### Ask Us

Q—I've noticed campaign signs out near Highway 84 and near the traffic circle. Isn't it illegal to put these signs on the highway?

A—According to the State Department of Highways and Public Transportation, the law prohibits campaign signs from all highway rights-of-way in the state, and prohibits most campaign signs within sight of the main lines of any federally funded highway. The signs can be posted on private property if they are licensed and permitted under billboard guidelines.

### In Brief

#### Walsh traded

NEW YORK (AP) — Dallas quarterback Steve Walsh, who has been Troy Aikman's backup since both were drafted last year, was traded to New Orleans today for three draft picks.

Cowboys owner Jerry Jones said his team will receive the Saints' No. 1 and No. 3 choices in 1991 and a No. 2 pick in 1992. Jones said the No. 2 pick could be upgraded to a No. 1 if Walsh performs well for the Saints.

Walsh, who started five games last season when Aikman was injured, will compete for the starting job in New Orleans with John Fourcade, who has been erratic in the Saints' first three games.

The deal was concluded at NFL headquarters just prior to a meeting of league owners.

## School finance law is unconstitutional, district judge rules

AUSTIN (AP) — The Texas school finance system remains unconstitutional despite this year's overhaul by the Legislature, a judge ruled today.

State District Judge Scott McCown said the \$14 billion-a-year system is still flawed. But he deferred making any immediate changes, giving the Legislature until Sept. 1, 1991 to act.

"Our need for education is too great and our wealth too modest for inequitable funding in our schools to be tolerated," McCown wrote.

The judge said the finance system doesn't give all schools "substantially equal" access to funds for similar tax effort. The school finance system relies on state funding, local property taxes and some federal money.

"In short, what the rich districts spend creates educational opportunities for their children that are denied the children of poor districts. Under Senate Bill 1 (the reform plan), the rich districts are left rich, the poor districts poor," McCown said.

Kevin O'Hanlon, a lawyer for the Texas Education Agency, said the state would appeal the ruling.

Gov. Bill Clements agreed, saying of McCown, "I don't agree with his judgment at all. He's a young judge. Perhaps the

Supreme Court in its review will reconsider that opinion."

O'Hanlon said the 52-page decision didn't give state officials enough direction on how to fix the system.

"He held it unconstitutional because it wasn't good enough, but he didn't give us a heck of a lot of guidance on what would be good enough," said O'Hanlon, a former assistant attorney general.

