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Mobile Seat Belts Save Lives Passengers and Drivers

the fact that they were alive to only one factor: "Seat belts saved our lives," she told newsmen.

This is one of countless incidents where seat belts have meant the difference between life and death. The seat belt is undoubtedly the most important single advancement in automobile safety since the introduction of safety glass many years ago. Why? Because it saves lives.

If you are driving at approximately 30 miles per hour and

suddenly smash against an oncoming car or a stationary object, you are immediately subjected to a greater "G" force than Col. John Glenn was when he made his historic flight from Cape Canaveral earlier this year. Col. Glenn had a contour chair, shoulder harnesses and many other safety devices to help him withstand the terrific forces of sudden changes in speed. But you, driving along the highway, have absolutely nothing to protect you unless you are wearing a seat belt that can withstand the "G" forces and hold you in place.

Last year, 28,000 Americans died on the nation's highways. The National Safety Council and the American Medical Association agree that 5,000 lives could be saved every year if all cars were equipped with seat belts. And they add that the 1,500,000 injuries resulting from highway crashes could be reduced by up to 50 percent.

If you should be involved in an automobile accident, the chances are that your car door will be sprung open by impact and you might be thrown out. This is one of the greatest causes of highway deaths and injuries. A seat belt will prevent you from being ejected and will keep you in the car where your chances of survival are five times greater. This is one of the chief reasons why so many police departments require their men to wear belts. They see many accidents and know that once a person is thrown to the pavement, chances of survival are slim.

But even if you're lucky enough to stay in the car, you still face death or injury from being tossed around and striking such things as the steering wheel, the dash board, the windshield or the doors and roof. The force at impact is so great that striking even one of the areas can cause you to be hospitalized or killed. A seat belt will hold you in place.

When should a seat belt be worn? Always! Statistics show that 75 per cent of all accidents happen within 25 miles of home and at speeds of less than 40 miles per hour. This means that an accident can happen anywhere, on a trip to the grocers, to a social event, or to a football game. The expressways and turnpikes are not the hazards they are suspected to be.

Who should wear a seat belt? Everyone! The doctor mentioned earlier, had them installed in the rear seat for his children. It paid off. Never neglect the children. It may take a little ingenuity to keep them happy on longer trips, but it's worth it. And don't forget the expectant mother. Doctors agree that a seat belt can be worn safely until the eighth month of pregnancy.

Today, many organizations and companies are campaigning to further the use of seat belts. Most notable of these is the current "Seat Belts for Safety" campaign being conducted by the California Oil Company through its Chevron dealers from Maine to Virginia. The belts being offered by Chevron dealers meet the rigid specifications of the New York State Department of Motor Vehicles, the U. S. General Services Administration and

The American Seat Belt Council. When you buy a belt, make sure it meets the requirements of these agencies. It means that the belt is strong and will do the job it is called on to do.

Knowing that you have a seat belt you can depend on will go a long way in making your driving more pleasurable and worry-free. And, seat belts are comfortable. For instance,

the belts being sold through the "Seat Belts for Safety" weigh only 10 ounces, and they come in a variety of colors to match all standard upholstery colors.

When you think of your family and your friends and yourself, think of seat belts. If you don't have them, get them. If you have them, wear them.

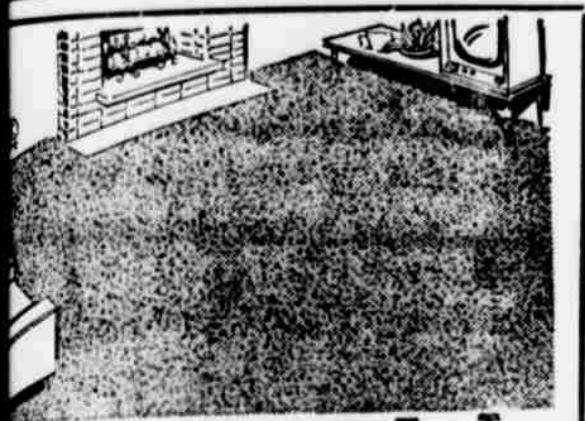

Voters Urged to Study Proposed Amendments to Constitution

In the General Election Nov. 6, voters will not only ballot on election of State and County officials but will also express their opinion on 14 proposed amendments to the State Constitution.

The full text of 12 of the amendments appear in The Free Press. So that you may be fully informed, we suggest you read each proposed measure in its entirety.

A brief digest of the 14 proposed Amendments follows:

Number One on the Ballot (HJR 25)—Provides Workmen's Compensation Insurance for the employees of all political subdivisions.

Number Two on the Ballot (SJR 9)—Raises the limit on use of state funds to assist the needy aged, needy blind and needy children from Forty-seven Million Dollars (\$47,000,000) to Fifty-two Million Dollars (\$52,000,000).

Number Three on the Ballot (SJR 22)—Permits creation of hospital districts in Ochiltree, Castro, Hansford and Hopkins Counties.

Number Four on the Ballot (HJR 46)—Provides for a State program of acquiring conservation storage facilities in reservoirs.

Number Five on the Ballot (HJR 51)—Creates hospital districts and limits their power.

Number Six on the Ballot (HJR 36)—Authorizes retirement, disability and death benefits for elected and appointive officers and employees of counties and political subdivisions who have served in such capacity for twelve (12) years or more.

