**Tax Evasion a Crime**

This week the Commissioners Court of Floyd County was in session sitting as a board of equalization. This would not be necessary if all property owners were disposed to bear their full share of supporting the State and County governments and their institutions. But so long as there is a temporal existence for man so long will there be those who are disposed to shift the burdens of taxation on those whose pride will not suffer them to shirk a duty of patriotism. It is true that the Board of Equalization fixed the value on property—real, personal and miscellaneous—at a lower value than the law contemplates, still there are many good citizens who place such low values on their property that it

becomes necessary for there to be a tribunal to inspect the same and to raise the value thereof if the facts justify. In many instances, however, the Board sees fit to lower the values fixed by those property owners who make their sense of right and their desire to obey the letter and spirit of the law their guides in rendering their property for the purpose of taxation. It is safe to add that it is a rare instance that a property owner renders his property for more than it is really worth. The Board of equalization meets with much severe criticism in doing its duty, and still it does not do its full duty but rather compromises with the tendency to fix values much lower than the truth warrants and the law requires.

The Hesperian has said before, and it repeats now, that the true policy is for the County to see that property is rendered at its "full and true value," as the law specifies and lower the rate so as to secure revenues sufficient to support the County in an efficient and economical administration of its affairs.

Undervaluation of property or evasion of taxation in any form is as much a legal infraction or a moral wrong as petty larceny. Our grand juries should be just as prompt and eager to investigate and indict tax dodging in its varied forms as they are gambling, whiskey selling, and other petty crimes.

One would be surprised to note that leading citizens—men who even pray in public and are most earnest in seeing crime suppressed—are oftentimes open to the charge of rendering their property for purposes of taxation at about one half its "real and true value." Such a common practice does not augur favorably of the tendencies of the times.

Being a citizen imposes civic duties, and taxation is a desideratum in government. It is a duty, and when a citizen evades in any form the laws governing taxation it is tantamount to a contempt for law and order.

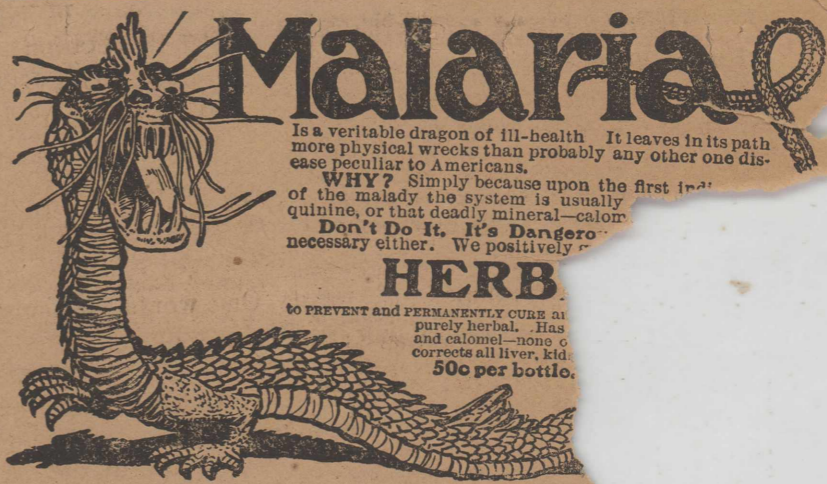
