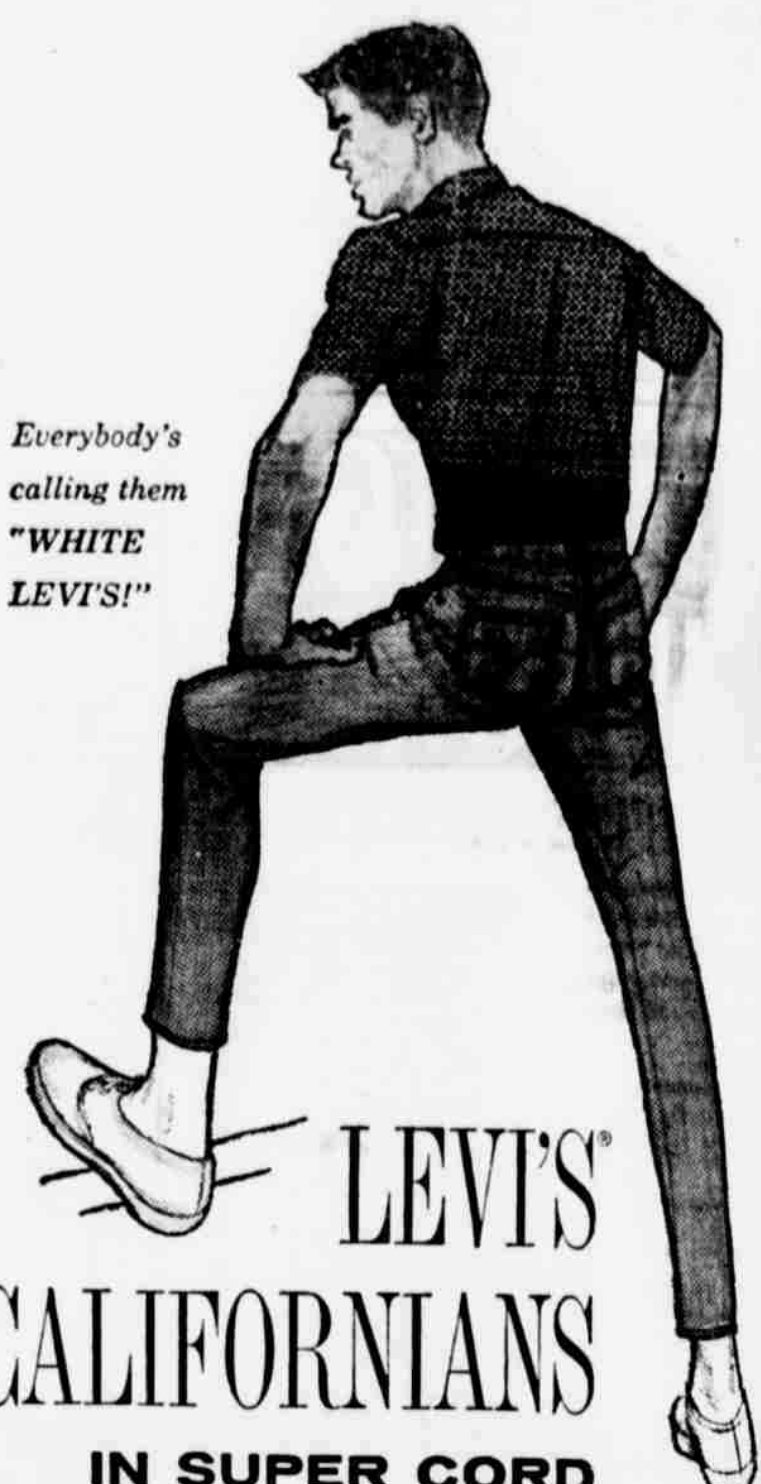

Here is an interesting tid-bit which comes from J. C. Yearly, Jr.

Would you scrape up a pickle jar, an inner tube, a fishing pole and a piece of rope to save a life? There are thousands of farm ponds and reservoirs on watersheds throughout the nation—but hardly any life guards. A "safety post" could be assembled by farmers alongside such ponds and it wouldn't cost a cent.

