## About Varmint, Trappers Won't Go Out On A Limb - But Wish That IT Would

Haskell County's nocturnal nemesis has a "no show" as government trappers came and went Tuesday. The trappers cagily refused to go out on a limb—but said they wished the varmint would— to venture a guess on its beast's background.

Meanwhile, well-founded reports of the vanisher's existence continued to crop up. It was a panther this time, said to have been seen Monday afternoon in a thicketed pasture in ranch country immediately south of Lake Stamford, according to a report received by County Judge Jim Alvis.

Clovis Winchester, who lives near Munday, told Judge Alvis of a man informing him he glimpsed the animal gunning through the thicket fringing the lake late Monday afternoon.

Predatory Animal Control Authority Supervisor H. D. Ellard and his assistant, Tom Sparks, both of Lubbock, came to this area as quickly as their commitments in their 65-county territory would allow, and left Tuesday to meet other trapping assignments earlier slated. They scoured the circumscribed area where recent calf-killing and grabbing have occurred and took the following action making the following conclusions: Furnished information and material to prevent "repeats" of stock loss to the farmers and ranchers who have been hit; declared the carcass of the calf found on the J. B. Marr place was "too far gone" to make any determination of the identity of its attacker; said all their investigation showed the southeast part of Haskell County is "alive with coyotes."

"The only way," Ellard said, "you are going to find your predator is with a full time trapper." He explained that he

## FW&DC Railroad 'Sells' Us The Depot For A Dollar

Haskell's dilapidated depot, which holds a heart full of nostalgic memories for many an oldtimer in this area, is being "sold" to the people of Haskell "for a consideration of one dollar," Ellis L. Simmons, of Fort Worth, vice president of the Fort Worth and Denver Railway Company, has notified leaders of the movement to secure possession of the vintage station.

Plans to move the depot and restore it as a museum and tourist center have snowballed ever since word was voiced around that Simmons and members of the executive committee of the Burlington Lines might bend an attentive ear to the proposal as a town and county wide effort.

In a letter to Porter Oakes, editor of the Haskell Free Press, Vice President Simmons said he was "glad to tell you that the Railway Company will sell this structure to the people of Haskell . . . with the understanding that the building will be removed from our property."

Simmons said it would be "perhaps as late as August first before the building will be available, and in the meantime, Superintendent (Harold) Moyer (division superintendent of Wichita Falls) will work out the details of the arrangement with you."

The railroad official concluded his message by declaring, "I greatly enjoyed our visit and do appreciate so much the kindly feeling of the people of Haskell toward our railroad."

Haskell civic leaders, led by Dr. James F. Cadenhead, chairman of the Haskell Chamber of Commerce's new project committee; Dr. T. W. Williams, longtime civic leader here; Mrs. Bailey Toliver, Progressive Study Club representative and originator of the restoration idea; and others here Tuesday were effusive in their expressions of gratitude for the cooperation of railroad officials in furthering the project. "It's up to us now," they agreed.

Quarter Horse Show Set June 7 At Arena Here

Seventh annual Haskell Horse Show, quarter horse division, which is American Quarter Horse Association approved, will be staged in the Sheriff's Posse Arena here on Friday June 7, it was announced Saturday.

Judging begins at 9 a. m. in the Haskell County Sheriff's Posse sponsored event. The Sheriff's Posse is the renowned riding club which carries Haskell's colors to rodeo parades and grand entries over a wide area.

Gene George, AQHA judge of Amarillo, will judge this year's show, which will have 17 halter classes and seven performance classes with a trophy and five ribbons being awarded in each class. Felix Mullino of Rochester, horse show superintendent, announced.

All horse entries should be sent to Fred Gilliam, Haskell, the secretary of the Sheriff's Posse organization and member of the Horse Show Committee.

Halter classes are limited to registered Quarter Horses, except that foals, yearlings and two-year-olds which are listed in the Appendix Registry, are eligible to show. Horses three years or older, geldings, excepted, must have a registration number. Geldings need only to be registered in the Appendix Registry.

For performance classes, Appendix Registration is sufficient for all horses.

Entry fees range from \$9 per horse in halter classes to \$22.50 in the cutting horse contests, with \$7.50 deducted for stock and office fees and balance jacketed. Barrel race entries are \$10, plus \$3 office charge, with entrance fees jacketed and split 40%, 30%, 20% and 10%.

Stalls, which are available on June 6, are free on a first come, first served basis.

