Indians Constructing Homes 'Fair-Grounds.''

San Diego, Calif., May-The 'exhibits'' have begun to arrive at the Panama California Exposition, the first installment in the form of six Indians from the San Ildefonso pueblo in New Mexico, who will be stationed on the "Painted Desert", the spectacular exhibit of the Santa Fe Railway.

These "exhibits" are not purely ornamental. On the contrary, all six Indians, led by their chief, Julian Martinez, who is distinguished by a bright beaded waistcoat and extra long braids of hair tipped with beaver skin, were put to work immediately preparing the dobe for the long row of dwellings and the stockade to surround the reservation.