Here's how to do it: The top of the pickle jar should be nailed to the top of the post. In it put instructions on how to save a drowning person, how to give

artificial respiration and how to contact the nearest sheriff's office, police department or fire department for help. An inner tube, inflated, with 60 or 80 feet of line attached, should be hung on the pole along with an old fishing pole that could be used to extend the inner tube to a drowning person.

A Town's Future... Let's Preserve

A MESSAGE FROM THE MAYOR AND CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF HASKELL

The July 18, 1963, issue of The Haskell Free Press contained an editorial entitled "In the Balance . . . A Town's Future" which condemned in a highly colorful manner the City of Haskell's opposition to the Millers Creek Project. We will not attempt to imitate the exaggerated comparison to "Jarrin John's" days of football glory, but we will set forth unemotionally the facts as we see them.

We certainly share the editor's concern for the future growth of Haskell and recognize the importance of its ability to sell municipal bonds to finance future growth. And the adverse effect financing the Millers Creek Project will have on Haskell's future growth and in particular future sales of its municipal bonds is one of the primary reasons for our opposition to the project.

Let's look at the facts. In terms of cost of water, the Miller Creek Project is undoubtedly one of the most expensive water development projects in the history of Texas. Haskell uses approximately 125 million gallons of water annually. If the Miller Creek Project goes through, Haskell would pay the North Central Texas Municipal Water Authority \$63,000 per year for this amount of water, or slightly more than 50c per 1,000 gallons. In addition, Haskell citizens would pay the NCTMWA an additional \$60,000 or approximately 48c per 1,000 gallons annually in taxes. In other words, water from Millers Creek would cost the citizens of Haskell 98c per 1,000 gallons. These are not our figures but those of the supporters of the Millers Creek Project. They are taken from an advertisement placed in the March 15, 1963 issue of this newspaper by the project's supporters.

Because of the tremendous cost of Millers Creek Water, no private bond purchaser will buy the Millers Creek Project bonds, even though they are backed not only by water revenues but by taxes as well. These bonds are so clearly unmarketable the NCTMWA does not even plan to try to sell them in normal bond marketing channels, but will seek to prevail upon the Texas Water Development Board to buy them instead.

Contrast this tremendous cost of the Millers Creek Project with the Lake Stamford Project recent-

ly approved by the voters of Haskell. To bring Lake Stamford to Haskell will require the issue of only \$650,000 in bonds as opposed to the \$3.8 million in bonds required for Millers Creek. And this \$650,000 in bonds can be financed entirely out of water revenues through normal bond marketing channels. The total cost to Haskell citizens of the Lake Stamford Project is only 10c per 1,000 gallons rather than the 98c per 1,000 gallons Millers Creek Project would cost.

The supporters of the Millers Creek Project strongly criticized the Lake Stamford Project because bonds will be financed entirely by water revenues rather than increasing property taxes on Haskell citizens as the Millers Creek Project would require.

The future growth of Haskell will require that new business be attracted to our town, and to do this we will have to maintain a favorable tax climate in which business can grow and prosper. A combined water and revenue bond financed project which places such a tremendous and disproportionate burden on business will not provide a favorable tax climate. We reject this "socialist" philosophy and pledge ourselves to continue to finance development out of water revenues as long as it is feasible to do so.

We leave it to the good judgment of the citizens of Haskell whether the future growth of Haskell can best be served by an adequate water supply reasonably financed out of water revenues or one which will cost Haskell citizens three times as much and impose an astronomical burden on both our water revenues and our available tax resources.

Our town's future is in the balance. And reason and common sense clearly tips the scale in favor of the Lake Stamford Project. Your Mayor and City Council believe it would be little short of disastrous to engage Haskell's future to the extent that the Millers Creek Project would require. And it is with this conviction that we will continue to oppose implementation of the Millers Creek Project as long as we have the opportunity of serving the voters of Haskell.

