TASP test signup due at college

Students planning to take the TASP test at Western Texas College on Sept. 22 must register by Friday, school officials note.

Application forms are available in the counseling office at the Student Center.

There is a \$24 fee for TASP testing whether the student is taking all or part of the test.

Students who received three semester hours of credit prior to the 1989 fall semester are exempt from the TASP test. Students enrolled in selected certificate programs rather than degree programs are also exempt. All other students are required to take the TASP test before attaining 15 college credit hours. Students who have attained 15 semester hours of college credit and have not yet taken the TASP are allowed to take only developmental classes.

Non-exempted students are required to pass all three sections of the TASP test before they can enroll in credit courses at the junior level. Students who fail one or more sections of the test are required to be continuously enrolled in those developmental areas until all sections of the test (see TASP, page 8)

Thomas is in good shape to meet the water demands for Snyder, however, Pickle says that if the lake doesn't catch another 4-6 feet by late September or early October the last chance for any substantial rain until spring, noted Pickle - that an alternative supplementary water supply for Odessa will be used.

The water for the Odessa-Midland area comes primarily from Lake Spence. Water from Spence is diluted with some from estimated at \$175,000.

The CRMWD has purchased area's water supply. Medrano found guilty

Second time in three months

For the second time in three months, a 132nd District Court jury has found a 42-year-old Snyder man guilty.

Tuesday afternoon, a 5-man and 7-woman jury found Raymond Medrano Jr. guilty of aggravated assault. Medrano, who is serving a life sentence in the Texas Department of Criminal Justice,

was being tried for the Sept. 9, 1989 stabbing of Ralph Torres Jr. The trial began Monday morning in Judge Gene Dulaney's court with the selection of jurors. Testimony began Monday afternoon. At 2:25 p.m. Tuesday, jurors began their deliberations and returned with the guilty verdict at 3:35 p.m. The punishment phase of the trial started at 4:35 p.m. Tuesday and

was continuing through the noon hour today. Assistant District Attorney Dana Cooley prosecuted the case.

The defense attorney was Mark Piland of Colorado City. On May 23, another 132nd District Court jury found Medrano guilty of attempted capital murder and aggravated robbery. Medrano was assessed a \$10,000 fine and life in prison — the maximum penalty.

In this case, Medrano was found guilty of the Sept. 9 stabbing and robbery of Gilberto Jimenez.

Q-Is there 30-day waiting period after a divorce before a party can remarry, and if so, what are the legal rights of the exspouse if the other party remarries before the 30 days?

A-There is a 30-day waiting period. If a person remarries before the waiting period is over, they are in violation of the Texas Bigamy Statute and the marriage is not valid by law. However, if the divorce is not appealed, a judge may rule the marriage valid. The ex-spouse does not have any extra legal rights that pertain to this situation.

Agronomist escapes from Kuwait danger

SAN DIEGO, Calif. (AP) pretty well" and keeping a low profile, said a 57-year-old Houston agronomist who escaped from Kuwait on Tuesday.

Ed Daly recounted his all-day journey to freedom after arriving in Saudi Arabia and told of Americans being rounded up by Iraqi soldiers.

'They cleared the hotels right away," Ed Daly told a San Diego Tribune reporter in Dhahran, Saudi Arabia.

Daly said he knew of at least two American colleagues who were rounded up by Iraqis.

Daly had been in Kuwait City less than two months when Iraqi forces invaded the city Aug. 2. He said he fled Kuwait in a caravan of cars early Tuesday and that the vehicles were shot at numerous times by Iraqi

"I was afraid because I was told they (Iraq) were told to shoot to kill," Daly said.

The caravan arrived at the Saudi border six hours later and was greeted by cheers.

Daly was dressed in traditional flowing white Arabic robes when he arrived at Le Meridien Gulf Hotel in Dhahran. He said the Iraqis didn't realize he was an American.

"I'm sort of in a daze," he said. Thousands of Americans remain in Kuwait and Iraqi President Saddam Hussein says Americans are now being placed near strategic targets that the U.S. military would likely attack in the event of armed conflict.

Several Americans trapped in following the invasion he roamed the Middle East are "surviving the areas of Kuwait City with which he was familiar and concentrated on eluding Iraqi troops. He said he didn't have the opportunity to keep track of most other Americans.

"There's water in most of the town, but food is getting very difficult," Daly said.

He said he thinks there is sporadic Kuwaiti resistance to the occupation because gunfire could be heard every night in the late hours.

Daly said Iraqi soldiers continue to loot homes and stores. He also said anti-American propaganda drones the airwaves.

"The propaganda is horrendous," he said. "Every other home safely too."

"I really can't wait to get back to my family and friends," Daly told The Post. "I feel bad about the others I left behind, but I did what I had to do.