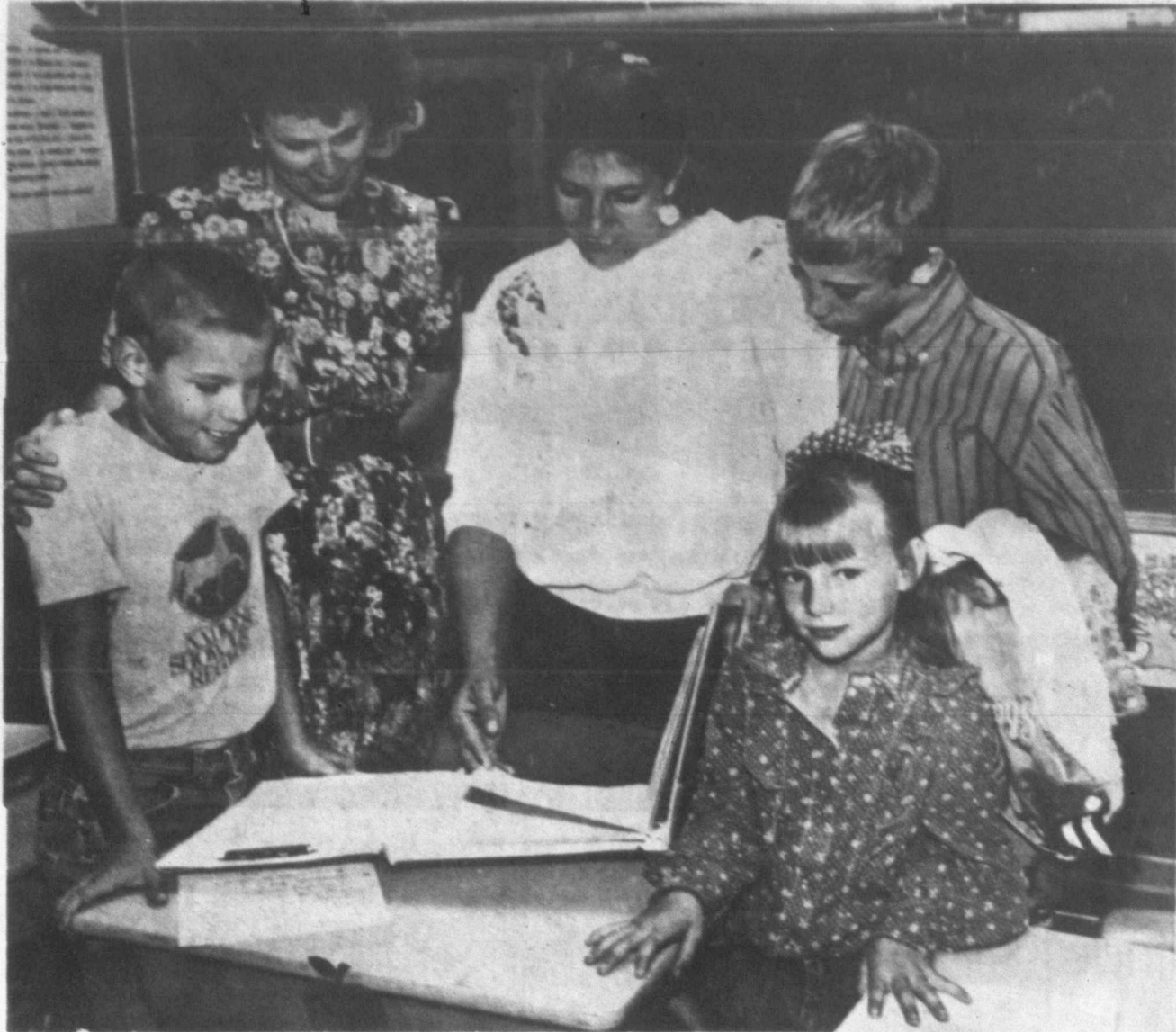
He said that unless the courts tell the state how to make a constitutional system, the litigation could last for years.

Rick Gray, a lawyer for poor school districts which challenged the school funding system, applauded the ruling. He said McCown did "a very exhaustive, thorough analysis... We think it's a great day for all school children and we hope the Legislature will set about the task of fixing the system in the future."

The new school finance plan was adopted in June by the Legislature after four special sessions.

Lawmakers added \$528 million for public schools in 1990-91 and made numerous changes backers said would improve education.

But poor school districts challenged the new funding plan. They argued that it is no different from the old system that was (see SCHOOL, page 8)

### Would equal record...

## \$40 oil appears likely

NEW YORK (AP) — Crude oil futures prices are within striking distance of \$40 per barrel, which would equal the record cash price paid 10 years ago and represent a nearly twofold increase from levels before Iraq invaded Kuwait.

"One piece of fresh news, and \$40 is there," Dean Witter Reynolds Inc. trader Ed Kevelson predicted Monday, after crude futures crossed the

\$39 threshold for the first time since oil futures contracts have been traded on the New York Mercantile Exchange. Light sweet crude settled at \$38.25 per barrel for November contracts on Monday.

The oil markets slowed a bit this morning, with light sweet crude trading 5 cents higher at \$38.30 a barrel in early trading.

"We've just seen people step back," Ann-Louise Hittle, a

senior oil analyst with Shearson Lehman Brothers Inc., said today. "There really isn't fresh news from the Middle East."

Monday's rise, which peaked for the day at \$39.20, came just a week after oil futures had first hit \$33 per barrel on the exchange, setting off a steady climb that has shattered records in days or even hours.

The surge on Monday was set off by Iraqi President Saddam Hussein's statement that he would rather go to war than let the U.N. trade embargo devastate his country.

As crude rose rapidly throughout the day, Hittle said traders started discussing \$40 per barrel as "the next target."

That would be almost double the price before Iraq invaded Kuwait last month and right at the level of cash prices that were paid in 1980, following the Iranian revolution.

Analysts said higher oil creates a threat of inflation, and it seems sure to lead to further increases in gasoline prices at the pump.

But \$40 oil today would not be as expensive, in inflation-adjusted terms, as the \$40 oil was in 1980.