PUBLIC NOTICE CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER FOUR ON THE BALLOT

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 5, 1964.
SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 10 proposing an amendment to Section 49-b, Article III of the Constitution of Texas so as to authorize an increase in the total amount of bonds or obligations that may be issued by the Veterans Land Board in Three Hundred Fifty Million Dollars (\$350,000,000.00) providing for the issuance of such bonds or obligations and the conditions relating thereto and the use of the Veterans Land Fund and providing for an election and the issuance of a proclamation therefor.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:
Section 1. That Section 49-b, Article III of the Constitution of Texas, be amended so as to read as follows:
"Section 49-b. The voters of prior Amendments to this Constitution there has been created a governmental agency of the State of Texas performing governmental duties which has been designated the Veterans Land Board. Said Board shall continue to function for the purposes specified in all of the prior Constitutional Amendments except as modified herein. Said Board shall be composed of the Commissioner of the General Land Office and two (2) citizens of the State of Texas, one of whom shall be well versed in veterans' affairs and one (1) of whom shall be well versed in finance. One (1) such citizen member shall be appointed by the Governor for the Governor to serve for a term of four (4) years, but the members appointed on said Board on the date of adoption hereof shall complete the terms in which they were appointed. In the event of the resignation or death of any such citizen member, the Governor shall appoint a replacement to serve for the unexpired portion of the term in which the deceased or resigning member had been appointed. The compensation for said citizen members shall be as set by law or may hereafter be fixed by the Legislature, and each shall make bond in such amount as is now or may hereafter be prescribed by the Legislature.

"The Commissioner of the General Land Office shall act as Chairman of said Board and shall be the administrator of the Veterans Land Program under such terms and restrictions as are now or may hereafter be provided by law. In the absence or illness of said Commissioner, the Chief Clerk of the General Land Office shall be the Acting Chairman of said Board with the same duties and powers that said Commissioner would have if present.

"The Veterans Land Board may provide for, issue and sell not to exceed Three Hundred Fifty Million Dollars (\$350,000,000.00) in bonds or obligations of the State of Texas for the purpose of creating a fund to be known as the Veterans Land Fund, Two Hundred Million Dollars (\$200,000,000.00) of which have heretofore been issued and sold. Such bonds or obligations shall be sold for not less than par value and accrued interest shall be issued in such form, denominations, and upon such terms as are now or may hereafter be provided by law; shall be issued and sold at such places, and in such installments as may be determined by said Board; and shall bear a rate of interest as may be fixed by said Board but the weighted average annual interest rate, as that phrase is commonly and ordinarily used and understood in the financial and bond market, of all the bonds issued and sold in any installment of any bonds may not exceed four and one-half percent (4½%). All bonds or obligations issued and sold hereunder shall, after

approval, be made available and distributed to the general obligation of the State of Texas under the Constitution of Texas and all bonds heretofore issued and sold by said Board shall be general obligations of the State of Texas. In order to prevent default in the payment of principal or interest on any such bonds the Legislature shall appropriate a sufficient amount to pay the same.

"In the sale of any such bonds or obligations, a professional right of purchase shall be given to the municipalities of the various Teacher Retirement Funds, the Permanent University Funds, and the Permanent School Funds.

"Said Veterans Land Board shall consist of any lands heretofore or hereafter purchased by said Board, until the same grow thereby, together with any interest and penalties due hereon, and shall be subject to the provisions of the Constitution of this State, and of any laws, rules, and regulations that may be enacted by the Legislature from time to time, and of any laws, rules, and regulations that may be enacted by the Legislature from time to time, and of any laws, rules, and regulations that may be enacted by the Legislature from time to time, and of any laws, rules, and regulations that may be enacted by the Legislature from time to time.

"When a Division of said Fund (each Division consisting of the moneys attributable to the bonds issued and sold pursuant to a single Constitutional authorization and the moneys purchased therewith) contains sufficient moneys to retire all of the bonds secured by such Division which bonds shall be set aside and remain

principal and the interest thereon, together with the expenses hereof, of any other bonds heretofore or hereafter issued and sold by said Board. Such use shall be made for the duration and direction of said Board, but there may be such use of any such moneys contrary to the rights of any holder of any of the bonds issued and sold by said Board or relative of any contract in which said Board is a party.

