5,092 Take Dosage, Striking Blow On Polio

When more than 5,000 residents of Haskell County struck a blow against polio by taking the Type III Sabin oral vaccine Sunday, Dr. T. W. Williams, county health physician, termed the county-wide anti-polio crusade here "highly successful" and praised the coordinated effort in which Haskell Jaycees, pharmacists, nurses, Future Homemaker members, and Jaycee wives joined forces to accomplish a titanic task.

Dr. Williams declared, "The totals are highly pleasing and very successful considering the fact that migrant labor in two of our five feeding station areas is not now here. The overall dose totals were fewer in those two communities, but greater in the other three Haskell County towns where the population is stabilized," the Haskell County health physician said.
