Kidnapping charge filed Monday against local man

A 36-year-old Snyder man was arrested Monday night and charged with the aggravated kidnapping of his ex-wife.

Moody Thomason of Route 2, Snyder, was arrested by Scurry County sheriff deputies Kerry Fritz and Darren Jackson about 7 p.m. near the man's home on the Colorado City highway.

Officers said Thomason arrived at his former wife's place of employment armed with a pistol and forced her to leave with him. He drove her to the country where she said Thomason made demands about her moving back into his house.

The victim, LouAnn Thomason, was not harmed, and Thomason later returned her to her car where she was released. Mrs. Thomason called police to report the incident about 1:15 p.m. Monday. City police received two other calls, one at 4:34 p.m. and 5:32 p.m., asking for an escort to her residence and a close patrol. Thomason was taken to Justice of the Peace Dan Callaway, who

set bond at \$15,000. He remains in the Scurry County jail. On May 22, Thomason was taken to Cogdell Hospital, suffering from four gunshot wounds sustained at his ex-wife's home.

A Scurry County grand jury on June 4 failed to indict LouAnn Thomason for aggravated assault in the shooting incident, which occurred at 2306 30th St.

State charges dropped against former local; federal court trial set

have "dropped, for now" 13 charges filed last fall against Johonnas J. Eicke, a 36-year-old former Snyder man.

However, a Sept. 5 trial date has been set in federal district court in Springfield, Ill., for Eicke who is charged with two federal counts of conspiring to aid and abet the disappearance

of Bridget Jones. Jones, Eicke's common-law wife, was free on bond in March. 1987 when she jumped bond. Jones had been convicted on one count of conspiracy, four counts of wire fraud and one count of

obstruction of justice. Jones was charged with what federal authorities say was an attempt to move some \$10 million out of the country in a scheme to avoid paying federal taxes.

Both Jones and Eicke were scheduled to be tried starting Sept. 5, but an attorney in the U.S. Attorney's office in Spr-

Authorities in North Carolina ingfield, Ill., said Eicke is undergoing a competency examination and likely would not be ready to begin his trial by Sept. 5.

The U.S. attorney said that Eicke has a court-appointed at-torney and that Eicke is being tested to see if the defendant is able to understand the proceedings and to assist in his defense. Eicke is undergoing the tests in a federal correctional and medical facility in Springfield, Mo. Jones is being held in Chicago.

The 13 state indictments in North Carolina included multiple land fraud charges. When arrested on Oct. 13, 1989, Eicke was using the name David Matthew Ben-Israel. The arrest came after Eicke and other defendants attempted to acquire a \$4 million Hendersonville, N.C., estate with fraudulent bank drafts.

Western Co., city reps slate meeting

The city advised The Western Company in an Aug. 15 letter that it will disconnect sewer service on the final day of this month for alleged violations of the industrial waste discharge ordinance. Snyder officials made the decision after reviewing lab reports which they believe trace the illegal disposal of petroleum wastes into the sewer system to the company.

Thursday's meeting will be held at City Hall at 9 a.m.

Expected to attend from Snyder are an engineer from Parkhill, Smith and Cooper of Lubbock, a representative of the Texas Water Commission, representatives from the city water department, the city manager and city attorney.

The letter to The Western Company advised that reconnection could be considered only after a

City of Snyder representatives method of pretreating and will meet with The Western Com- monitoring is installed at the expense of the company and approved by the City, the Texas Water Commission and the Environmental Protection Agency.

However, city officials have said that an extension might be granted if the city has a signed document which includes a deadline for completion of such improvements and a statement that The Western Company would not violate the city waste discharge ordinance again.

The city had a chemical analysis conducted of petroleumbased waste products which were apparently illegally dumped into the sewer system on May 4 and June 7. Following the latter incident, the city sent samples to Enreco Laborotories in Amarillo for a detailed analysis. The samples included ones taken from the sewer plant and the Western Company manhole. An analysis report from Enreco read in part, "...this evidence points to a strong conclusion that the

SISD enrollment down some; holds at other county schools

District's first-day enrollment 359 at Stanfield. figures showed a slight drop in students from last year, although in Pre-K, 319 in kindergarten, 271 the early start this year may be a key factor.

First-day enrollment at Ira and Hermleigh ISDs were about the same as last year.