Number Seven on the Ballot (SJR 13)—Insures continuity of state and local governmental operations in periods of emergency, resulting from disasters caused by enemy attack, by providing for the prompt and temporary succession to the powers and duties of public office, except members of the Legislature.

Number Eight on the Ballot (SJR 7)—Establishes a ceiling of Two Million, Five Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$2,500,000) per year on the amount that may be paid out of state funds for assistance payments to the totally and permanently disabled.

Number Nine on the Ballot (HJR 70)—Authorizes the construction, equipping, maintenance and financing of a home for the aged in Titus County and permits the Legislature to authorize the creation of two (2) hospital districts in Brazoria County.

Number Ten on the Ballot (SJR 12)—Permits state employees to serve as consultants or on advisory committees, or as members of a Public School Board, provided they are not members of the teaching profession, and may receive reimbursement for expenses of such nature as are authorized by the governing board of the institution in which such employee is employed.

Number Eleven on the Ballot (SJR 23)—Permits the sale of land of the Veterans Land Fund remaining unsold after having been first offered for sale to veterans, to be sold to such purchasers, in such quantities, and on such terms, and at such prices and rates of interest, and under such rules and regulations as are now provided by law, or as may hereafter be provided by law.

Number Twelve on the Ballot (SJR 19)—Delegates limited zoning powers to any county bordering on the Gulf of Mexico or the tidewater limits thereof.

Number Thirteen on the Ballot (SJR 6) Provides that taxes or bonds previously voted in any Independent School District, major portion of which is in Dallas County, shall not be abrogated, canceled or invalidated by any change in boundaries authorized by any subsequent election, and authorizes the continuance of the levy of taxes after such change without further election.

Number Fourteen on the Ballot (SJR 14)—Permits the Governor to issue a proclamation for a special election to fill vacancies in the Legislature.

Number Fifteen on the Ballot (SJR 15)—Permits the Governor to issue a proclamation for a special election to fill vacancies in the Legislature.

Number Sixteen on the Ballot (SJR 16)—Permits the Governor to issue a proclamation for a special election to fill vacancies in the Legislature.

Number Seventeen on the Ballot (SJR 17)—Permits the Governor to issue a proclamation for a special election to fill vacancies in the Legislature.

Number Eighteen on the Ballot (SJR 18)—Permits the Governor to issue a proclamation for a special election to fill vacancies in the Legislature.

Number Nineteen on the Ballot (SJR 19)—Permits the Governor to issue a proclamation for a special election to fill vacancies in the Legislature.

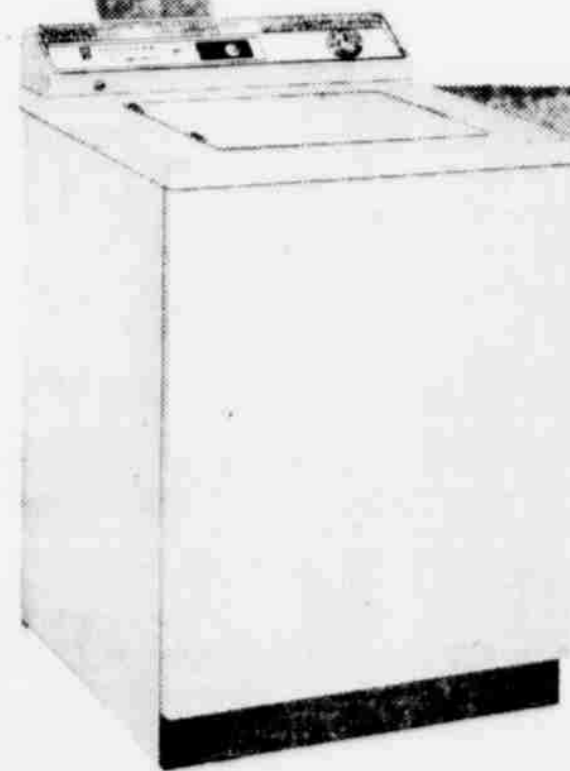

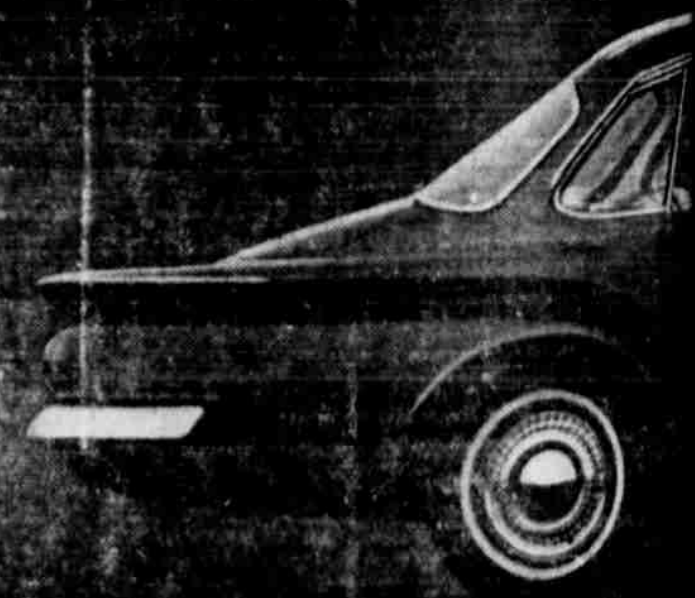