"The Veterans Land Fund shall be used by said Board for the purpose of purchasing lands situated in the State of Texas owned by the United States or any governmental agency thereof, owned by the Texas Public System or any other governmental agency of the State of Texas, or owned by any person, firm, or corporation. All lands thus purchased shall be acquired at the lowest price obtainable to be paid for in cash and shall be a part of said Fund. Such lands heretofore or hereafter purchased and comprising a part of said Fund are hereby declared to be held for a governmental purpose, although the individual purchasers thereof shall be subject to taxation to the same extent and in the same manner as are purchasers of lands not held for a governmental purpose.

"All moneys comprising a part of said Fund not expended for the purposes herein provided shall be deposited in the State Treasury and shall be available for the purchase of any such bonds or obligations of the State of Texas as may be hereafter provided by law, and the proceeds of any such bonds or obligations shall be deposited to the credit of the Veterans Land Fund. All moneys becoming a part of said Fund thereafter shall likewise be deposited to the credit of the Veterans Land Fund.

"The bonds of the Veterans Land Fund shall be sold by said Board in such quantities, at such terms, and under such rules and regulations as are now or may hereafter be provided by law in Texas veterans' affairs and shall be subject to the provisions of the Constitution of this State, and of any laws, rules, and regulations that may be enacted by the Legislature from time to time, and of any laws, rules, and regulations that may be enacted by the Legislature from time to time.

"The Veterans Land Fund shall be used by said Board for the purpose of purchasing lands situated in the State of Texas owned by the United States or any governmental agency thereof, owned by the Texas Public System or any other governmental agency of the State of Texas, or owned by any person, firm, or corporation. All lands thus purchased shall be acquired at the lowest price obtainable to be paid for in cash and shall be a part of said Fund. Such lands heretofore or hereafter purchased and comprising a part of said Fund are hereby declared to be held for a governmental purpose, although the individual purchasers thereof shall be subject to taxation to the same extent and in the same manner as are purchasers of lands not held for a governmental purpose.

"All moneys attributable to the bonds issued and sold pursuant to the Constitutional Amendment adopted on November 6, 1946, shall be credited to said Veterans Land Fund and may be used for the purpose of purchasing additional bonds, to be sold by said Board on or after December 1, 1963; provided, however, that no such moneys as may be necessary to pay interest on such bonds shall be set aside for that purpose. After December 1, 1965, all moneys attributable to such bonds shall be set aside for the retirement

of such bonds.

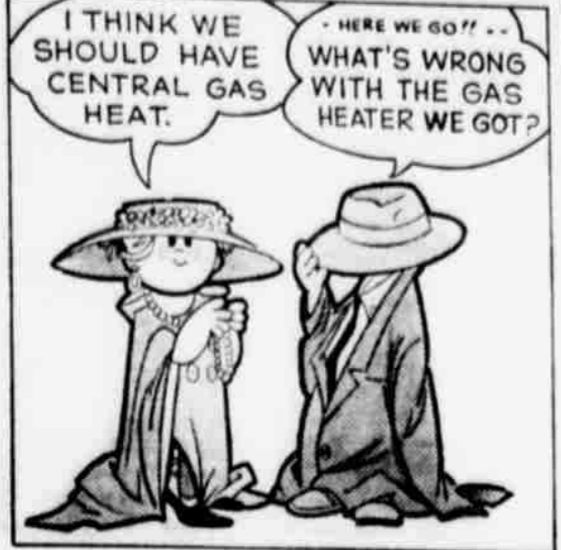
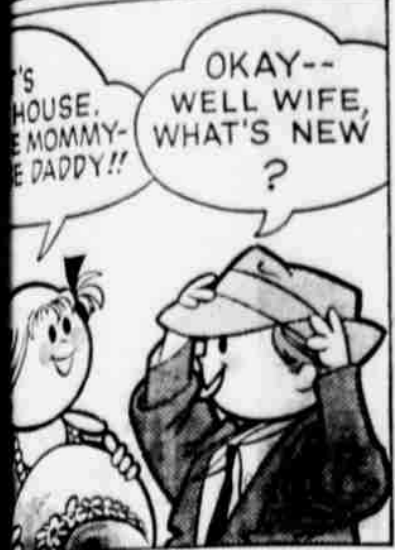