Oil would have to hit about \$57 per barrel in 1990 dollars to equal (see OIL, page 8)

## Finance seminar slated Wednesday

Scurry County Field Crops Committee and the county extension office are sponsoring a Tax and Financial Planning Seminar for agricultural producers and spouses Wednesday.

The seminar will begin at 1:30 p.m. in Room A at Scurry County Coliseum and should conclude by 4 p.m.

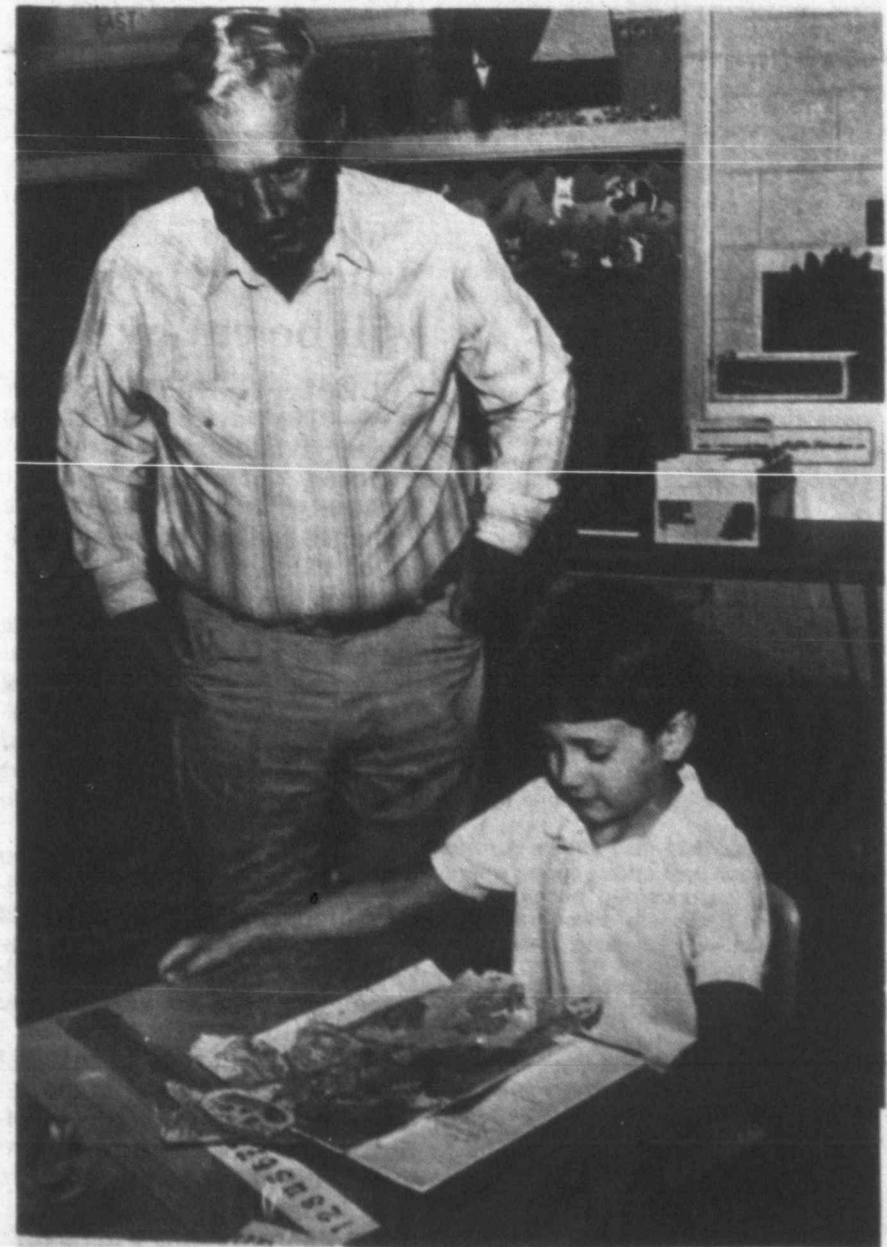
Jerry Vestal, local CPA, will present the program, along with Dr. Danny Klinefelter, extension economist-management specialist at Texas A&M University.