Baptist author: I am a 'victim'

FORT WORTH, Texas (AP) — liberal side." A Baptist professor says he won't lose hope that his 100-year history of the Southern Baptist Sunday School Board will be published some day, although for now he's lost his contract to write

the panel's history.
Trustees of the Sunday School Board awarded Leon McBeth an \$18,000 commission to write the book two years ago, but canceled its publication last week and ordered all but one copy of the 400-page manuscript shredded, apparently because of criticism from fundamentalists.

The book was to be published by Broadman Press, the Sunday School Board's publishing arm. "I feel as though I have suf-

fered a literary abortion and for no good cause," McBeth told the Fort Worth Star-Telegram.

McBeth has been a professor of church history at Southwestern ed trustees and spent hours Baptist Theological Seminary in reviewing board minutes and ar-Fort Worth for 30 years. He has chives of the Sunday School written eight other books, including a major Southern Baptist

history in 1987. One fundamentalist trustee, Dr. Larry Holly of Beaumont,

An outspoken Baptist fundamentalist, Holly has written several articles for the "Southern Baptist Advocate," a fundamentalist journal.

He said McBeth reached conclusions without interviewing current trustees about recent controversies.

"This is not book-burning or censorship," Holly said. "It is correction of serious errors." One such controversy, McBeth

said, was his treatment of a school board trustees meeting last year in which Holly tried to have the current board president fired. Holly's motion was tabled.

"There was nothing wrong with the manuscript," McBeth said. "I just got caught in the crossfire of a power struggle at the board."

Study finds value in trail in valley

feasibility study says a 200-mile and heritage sites," he said. trail linking key cultural and historical attractions from Brownsville to Laredo would be a boon for tourism in the Rio Grande Valley.

With the aid of a \$160,000 Meadows Foundation grant, historians have begun a survey of significant sites — Spanish missions, forts and historic buildings along the proposed trail, said Mario Sanchez, an architect with the Texas Historical Commis-

Sanchez said a Lower Rio Grande Heritage Trail would include "everything to illustrate the exploration of the area by the Spaniards in the mid-18th century, the Civil War, and the ranching heritage and agricultural development" of the region along the U.S.-Mexico border.

He called the proposal a "oneof-a-kind project, and the first and only historical and cultural corridor that would be shared by the two countries."

The route eventually could rival Virginia's Independence Trail and the restored colonial town of Williamsburg, Va., Sanchez said.

"The object would be to restore some of the historical structures,

The state is taking inventory of the Rio Grande route, he said. "We are now surveying places and noting events of outstanding importance to the region." About 200 locations have been designated as historic sites.

Arab-American organizations and leaders who related these incidents said they are symptomatic of anti-Arab actions that occur whenever tensions rise in the Middle East.


"There's obviously a potential for tarring all Arabs with one brush," said Ann Joyce of the

American-Arab Affairs Council. A prominent Arab-American. Alex Odeh, was killed by a letter bomb in his Santa Ana, Calif., office after the 1985 terrorist attack on the Achille Lauro. 1986. This time, however, with the United States and Iraq poised for war, Arab-Americans fear the backlash could be far more

"The potential (for trouble) may be far worse in this case than anything we've ever seen," said Albert Mokhiber of the Arab-American Anti-Discrimination Committee. "The entire Arab community is going to be vilified."

He and other Arab-American leaders say negative images of Arabs are linking the 2.5 million Americans of Arab descent to Iraq and Saddam Hussein. Only 150,000 Arab-Americans are of Iraqi origin, and many of those are refugees from persecution in their homeland.





Maximizing the play



West's best opening lead would be a club, but South put up a bit of a smokescreen when he bid two clubs on three small cards, on his way to four hearts. So West led a heart. That positioned declarer to maximize the play. He played dummy's heart 10, and East was wise not to cover with the king. South overtook with the jack anyway and led the 10 of diamonds. West covered with the king, and dummy's ace won. Next came the seven of hearts. East played low and so did declarer. That left the lead in dummy. A low diamond was played; East could not resist playing the nine, and declarer noticed the six from West as he ruffed.

Declarer now played ace of hearts, collecting East's king. He followed with a spade to dummy's king. Remembering that six of diamonds from West, declarer played West to have only the eight-spot left. So he led the diamond jack from dummy. East covered with the queen, declarer ruffed, and West followed obligingly with the eight. Declarer could now return to dummy with the club ace and cash the seven and three of diamonds to take 12 tricks.

It's hard to fault West for choosing a trump lead based on this bidding, but it's worth noting that leading trumps on defense just because there's nothnon-profit organization, society ing better to do is usually a losing strategy.