Snyder public schools showed a first-day enrollment of 3,463 on Monday, compared to 1989's opening day of 3,502 - a difference of 39 students.

Last's year, school began on Sept. 5, following the Labor Day weekend, and school officials said that for unexplained reasons, some parents do not enroll their children until after the holiday.

The biggest drop in students is at the pre-K level, where only 76 students enrolled this year in comparison to 104 last year.

A break-down supplied by the district shows 862 students enrolled at the high school, 480 at the junior high, 265 at North Elementary, 373 at Central, 324 at East,

Friends mourn Vaughan who Mother and son are reunited was killed in helicopter crash

EAST TROY, Wis. (AP) — Blues guitarist Stevie Ray Vaughan had beaten drugs and alcohol and fellow musicians said he was playing better than ever when he died in a helicopter crash shortly after a concert. He

Four others died early Monday after Vaughan and members of guitarist Eric Clapton's entourage took off for Chicago in dense fog.

Vaughan, a two-time Grammy winner known for his rocking Texas roadhouse blues style, had shared the bill Sunday night with Clapton and guitarist Robert

"His death is particularly sad, given that he'd cleaned up and was playing the best music of his life." said Jeff Peterson of the "Austin City Limits" TV program on which the Texan had ap-

Vaughan in the mid-1980s gained popularity with his guitar jamming and blues sound reminiscent of music legends B.B. King, Muddy Waters and Albert King.

"Stevie Ray Vaughan was like The Fabulous Thunderbirds, was one of my children," said B.B. at the weekend concert. King. "The loss is a great loss for beginning to be appreciated and develop his potential."

"This might sound funny, but fortunately I collapsed," Vaughan told The Associated Press last fall.

"In a sense, I knew this thing was coming, I knew I couldn't keep going the way it was. I had a nervous breakdown. I had not been able to obtain any drugs for about two weeks, but the drinking was still going on. If I was awake I was guzzling something."

At the time of his death, Vaughan was looking forward to the release of an album in September recorded with his older brother, Jimmie, said Andy Schwartz, a spokesman for Epic Records in New York, which owns Vaughan's label.

"He was one musician who never wanted to stop and I think he wanted to go on 'til he couldn't stand on stage anymore," Schwartz said.

Vaughan and hs band Double Trouble produced the platinum album "Couldn't Stand the Weather" in 1984. He won a Grammy Award that year for best traditional blues recording for the song "Texas Flood."

This year, he won a Grammy for the album "In Step," which referred to the "12 Steps" program used by recovering alcoholics.

DALLAS (AP) - A Dallas woman says she never gave up hope that she would be reunited with her young son, but she thought the reunion would be years away.

Charlsey Smith got her wish early when police arrested her ex-husband near Corpus Christi and returned the couple's 6-year-old son, Keller, to his mother on Monday.

"I always knew I'd see him again," Mrs. Smith said. "But I figured it might be when he was 22 and tried to track me down.

Keller disappeared in 1988 after a bitter custody dispute between Mrs. Smith and her exhusband, Stephen Linn Smith. Mrs. Smith was granted custody of Keller and his younger sister, Brecca. Smith was granted monthly visitation

In early February 1988, Smith complained that his ex-wife was violating the custody agreement. On Feb. 21, Smith picked up Keller for a weekend visit and never returned.

That started a two-year manhunt involving police, attorneys and private investigators. It

ended with a routine traffic stop near Corpus Christi, where police said they discovered Smith in a stolen car headed to Mexico.

Dallas County Sheriffs Department investigator Gary Lachman said Smith assumed the identity of a dead man in Vancouver, British Columbia. When he was arrested, he had a passport in the name of Leonard Newbuhr.

Smith called his former father-in-law from Corpus Christi to arrange for Keller's return.

"The boy didn't seem to be mistreated, at least not physically, anyway," said Capt. William Edge of the Nueces County Sheriffs Department.

Smith is expected to be returned to Dallas Thursday on charges of interference with child custody and hindering a secured creditor, both third-degree felonies.

Assistant District Attorney William T. Whisenhunt said Smith cleaned out the couple's bank accounts from their business, sold their car and charged \$50,000 on their American Express

Iraq says Kuwait is '19th province'

Baghdad moved today to tighten its grip on Kuwait by declaring it a 19th province, and an American civilian died in Iraq, apparently one of 63 Americans who were rounded up for use as human shields against attack.

