Grandson of Haskell Couple Traffic Victim

Jack Howard McMillin, 21, Army paratrooper and grandson of Mr. and Mrs. John McMillin of this city, was killed in a traffic accident near Indianapolis, Ind., recently. He was the son of Earnest (Roy) McMillin of Baytown and Mrs. Richard P. Hess of Los Angeles, Calif.

The young paratrooper had just returned to the States from 27 months service in Germany. His wife and their 8-month-old son, Shane, had preceded him and were with his mother in San Jose, Calif.

According to information received by relatives, McMillin had left New York City in his foreign make mail car. On the freeway near Indianapolis his car developed motor trouble and when young McMillin stepped out to check the motor he was struck by one or more passing cars and died instantly.

Young McMillin had been a frequent visitor here with his grandparents as a young boy, and had planned to visit them while in the States.

Funeral for the accident victim was held in Los Angeles, Calif., and burial was in that city.

Little League District Meet Held at Breck

Plans for Little League baseball in this area were outlined at a pre-season banquet and business meeting of Little League officials and leaders held Saturday night in Breckenridge.

Attending from Haskell were Mr. and Mrs. W. N. Mercer, Mr. and Mrs. Desmond Dulaney, Mr. and Mrs. Wallace Stark, Volley Ivy, Roy Wiseman and Reggie Blackburn.

Principal speaker at the banquet was Marvin Bradford of Williamsport, Penn., southern regional director of Little League. He stressed enforcement of the rule requiring the wearing of protective helmets by all Little Leaguers while in play.

He stated Texas was third in the nation in the number of Little League organizations. The state has 2,216 teams with 71,200 boys enrolled.

Munday was named site for the district play-off in this area, starting July 19. Sectional play-offs will be August 2 in Breckenridge, and state play-off August 9 in Waco. Little League World Series will be played August 25 in Williamsport.

Haskell has about 185 boys enrolled in five major and six minor Little League teams. Season play will start May 6. Complete schedule of games will be published in an early issue.

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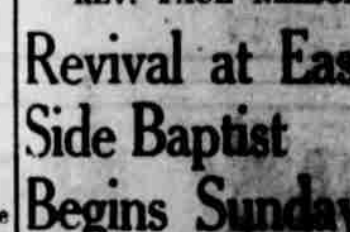
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REV. PAUL NELSON

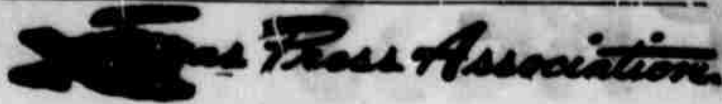
Rev. and Mrs. Rea and their 16th daughter, Rita, 16 months old, left last weekend for Dallas and he began his work with the church there Sunday.

The storm was described variously as a "cyclone," coupled with a rain and hail storm which covered a period of two days.

Four members of a farm family living east of Haskell were killed in a cellar where they had taken refuge when the first storm hit late in the evening.

Bodies of the victims were laying in state in the Baptist Church the next evening, when another storm hit. Persons attending the wake service at the church saw windows shattered by heavy hail, which also battered holes in the roof of the building as it was rocked to its foundations by twisting winds.

The small church withstood the storm, however, and services were held there the next day for the victims.

As a usual thing, spring thunderstorms pack a one-two and sometimes three, punch. If rain and hail hits one afternoon, its almost a cinch a repeat performance will follow the next day, and sometimes the third day, before the return to normal weather.

A chance meeting the other day with M. A. Smith of Buckenridge recalled the time back around 1940 when two of us from The Free Press were caught in a spring rain and windstorm and found haven at the Smith farm east of Haskell.

The late Harold Hammond and PPT had made a weekend fishing excursion to Paint Creek. About dark Saturday, clouds boiled up with rain, hail and lightning following quickly. Heading toward town, our car drowned out about a half mile from the Smith home. After slogging through mud and rain, we finally made it to the warm shelter of the farm home. Hot coffee and a cigarette or two soon had two bedraggled fishermen back to normal.

Luck was still holding good, for within 30 minutes the lights of Rancher John Rike's pickup were seen, and he furnished transportation to town for the two fishermen. The next day was bright and sunny, making it an easy matter to re-

trieve the balky, stalled car.

The lady was breezing along on the highway after a visit in Stamford. She'd had a birthday on April 11, and her thoughts were on the frequency with which birthdays were coming in recent years.

Being an observant woman, too, her train of thoughts was momentarily sidetracked as she noted a box-like contraption near the highway. A hazard like that, she mused, might cause some motorist to have an accident and she made a

mental note that she'd report the near-obstruction to the proper authorities.

birthdays coming too often when all at once she was being waved to a stop by a Highway Patrolman who had suddenly loomed up in her headlights. "Now why in blue-eyed Heaven is that officer stopping ME for?" she wondered as she braked to a stop on the shoulder of the highway.

"Pardon me, ma'am, but we checked your speed on radar back down the highway,

and regulations give you a warning. Why, yes, er, and I'm watching the lady standing mind raced and "struck" she hastily noted—and she absconded as it was a man himself on those birthdays had guard!