The program is designed to give producers information which will help them with their economic decisions. Record keeping systems will also be discussed, including Quicken, which will be demonstrated.

"Because of the amount of rain received in mid-summer, many

cotton producers in the Scurry County area are expected to produce a good cotton crop," a spokesman from the extension office said. "This may produce large cash incomes, though not necessarily profits, which will require good decision making from the producer. Some of the things to consider include tax planning, debt reduction, operating expenses for the coming year and proposed changes in the government farm programs."

Businesses helping to sponsor the program include Farmer's Co-op Gin, Inadale Co-op Gin, Scurry County Producer's Association, Texas Production Credit Association, Ezell-Key Grain Company, Snyder Farm and Ranch Supply, Von Roeder Seed Farm, American State Bank, Snyder National Bank and West Texas State Bank.

### Pesticide training class set in C-City

All agricultural producers must have a Private Pesticide Applicator license in order to purchase, apply, or supervise the use of "restricted use" chemicals. Most harvest aid chemicals used in cotton production are "restricted use."

A Private Pesticide Applicator License Training session will be held Wednesday, Sept. 26, in the C.C. Thompson Room at the City National Bank in Colorado City.

The session is planned from 8:30 a.m. to noon. The test will be administered at 1 p.m. Billy Henderson, TDA Abilene, will be giving the test and Robert DeAnda of Uvalde, extension agent in charge of pesticide safety, will be conducting the training.

### Steve Warren completes third phase

DENTON — Fourteen peace officers from throughout the state of Texas, including Lt. Steve Warren of the Snyder Police Department, recently completed the third phase of a special program titled the Law Enforcement Management Institute.

Participants attended seminars and heard speakers from all areas of law enforcement, management and related areas in the second module of the institute, held at Texas Women's University Sept. 8-21.

The institute began last year in Texas with the assistance of TWU, Texas A&M and Sam Houston State University as a way to help peace officers learn to become better managers and to explore personal development. The program is supervised by the Texas Commission of Law Enforcement Officer Standards and Education.

Training comprises three two-week study modules that focus on political, legal and social environment; general management principles and practices; law enforcement administration and practice. All participants nominated themselves and were required to submit letters of recommendation. To graduate, all officers were required to successfully complete all learning modules and two learning contracts.

### Student aviators will be cut by 400

CORPUS CHRISTI, Texas (AP) — The Navy plans to cut 400 student aviators from its flight training program, partly because of looming cuts in the Pentagon budget and low pilot attrition rate, officials announced Monday.

The cuts will be made across the board at all six bases that make up the Naval Air Training Command, including air stations in Corpus Christi, Kingsville and Beville, said Rear Adm. Jimmie Taylor, chief of naval air training.

Although Naval Air Station Chase Field, near Beville, is being studied for closure, the cuts won't pose a real threat to the base, said members of a task force dedicated to keeping the base open.

Taylor wasn't able to say just what cuts would be made at which air stations. He said officials will base the cuts on how well student aviators score in their training.

But the reductions will have to be made in such a way to maintain a balance throughout the flight training program, Taylor said. The program takes students two to three years to complete.

"The Navy says the pilot pipeline is overloaded," Taylor told the Corpus Christi Caller-Times. "We had been scheduled to graduate more than 1,600 pilots in 1991. That's been dropped to about 1,300."

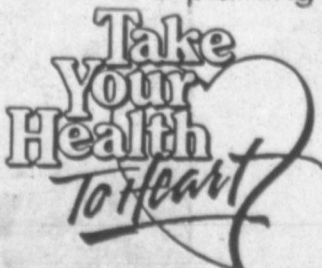
ruffed a third heart, ruffed still another club, and was still able to ruff his last heart with the spade queen in dummy. He now had nine tricks in and was still looking at the spade ace in his hand — a comfortable feeling.

Things would be different if West led a trump after ruffing the ace of diamonds. And things would be even more different if the opening lead were a trump. Once West selects the queen of clubs at trick one, declarer can always succeed if he simply never plays a diamond. He can cash the K-A of clubs and crossruff hearts and clubs for 10 tricks. But playing a diamond allows West to ruff in and perhaps play a devastating round of trumps. And shouldn't South have suspected this? After all, West had bid hearts and clubs, and then doubled four spades for penalties. If you bid that way, how many diamonds would you hold in your hand?