## McBroom, "Man Of Action," Jaycee of Month

For his dedicated efforts in handling the mountainous details of staging the recent annual Jaycee-sponsored Rice Springs Roundup here, Weldon McBroom, hustling Haskell Jaycee, Tuesday night was named "Jaycee of the Month" here at the monthly Ladies Night gathering of this community's Junior Chamber of Commerce.

More than 50 Jaycees and their wives at a dinner session at which President Bud Lane presided, were present for the presentation of the accolade to McBroom by Vice President Jesse Priest, chairman of the committee of selection.

The annual roundup and rodeo event, a three-day stand this year in Rice Springs Arena May 16-18, was branded a success from every standpoint, and much of the credit was given to McBroom and his committee.

Priest, a state highway patrolman headquartered here and active civic leader, is serving as coordinator of an effort on Jaycees' part here to secure permission from the Haskell Sheriff's Posse to present leases, to sub-lease the Rice Springs Arena in order to prosecute a renovation and clean-up, fix-up project there.

"Our desire is to make it a first class rodeo plant," Priest declared. The Jaycees want the privilege of the arena's actual use only during rodeo week each spring, it was pointed out. "It could be otherwise open and available to all prospective users the rest of the year," Priest said.

President Lane has named Priest to head a group to confer with the executive committee of the Sheriff's Posse to crystallize thinking on this desired community project.

The program concerning the causes of alcoholism and rehabilitation of alcoholics begins at 7:30 p. m., Jaycee President Bud Lane has announced.

"Alcoholics Anonymous does not provide information unless asked for it," Lane said, "and we think the work this organization does is phenomenal. We firmly believe a public meeting on this subject will be tremendously beneficial, therefore it is being staged at our request."

Purpose of the meeting is to initiate a Jaycee safety and health committee project to sponsor an active educational program on the methods of coping with alcohol.

## Very Versed Viewer Vocalizes On Our Vanishing Varmint

(Editor's Note: After the Wichita Falls Record News ran a Page One story from Haskell on our vanishing varmint, the following letter was sent to the Editor from an Iowa Park citizen wise in the ways of trapping. Published in last Friday's Wichita Falls Record News, the Free Press reprints here the letter containing the offer of a veteran in the field, feeling the observations therein make copy contagiously interesting to people within the circulation horizon of this newspaper.)

Editor of the Record News:

The foregoing is not to say that I lay claim as the foremost authority on wildlife in the southwest. If my certain knowledge of wildlife, trailing, stalking and "taking" for 30 years could be of any help in eliminating that "thing" so many have seen; and no doubt they have, I should be glad to offer what help I may.

I mean no criticism when I say that wildlife (any kind) seen in "motion" at late dusk or early dawn, for SIZE that is, will set up an optical illusion causing the critter to seem much larger than the actual size.

Perhaps a lot of people don't know that there has always been a few wild sheppard dogs of enormous size. This sheppard—40 years ago were known among individual wolf trappers as "tailers"; trying to bring down the prey they attacked from the rear thereby stripping the tail of cows and calves to shreds or clip it entirely.

Then there are a few "red-sides," a cross between the enormous Timber Wolf (Lobo) and some other species; some believe of the large Canadian wolf. This particular breed, especially the male, is a "loner," vicious but predictable because he is seldom if ever seen any where except in remote sections. I took one in a trap near Honda, N. M., 1923; another one in the Davis Mountains in Texas, 1925.

The brown panther is frequently seen in the cavern and timbered sections of the southwest. Their paw (foot) is of enormous size; hind foot much smaller than the fore.

The mountain lion has a "dew claw" on the hind foot, also a long wisp of coarse hair just above this claw. This beast seldom swims across a stream. He'll travel many miles to locate vendible water. Old Rocky Mountain trappers say they do this to keep their neck-hair dry which gives off an odor that lasts several days, giving dogs a ten-mile clue.

This "varmint" seen in the Haskell area—let me suggest that, if possible, whatever it is, try to locate where it waded out of water, preferably on the sandbar side. This long hair on the lion's foot, when wet will show a "drag strip" for several feet, or until well enough drained to take on the natural curl. The length of the drag will depend on the time of day—or night, sun and wind.

If there is a trapper available, with the know-how, and can "walk" a long way (I can't) I have the size and kind of traps to bring the beast down alive.

## PRAYERS OF THANKS MARK ANNIVERSARY OF TORNADO

Cloud-conscious Haskell, still showing the scars of a devastating tornado which knifed its way diagonally through the heart of the town a year ago, was still hammering away at rehabilitation and paused to give thanks Sunday at worship services throughout the community in solemn observance of the first anniversary of the awesome action. Ministers from all pulpits Sunday offered prayers of gratitude for miraculous deliverance of Haskell's citizenship from the stunning storm.

