



COUNTY NEED LEGISLATION FOR **EDUCATIONAL SYSTEM**

Thursday by Dr. Brooks Compiles Some Strong Sta tistics.

> Waco, Texas.-Dr. S. P. Brooks, president of Baylor university, has compiled some strong statistics regarding the education system of Texas, and his report to the Texas Welfare Commission is a forceful argument for better educational facilities in this state. Prof. Brooks' repor is now in the press and will be ready for free distribution by the Texas Commercial Secretaries and Business Men's Association within a short time. The report, in part, follows:

> "Too long Texans have lulled them selves to sleep in contemplation of their great public school fund, trying to believe that there was nought to do for the present generation but to drink at the fountain prepared by the fathers. Few people saw the mistake we were making in not supplementing this fund by local taxation. Fewer still had the courage to tell it out on the stump

At last more eyes were open and our public educators began to cry out the truth that while Texas had the largest permanent fund for education, yet she actually spent less per capita East Bound and less per student than practically Train No. 801 all the other states of the union. Proof of this is shown in an address by State Superintendent F. M. Bralley at the Waco, 1911 meeting, of the Texas State Teachers' association. It is to the effect that in nearly all respects the average state in the union surpasses Texas as follows:




FARM LIFE COMMISSION TO STUDY MARKETING METHODS.

Tyler, Texas.—"The greatest waste in the nation to-day lies in our system, or rather lack of system, in the marstatement of Mr. S. A. Lindsey, a prominent truck grower of this section, in discussing the organization of the new Farm Life Commission, which was organized last week and of which he is president. "The Farm Life Commission will direct its efforts largely to the proper marketing of perishable and other farm products. Every preventable are loss and every preventable illness is an economic waste; just so is at least 25 per cent of the value of farm products a waste. It is wasted in methods of preparation for market, in getting the products to market and in the lack of organized marketing plans which glut the market at one time and starve it another.

"The one absolute essential in bringing about better market conditions is co-operation," continued Mr. Lindsey, 'and the first work of the Farm Life Commission will be to secure co-operation among the farmers."

Mr. Lindsey agrees with Col. B. F. Yoakum in his recent statement that by better marketing systems, 25 per cent more of the value of the farm products can be saved to the farmers of Texas without increasing, but decreasing the cost to the consumer.



Dallas, Texas.—This city claims the distinction of having the longest concrete highway in the world, which is 5,840 feet in length and cost complete \$680,000.