# Cavaliers leapfrog to 7th spot

## Notre Dame clings to top poll spot for third straight week

CHARLOTTEVILLE, Va. (AP) — Virginia wide receiver Derek Dooley says he's a bit wary of the Cavaliers' No. 7 ranking in the latest Associated Press college football poll.

"If you let the ranking get to your head, then it's going to cost you," Dooley said Monday after Virginia jumped to its highest spot ever in the weekly poll. "It's cost a lot of teams in the past and it will always cost a lot of teams because they start believing they are better and they forget how they got to that ranking."

With that caveat, the son of Georgia athletic director Vince Dooley said maybe the unbeaten Cavaliers can turn their newfound national prominence into a positive.

"It can help you if you look at the ranking and use it as a source of pride and try to improve each week and focus each week on the game at hand," Dooley said.

Virginia got to the seventh spot with a 59-0 whipping of Duke. The Cavaliers, who earlier this season notched their first victory over Clemson in 30 tries, have outscored their four opponents 194-31. They leaped three spots from last week's No. 10 to top their best previous ranking of No. 9 in 1949 and 1952.

Meanwhile, Notre Dame received 43 first-place votes and 1,478 points from a nationwide panel of sports writers and

No trickery. No fleaflickers. No outlandish, totally out of character maneuvers.

It simply was a matter of the Bills executing to perfection in a 30-7 execution of the New York Jets on Monday night.

It was Thomas running wild for a pro career-high 214 yards, 11.9 yards a pop. It was the defense, led by Bruce Smith, shutting down New York's attack. It was total domination.

"It feels great doing it on national television," Smith said after the Bills moved into a tie for the AFC East lead with Miami at 2-1. "We wanted to make a statement about the Bills."

Thomas made the loudest statement, running through gaping holes for big yardage, including a 60-yard dash that was a personal NFL high, a 39-yarder and a 24-yarder.

"It's the old counter play," tackle Will Wolford said. "Everyone knows it, everyone uses it. I don't know why we were so successful with it."

"I don't know if this was the best I've ever seen a runner, but I can't remember another game when I looked downfield and saw our back still shaking and baking."

DEAR DR. GOTT: I've been taking Inderal for hypertension for more than two years. Now, without reason or consultation, my physician has refused to fill my prescription, and I'm concerned my hypertension will cause major problems. What would you recommend?

DEAR READER: You should not suddenly stop taking Inderal (propranolol, a beta-blocker used for hypertension and heart disease) because abrupt withdrawal of the drug can, in some patients, result in heart attack or a rapid increase in blood pressure, causing stroke.

I suspect your physician refuses to refill your prescription because he or she has not examined you in some time. This is understandable and completely ethical. However, in your case, it could be dangerous.

Therefore, I recommend you call the doctor and request a limited supply of Inderal to tide you over until you can schedule an office visit. This is a reasonable solution and will permit continuity of treatment until you can be examined. If the doctor refuses your request, seek out another practitioner who will be less cavalier — or go to the emergency room of your local hospital to obtain a temporary prescription for Inderal.

DEAR DR. GOTT: A local physician is treating aged dementia by thinning the blood with Coumadin. Other local doctors don't believe in it. What's your opinion?

DEAR READER: Some forms of dementia are believed to be caused by recurring, small strokes. Unlike Alzheimer's disease, the most common dementia (of unknown cause), multi-infarct dementia can often be helped by medicine that reduces clotting, thereby eliminating the tiny clots which, when carried to the brain, produce symptoms of stroke. In suspected cases of multi-infarct dementia, doctors ordinarily suggest an aspirin a day, as an anti-coagulant.

However, some practitioners choose stronger, prescription drugs for this purpose. Coumadin, a powerful anti-coagulant, is such a drug. Coumadin, unlike aspirin, has the serious potential side effect of hemorrhage, if the dose of medicine is not carefully monitored by a blood test called the prothrombin time. Also, it hasn't been proved superior to aspirin for multi-infarct dementia. Therefore, most doctors prefer the safer, easier, cheaper alternative.

Although the "local physician" in your question is not practicing improperly, he or she is certainly in the minority.

Most doctors choose Coumadin over aspirin if there is incontrovertible evidence, such as CT scan findings, that individual patients suffer from accelerated dementia because of clots. However, in most instances, the evidence is equivocal — so, as a general rule, aspirin is preferred.