It was a year ago May 26, that a three-pronged twister shredded structures all over town, causing damage estimated at about \$5 million.

Ninety per cent of both business and residential properties suffered some kind of damage, more than 20 residences were completely demolished, and debris was scattered over an area extending as far as 10 miles east.

Miraculously, there was no loss of life and no serious injuries. This amazing escape was credited to an alert and practiced warning system operated flawlessly by the Sheriff's Department, State Highway Patrol units headquartered here, the City Police Department, and the Haskell Volunteer Fire Department.

Clouds Eyed

Keeping a wary eye on the clouds that evening, law enforcement officers spotted the tornado moving toward Haskell. In a matter of minutes, firemen raced up and down every street in the community in cars equipped with mobile warning devices, alerting citizens to the tornado danger.

It was the worst storm to hit (Continued on Page 10)

WILLOW CEMETERY ENDOWMENT FILES HEALTHY REPORT

The Willow Cemetery Endowment Trust showed an upward trend in the past year, according to a report just released by the trustees of this unique "country" organization, the Willow Cemetery Endowment Trust, which have served the community for similar endeavors over a period of 40 years in West Texas.

Activities under the Willow Cemetery Endowment Trust, which is maintained, are directed by R. C. Couch, Sr., Secretary, and a Board of Trustees.

In the past year, total assets, working capital, and funds, climbed from \$107,218.00, according to the officers' report, to \$142,125 in new endowments sold in the endowment trust's fiscal year just ended, plus \$2,000 in interest bearing bonds bought during the year by the cemetery association.

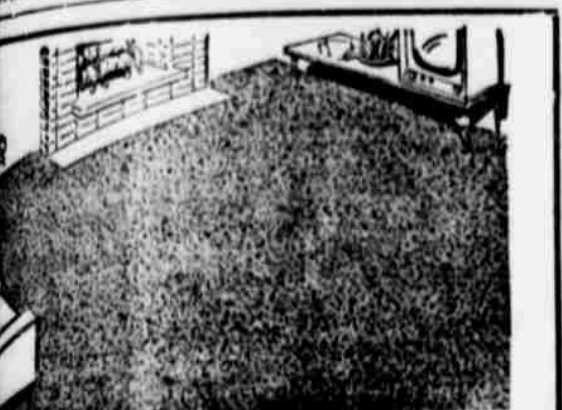
Interest received from bond investments already held during the past year amounted to \$4,489.79, which sum was paid to the Haskell Cemetery Association to defray the costs of cemetery maintenance and operation. The cemetery association, out of income, purchased the \$2,000 additional in bonds during fiscal 1962-63 over and above the expenditures made for maintenance.

In the special account of the endowment trust at the end of the financial year was \$67,218, plus \$20,000 in the general account.

**Rev. Finch, Son At Presbyterian Synod Last Week**

The Reverend Douglas B. Finch and his son, Stephen Douglas Finch, of the First Presbyterian Church of Haskell, were among 600 Southern Presbyterian pastors and laymen attending the 108th annual meeting of the Synod of Texas, Tuesday through Thursday of last week at Mo-Ranch, camp and conference grounds near Kerrville.

Reorganization, basically a realignment of the Synod's staff and committee structure, was the major item of business, Rev. Finch said. Last year the Synod, which is the regional organization of the Presbyterian Church, U. S., with 410 churches in Texas and four New Mexico churches, adopted the plan in principle. This year the delegates considered the Stand Rules and Manual of Operation.

Other significant items of business include a \$20,000 budget increase, the need for a Presbyterian chaplain in the state penal system, and a plea for more racial understanding and cooperation. Dr. John D. Moseley, president of Austin College, retired as moderator of the Synod. The Rev. Thomas W. Currie, pastor of St. Paul Presbyterian Church, Houston, is the new moderator for 1963.

