## Billy Sol Estes Wins National 4-H Award

Six years ago, Billy Sol Estes of Clyde, started his agriculture career with one ewe lamb. Today he has a very substantial bank account and sales from livestock and crops now run into the thousands of dollars.

He was named winner of the National 4-H Achievement Award over more than 400 participants from the 48 states. The award carries with it an all expense trip to the National 4-H Club Congress in Chicago where Billy Sol will be presented the top 4-H club award with the compliments of the President. In addition, Billy Sol will receive a \$200.00 scholarship.

For several years Billy Sol has been a leader in club work, and during the past few years, he has really blossomed into the livestock field, buying, selling, and handling like a veteran. He has served as President of the Clyde 4-H club the past 4 years and has been a consistent exhibitor of champion sheep and swine at the Callahan County shows. He exhibited a 2nd prize swine at the West Texas Live Stock Show recently. But it has really been as a commercial operator that Billy Sol has 'gone to town'. He finishes from 200 to 250 hogs for the market during a years time and keeps a large number in the feed lot at all times.

He has used Gov't feed wheat for the feeding projects and has been instrumental in securing 21 cars of feed wheat in recent months for Callahan County farmers.

Billy Sol operates a CoTop feed store in Clyde and when farmers do not want all of the feed ordered he feeds the rest. In addition to all of the hogs that he feeds, he keeps a number of registered swine, he now has about 50 head of good quality white face cows and 55 head or mixed steers; that he will winter on ensilage put up several years ago, and Gov't feed wheat and corn fed in lieu of protein feeds. He was graduate from Clyde High School last spring. Callahan County and the State of Texas are proud of Billy Sol who so deservedly earned the National award for 1943.

The ewe lamb with which Billy Sol started his career was a Christmas present from his father, John L. Estes, Billy Sol then 13 years of age wrote Santa Claus a letter asking for a ewe lamb and when presented by his father he named her "Old Merry" for her Christmas present identity. Billy Sol is a grandson of the late Mr. and Mrs. Sol Estes, pioneer farm and ranch people of the Clyde country.

## Income Tax Man Here December 6, 1943

The Current Tax Payment of 1943 provides for the payment of the larger amounts of income tax reflected on returns filed for the calendar years 1942 and 1943, plus 25 % of the smaller year's tax liability, if over \$50.00. 75% of the smaller year's tax liability will be forgiven.

Farmers and stockmen who derive 80% or more of gross income from the active conduct of farm or ranching operations must file a "Declaration of Estimated Income And Victory Tax—Calendar Year 1943, On Form 1040-ES" on or before December 15, 1943. The law provides that the entire unpaid balance of the larger year's estimated tax for 1943 be paid in full at that time.

Deputy Collector Herbert W. Patterson will be at Callahan County Court House in Baird on December 6, 1943, from 8:30 a. m. to 5 p. m. to render assistance with current income tax problems of farmers and ranchmen. This will be the only visit to your city before December 15, 1943, the final date for filing Declarations of Estimated Income and Victory Tax.

The Deputy Collector's advice and assistance will be extended purely as a courtesy and without cost to any citizen.

## Christmas Mail

### CHRISTMAS MAILS— —IN NOVEMBER

Instructions From The  
Postmaster General

The war has dislocated the Christmas mailing season. This year November is the time for mailing Christmas gifts and cards. Gifts should be marked "do not open until Christmas."

There can be no assurance, in view of the unavoidable handicap of war, that gifts and cards mailed in the week immediately preceding Christmas will be delivered on time. Such matter must not impede the payment of war material and personnel and military mail.

The number of railway cars and air planes available for handling Christmas mail is far below that of former years. More than 30 thousand postal employees have gone into the armed forces, and the postal service is forced to rely on inexperienced help. Therefore it will be impossible to transport and deliver in the last 3 weeks before Christmas the tremendous quantities of mail that here-to-fore has been moved in that period.

The only way, therefore, in which deliveries of Christmas mail can be assured of delivery in time is to mail all packages and cards, regardless of the distance they are to go in NOVEMBER.

Last year the department urged the people to do this. In spite of all warnings the bulk of the mailing came after the middle of the month and the senders learned to their regret that their packages were not delivered until after Christmas.

REMEMBER—this year Cards and Packages MUST be Mailed in November.

Citizens of Baird who own any property in foreign countries were notified by Postmaster Miss John Gilliland today that they must file reports of their foreign holdings with the Treasury Department before December 1. The notice was given by means of a poster placed on display in the post offices.

Postmaster Gilliland points out that it is necessary for the government to have as complete information as possible on the American stake abroad to assist the military authorities and the civilian governments on the fighting fronts and to bring about sound solutions of the post-war problems.

Report forms, known as TFR-500, may be obtained through commercial banks, or from the nearest Federal Reserve Bank, the postmaster states. Penalties are provided for those who willfully fail to file reports.