U.S. Navy warships enforcing the U.N. embargo against Iraq stopped two cargo ships and crewmen boarded one in the Gulf of Aqaba before allowing them to proceed to Jordan, shipping sources said today.

It was believed to be the first

time a ship was boarded and inspected by the U.S. Navy since the embargo began shortly after Iraq invaded Kuwait Aug. 2.

DEAR DR. GOTT: I was diagnosed with bleeding gastric ulcers eight months ago, and I am currently taking Zantac tablets. You have recommended 1,500 milligrams calcium and 250 IU of vitamin D daily to help prevent osteoporosis in post-menopausal women. I've also read articles stating that milk is no longer routinely given as part of ulcer therapy because the calcium content of milk stimulates the stomach to produce acid. Do calcium supplements have the same acid-stimulating effect as calcium in milk?

DEAR READER: Milk, like any food, stimulates the production of gastric acid. This is a reflex that Nature has provided to help us digest what we eat. The increased stomach acid is not caused by milk calcium, a mineral - nor is it caused by calcium supplements. In fact, calcium-containing compounds, such as TUMS are frequently used to treat the consequences of excess gastric acid. Therefore, calcium/vitamin D supplements will not worsen your ulcers.

Years ago, before the discovery of Zantac (and similar medicines) that reduce the production of stomach acid, doctors had pitifully few ways to treat peptic disease - so they were forced to use milk and cream combinations. These dairy products are good buffers, meaning they readily absorb or neutralize acid, despite a paradoxical tendency to stimulate acid production at the same time.

Subsequently, synthetic buffers (antacids) were developed and performed the same function better than milk and cream, without the calories and cholesterol. Today, with H2 blockers (histamine blockers, of which Zantac is an example), the treatment of bleeding peptic ulcers is so satisfactory that surgery - once

required in such cases — is a rarity. H2 blockers can safely be taken with calcium supplements, which are often recommended for women with osteoporosis. DEAR DR. GOTT: I'm a 22-yearold active female with cellulite on the backs of my thighs. What is the quickest and most effective way to make it

DEAR READER: Cellulite, a nonmedical term, refers to fat deposits commonly seen on legs, thighs and buttocks. To a large degree, the distribution and extent of fat on the body is genetically governed: Some people have fatty thighs and buttocks (pear shape), whereas other people inherit a tendency to form abdominal adipose tissue (apple shape).

If you are overweight, you could reduce the size of your thighs by dieting. With appropriate calorie restriction, in conjunction with a sensible exercise program, you'll lose body fat all over, thighs included.

If, on the other hand, your thighs are large and out of proportion to the rest of you, you may wish to consider plastic surgery to get rid of cellulite. Liposuction, a technique by which specialists remove unwanted subcutaneous fat by a suction device, may be an option to consider. This method is quick and safe, although expensive. Ask your doctor to refer you to a plastic surgeon for further advice

The various devices and skin preparations that are often advertised for the treatment of cellulite are totally ineffective for this purpose. Therefore, in my opinion, your best bet would be to try dieting, followed by liposuction, if necessary.

The change in filing regulations was approved by Congress last year, but one member, Rep. Joe Kolter, D-Pa., is already trying to repeal it with legislation introduced last May.

"We think it's an unnecessary burden on physicians," said Bob Powers, Kolter's senior legislative assistant.

"We've gotten a lot of mail from Medicare recipients who are insulted" because they feel the provision implies that they can't fill out the forms themselves, Powers said. "They want to do it themselves," usually because they can do it faster than a physician's office staff

Physicians will have up to a year to file claims, less than half the time now allowed. Failure to file would mean \$1,000 fine for each violation.

Although most don't foresee extraordinary filing delays, Boyle said patients who now submit their forms promptly could be disappointed that their physician takes longer.

Physicians will not be allowed to charge Medicare patients for preparing and filing claim forms. But, as is the case now, doctors can require payment in full from the patient at the time of service.

Dr. Norton J. Greenberger, president of the American College of Physicians, the largest professional organization of internists, said the change has a 'desirable goal" of easing the paperwork burden on patients. It also will encourage electronic billing and could speed payments, he said.

But some physicians see the change as "further intrusion by the government into their office

practices," he said. Initially at least, the government will accept a bill filed by a Medicare patient. When the beneficiary is paid, Medicare officials will inform him or her that the physician is supposed to file claims, said Gagel, an official of the Department of Health and Human Services.