**Hostages rescued...**

**Deputies storm McDonald's**

LA VERNE, Calif. (AP) — Sheriff's deputies lobbed "flash-bang" grenades into a McDonald's to divert a gunman and stormed the restaurant early today, rescuing the last of 20 people held hostage up to seven hours, authorities say.

None of the hostages was injured. The Los Angeles County sheriff's SWAT team, which never made contact with the gunman, got help from an 18-year-old assistant manager of the restaurant who hid in the kitchen. Ramiro Gironas spied on the gunman, reporting his movements by telephone throughout the standoff, authorities said.

"All I know was to take care of my people, my crew," Gironas said. "I'm glad I'm safe and that all my people are safe. I'm not a hero. I just did what I had to."

Some hostages, including a 3-year-old girl and an 85-year-old woman, had been forced to lie under tables, authorities said. Several children were among the

hostages, La Verne police Lt. Jim Crawford said.

The gunman had fled to the McDonald's from a holdup at a nearby clothing store and took the hostages about 5:30 p.m. Monday. A second participant in the earlier robbery was arrested outside the McDonald's as the standoff began, authorities said.

Six hours later, SWAT officers rescued 12 hostages from the restaurant basement, authorities said.

Shortly after midnight, they

said, "flash-bang" grenades intended to disorient with loud noises were used to divert the gunman and a deputy seized him and rescued the last eight hostages.

"They were able to get inside without being detected," sheriff's Deputy Bill Wehner said. "A deputy leaped over the counter and took the suspect into custody."

The sheriff's department revised the number of hostages inside the restaurant several times before finally settling on 20, said

sheriff's Deputy Roger Hom. Frank M. Teresi, 38, of Anaheim and Douglas Girard, 32, of San Jacinto were booked for investigation of armed robbery and false imprisonment, Hom said.

Girard, who allegedly held the hostages, was treated at Pomona Valley Hospital for slight facial injuries he suffered while being arrested, Hom said.

One revolver was recovered, authorities said. It was not immediately known whether the gunman had other weapons.

**Oil likely to hit 10-year high**

the real cost of oil from a decade earlier, according to Philip L. Dodge, an analyst with Nomura Securities International Inc.

That is not far from the figure of \$60 per barrel that some groups have used as an estimate for how high oil prices could rise during a shooting war in the Mideast.

"If there's a shooting war, the sky's the limit until governments step in and put in price controls and rationing and all that," Dodge said.

As oil prices continued their surge, one survey of the industry said gasoline prices had hit their all-time average high of just above \$1.38 per gallon. Higher crude will mean higher gasoline, and some experts have pointed out throughout the latest crisis that gasoline has thus far not kept up with the rise in crude.

"Forty dollars for crude oil is up about \$20 from where it was before all this unpleasantness got started," Dodge said. "That \$20 increase is about 48 cents per gallon, and so far, the price of gasoline is only up about half of that. It eventually could go up another 25 cents."

Oil's surge on Monday helped push down stock prices.

Refined petroleum products, which shot up sharply on Monday, were somewhat more sluggish in early trading this morning.

Natural gas was down to \$1.930 per 1,000 cubic feet.

scrapped by the Texas Supreme Court on a 9-0 vote. The high court ordered the state to even out funding to rich and poor school districts.

State Rep. Paul Colbert, D-Houston, a member of the House Public Education Committee, blamed Clements for blocking an alternative finance plan that poor school districts would have accepted. Clements killed that proposal by vetoing the taxes needed to pay for it.

"It's entirely because of Gov. Clements' foot-dragging and the Republican legislators who upheld his veto that we're back in the court again, and we're literally about to turn over the keys of the schoolroom to the courts," Colbert said.

Clements said he wasn't surprised at Colbert's remarks, but declined further comment on them.

McCown allowed the school finance system to remain in place this school year. But he retains jurisdiction over the case.

The judge said that if the Legislature fails to devise a constitutional school finance plan by next September, he would consider stopping the spending of state and local tax money, or ordering how the state should spend school funds.

**NASA sets October 6 as Discovery's launch day**

CAPE CANAVERAL, Fla. (AP) — NASA said today it will try to launch the space shuttle Discovery on Oct. 6 and hopes to end a frustrating lull in flights that has lasted almost half a year.