NEW YORK (AP) - While everyone else is preparing for next week's U.S. Open, Mats Wilander is keeping his eye on next May's French champion-

"Six months from now I want to be top 20, top 10," said Wilander, who in 1988 won three of the four Grand Slam tournaments and was ranked No. 1 in the world. "If that doesn't happen, then I've got to think about things

"The middle of next year, after the French Open, after the claycourt season, that's when I've got to be up there. And if I'm not there then, then I have to sit down and (ask myself), 'Do I enjoy not being there?""

The Swedish right-hander, who took a five-month sabbatical from the sport earlier this year, is currently ranked 58th in the world and falling fast. On Tuesday, Wilander fell to Todd Martin, a Northwestern University student, 0-6, 6-4, 7-5 in an opening round match at the WCT Tournament of Champions.

"I'm worrying about my own game so much I don't enough have space in my mind to worry about the big points," Wilander said. "I'm trying to keep the ball in play.'

Stanford president nips expansion talk

WALNUT CREEK, Calif. (AP) - Expansion of the Pac-10 Conference seems to be just about a dead issue — for the time being at least.

Unanimous approval of conference presidents is required for expansion, and at least one Stanford president Donald Kennedy - has not kept secret his opposition to an expansion plan.

And after discussing the possibility of expanding the conference at two meetings last month, the top officers of the schools decided Tuesday that the conference is not prepared to expand its current membership.

"After studying the data developed by the conference's directors, senior women administrators and faculty representatives, the chief executive officers determined it was not in the Pac-10's best interests to actively pursue expansion at this time," commissioner Tom Hansen said in a news release issued Tuesday.

"There is opposition generically to expansion, not to any institution which may have been mentioned, and addition of a member requires a unanimous vote of all 10 members of the conference," Hansen said.

The presidents and chancellors of the Pac-10 met Tuesday by conference call to review information submitted by athletic administrators in meetings earlier this month.

The message Tuesday "was pretty clear-cut," said conference assistant commissioner Jim Muldoon, adding that university presidents "pretty much decided that the Pac-10 is not ready to expand at this time."

Stanford athletic director Andy Geiger said the idea of two sixteam divisions is out "because the conference has already decided it's against a 12th (regularseason) game" to determine a conference champion.

During this month's meetings, which were prompted by announced and rumored changes in the memberships of other athletic conferences, Hansen met with Texas athletic director DeLoss Dodds to discuss the possibility of Texas and Texas A&M joining the conference.

The conference expanded from ight to 10 schools in 1978, when Arizona and Arizona State were admitted.







'We could have an economic crisis of calamitous proportions especially if a shooting war starts in the gulf," says I.Z. Bhatty, a member of an economic think tank in New Delhi. "Oil is a product which has the most linkages with the rest of the economy.

Many of these nations have little or no capacity for refining crude oil, so they were ready buyers of petroleum products from Kuwait, which had the most advanced refineries in the gulf.





DEAR DR. GOTT: I'm a 57-yearold male in reasonably good health. Prior to 1987, I exercised regularly, jogging five to seven miles a week. Now other demands have taken priority, and exercise is not regular. While trying to jog recently, I felt a spasm in the middle of my chest that has repeated on many occasions. Then I began having indigestion at night. My doctor did an EKG, brief exam and drew blood. He says it is not my heart. What could be the cause of the spasm and indigestion?

DEAR READER: You could be experiencing angina, cardiac-muscle spasm from inadequate oxygen supply to the heart, caused by arteriosclerotic plaque in your coronary arteries. I am not as confident as your doctor is that your "indigestion" comes from other sources. An examination, resting cardiogram and blood tests are not enough, in my opinion, to reach that conclusion.

First of all, you are a middle-aged male. In our society, this places you at risk for heart disease. This risk is accentuated if you are diabetic, overweight, sedentary, a smoker, have a high cholesterol level or a family history of heart disease.

Second, coronary artery disease may not be evident on a standard cardiogram, taken when you are lying down. In my view, you need a stress test, during which you have a cardiogram while exercising. Such a test may give unequivocal evidence of oxygen deficiency while your heart is working harder. You should insist on a stress test.

Third, if you are having anginal pain while jogging or at night, you are in definite danger of a heart attack. The angina may be a warning you should not ignore. Stop exercising until the doctor tests you further and, if necessary, prescribes medicines, such as nitrates.

I hope your doctor is correct and that your stress test is normal. If so, ed." you'll want to investigate your symptoms by directing attention to your intestinal tract. The pain of gastritis, peptic ulcer and acid reflux can mimic angina. Therefore, an upper gastrointestinal X-ray (GI series) may be in order. Or your doctor may choose to refer you to a gastroenterologist for endoscopy, during which the specialist examines your stomach (and portions of the small intestine) with a

In any case, you need a rational and coordinated approach to your symptoms. If your doctor seems unwilling to go the course, ask for a referral to a colleague for a second opinion.
