Trapper? Yes? No? Here Are The Issues

> With the day of decision looming Saturday on the issue of biring a full-time trapper to control predatory animals in this area. Haskell County citizens in strength have been vigorously laying the rails ever which to run two contrasting trains of thought to every junction in the county. And there has been plenty of conversational fuel with which to fire all the boilers

As Saturday's election nears, County Judge Jim Aivis has assued a strong plea for a heavy and representative vote, "that it may be a true reflection of the opinion of the people on this

The County Judge hastened to explain Wednesday that, contrary to some of the conversation floating around, the hiring of a trapper will not impose any additional burden on Haskell Counly texpayers.

In early spring, the County Commissioners' Court voted to spend a total of \$2700 as its share, joining with the state and federal Predatory Animal Control Authority to employ a trapper to start work in Haskell County on June 1. The \$2700 represents approximately a third of the annual salary of a full-time trapper, the other two thirds to be borne equally by the state and federal governments. There has not been a full time trapper in this terr-The court took this action after receiving a deluge of reports

from farmers and ranchers in widely scattered sections of the county about coyotes and bobcats constituting a nuisance and a menace to stock and poultry. One of the principal seasons cited early for the need of predatory animal control was the noticeable absence of rabbits and other small game in the area, believed to have been killed off in quantity by foraging coyotes and bob-



REASONS WHY A PROFESSIONAL TRAPPER SHOULD NOT BE HIRED IN HASKELL COUNT

(1) Too expensive for taxpayers for the net amount of net benefit received. Average cost in California over a period of fifteen years was \$35.00 for each covote and bobcat killed.

(2) Coyotes and bobcats have been declining in the county for the past two years. Hunters generally agree that there are not more than 30-40% as many coyotes in County as there were two years ago.

(3) Hunters with guns and dogs have killed hundreds of coyotes and many bobcats in the past three years. Two years ago on Mr. R. C. Couch's farm, 26 coyotes were killed and 30 were killed on Mr. Arlos Weaver's farm, None were killed on these two farms in the last year.

(4) Two former commissioners have stated that Haskell County employed a trapper during their terms of office and that hunters killed three or four coyotes to the trapper's one.

(5) . Coyotes' and bobcats' principal foods in the County are rabbits, rats, other rodents, grasshoppers, mesquite beans and they are scavengers for farmers and ranchers. Rabbits are now on the increase in the county which shows that the coyotes and bobcats are on the

(6) J. Frank Dobie, in his book, The Voice of the Coyote, states that: "The American Society of Mammalogists is on record opposing wholesale poisoning of coyotes." And that

(7) Mr. H. M. Rike has been in County years and states he knows of very little da age done by coyotes and much good they ha

(8) Hunters can kill only about 25-30% many coyotes as they could two years a Coyotes will not become destructive as long hunters kill them at the rate they have be killed the last three years and this is done wi out any cost to the County.

(9) If there is a mountain lion in County will either leave, run himself to death his native range, or be killed by some of the County. If a professional trappe ployed and kills said lion it will be puraccident. Probably all citizens of County to see the notorious varmint killed if he is s in the County.



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