"This date is a little success-oriented and is dependent on not encountering any unusual problems," said shuttle director Robert Crippen. "But I think the shuttle team has a good chance of making the 6th."

Discovery is scheduled to lift off at 7:35 a.m. EDT with five astronauts who will send a European satellite on a five-year journey to study the sun.

Discovery was the last shuttle to fly, when it carried the flawed Hubble Space Telescope into orbit in April.

The shuttle Columbia is grounded until the hydrogen fuel leaks in its engine compartment are pinpointed and repaired, probably late this year or early next year.

NASA officials repeatedly have said they are confident Discovery's fuel lines are leak-free because of the shuttle's flight performance in April and the minimal amount of work performed since then in its engine compartment.

NASA faces an Oct. 23 launch deadline for Discovery and the plutonium-powered sun probe, named for the legendary Greek adventurer Ulysses.

# Facility tracks victims of Holocaust

BALTIMORE (AP) — Using newly released Soviet documents on 400,000 of Hitler's victims, a new Red Cross clearinghouse is offering to help people track the fates of loved ones sent to labor or death camps by the Nazis.

The center opened here Monday to process a flood of expected requests for access to the records in West Germany that the Soviets began releasing last year. Soviet

soldiers recovered the documents when the camps were liberated at the close of World War II.

Emmy Hubert Mogilensky, the daughter of Holocaust victims, said at the opening of the Holocaust and War Victims Tracing and Information Center that she sympathizes with relatives who still don't know the fate of loved ones.

The 67-year-old woman said she grieved with her brother when the Red Cross sent them a message in 1946 saying their parents died in a Nazi concentration camp. As time passed, she said the letter became a "comfort, a closure."

"For us, the questions were finally answered and we could go on with our lives," said Mogilensky, who was invited to speak at

the opening.

Millions of people, mostly Jews, were sent to labor and death camps under Hitler. An estimated 6 million Jews were killed.

The Soviet papers include nearly 70,000 death certificates from the Auschwitz concentration camp in Poland. Also included are the names of 130,000 prisoners used for forced labor

and 200,000 victims in other camps, including Dachau, Sachsenhausen, Gross Rosen and Buchenwald.

Copies of the Soviet documents are housed at the International Tracing Service in Arolsen, West Germany, a branch of the Central Tracing Agency of the International Committee of the Red Cross.

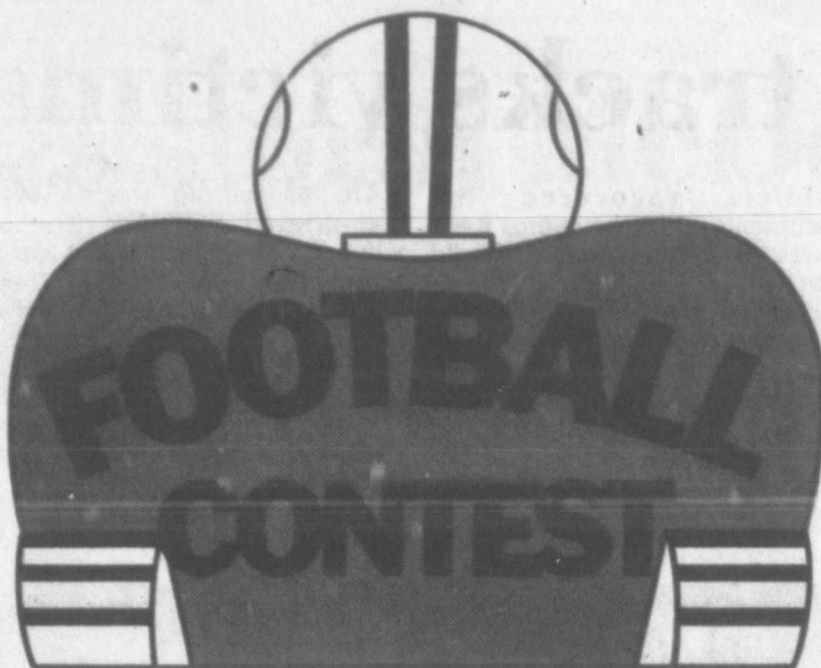