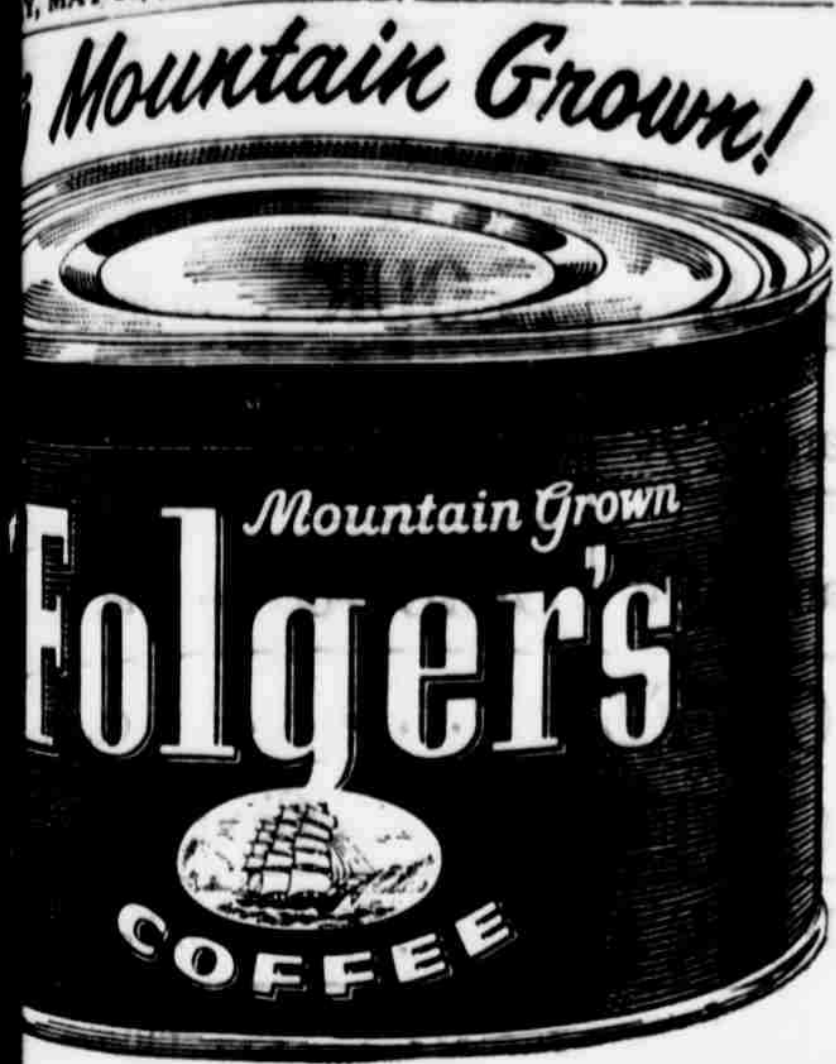

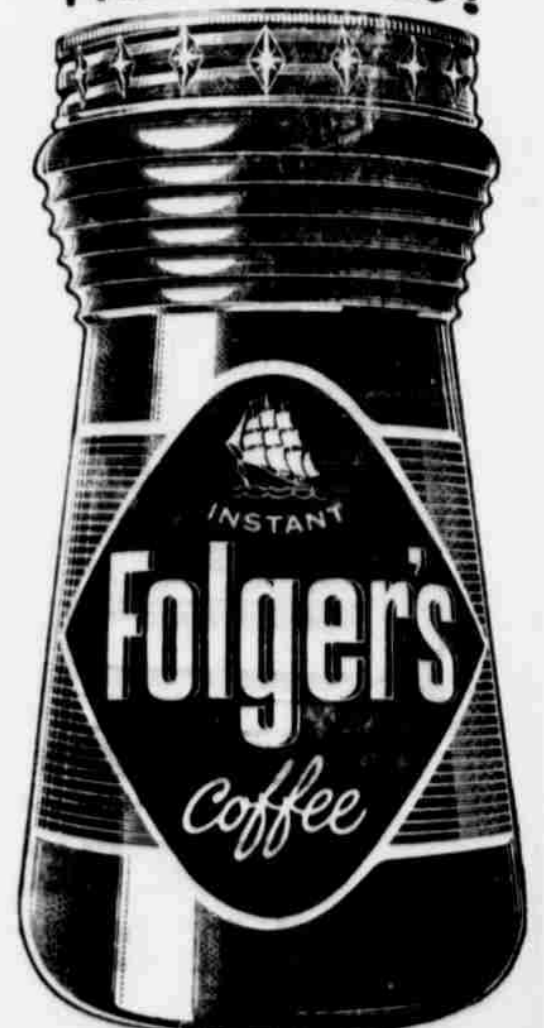

At the desire of the Foundation, WTC and the other utility companies are assisting in advancing the knowledge of nuclear science at Texas schools and by using students and teachers' participation in the various types of organizations and opportunities which associate themselves in the field of nuclear energy.
