Hospital tax bill

Members of the Cogdell Memorial board will hear an update Thursday night on an approximate \$20,000 tax bill now facing the hospital.

due talk

This past fall, the facility received a tax bill for the office building owned by the countymaintained hospital but leased to physicians in private practice.

Other buildings, land and equipment associated with Cogdell Memorial are tax exempt. The doctor's clinic was placed on the tax rolls this year, however, because of a new interpretation in the law that it is taxable since it is leased to individuals operating "for profit."

The hospital now faces a \$19,820 tax bill for 1988 which came due last Jan. 31. When notified of the tax bill status at a March 11 meeting, Administrator Tom Hochwalt pointed out that the almost \$20,000 tax bill would equal 5.5 percent on the hospital's tax subsidy received from the county for the current operating year. He expressed dismay at the hospital, in effect, required to pay tax dollars back to the taxing entity which provides it with tax dollars. LUBBOCK, Texas (AP) - Robert W. Lawless, a top executive of Southwest Airlines, won approval as Texas Tech University's 11th president today from the board of regents.

In a telephone conference call, all nine regents voted to offer the school's top job to Lawless, 52, executive vice president and chief operations officer for Dallas-based Southwest.

"Hundreds of thousands of hours have been spent and thousands of miles traveled to find the best qualified person to lead our university and health sciences center," said regents chairman J. Fred Bucy in nominating Lawless.

With the job, which includes the presidency of Tech's Health Sciences Center, Lawless re-enters academia after almost seven years with the air carrier.

Public awareness growing... **Pointeaus nearing challenge of INS**

Jack Pointeau has returned from a Wednesday meeting with the San Antonio attorneys who will represent his family in a suit against the Immigration and Naturalization Service, and he said Thursday that the rapidly burgeoning publicity about their deportation case has aroused the interest of U.S. Sens. Lloyd Bentsen and Phil Gramm

Pointeau, who went to San Antonio with his wife Francoise and local restaurateur Randy Perkins, said the meeting with immigration law specialists Robert and Nancy Shivers went well and plans were laid to file suit when the latest INS deportation order reaches its April 26 deadline.

A committee was formed here recently to raise \$3,000 to file suit in United States District Court in Dallas to obtain a suspension of deportation from the court, the Pointeaus having been advised that filing suit would result in an automatic suspension of the INS mandate

Perkins said before he and the Pointeaus left Tuesday that

about \$1,600 was in hand for the legal fund

Pointeau said a nationally released Associated Press feature about his family's plight has caused a fresh wave of interest around Texas and the nation, and a "Special Edition" television news crew from New York City is scheduled to arrive here Friday

Perkins received a letter from Bentsen last weekend that said the prominent Democrat and recent vice presidential nominee is interested in the case and had written a letter of inquiry to the INS. Bentsen told Perkins that he will be in touch when he hears from the immigration agency

Pointeau met Gramm in Abilene last week, and Gramm told the Snyder motel owner in the on-camera meeting that he is sympathetic and "wants to help.

Pointeau said he is thus encouraged that the court suit will be successful to buying time for a U.S. senator to sponsor private legislation to grant citizenship to him, his wife and four children

Such legislation is considered easier to pass in the Senate than See POINTEAUS, Page 9



Milken, 42, has headed Drexel's junk bond department since the mid-1970s and is credited with revolutionizing corporate takeovers by relying on the highly risky, high yielding securities, turning them into a \$175 billion annual market. The bonds also are often used to help small and medium-size companies grow

The indictment described the Beverly Hills, Calif.-based junk bond department as "the driving force behind Drexel's business" noting that between 1983 and 1987 it accounted for nearly half of Drexel's profits.

If convicted on the racketeering counts alone, each defendant would face maximum fines of \$3.7 billion, roughly double their alleged illicit profits. All three face maximum prison sentnces of 20 years on each of two racketeering charges, prosecutors said.

DEAR DR. GOTT: I'm 70 and for some seven years I've taken Corgard daily for irregular heartbeat and occasional palpitations. When we joined an HMO last year my EKG revealed a pulse rate of 36. My doctor reduced the Corgard and told me not to worry as long as I have no symptoms such as feeling faint. After a brisk 45-minute walk, my pulse only gets up to 41. Am I getting the best advice?

DEAR READER: I tend to take a "hands off" approach in treating elderly patients. They often do not tolerate medicine well and I believe that "less is better" when it comes to older people who have no symptoms.

Without knowing the details of your heart condition, I cannot offer an opinion about the appropriateness of your therapy.

However, your doctor seems to be on the right track by reducing your

Your situation reminds me of a patient of 85 whom I first examined 10 years ago for slow pulse. She was taking several medicines and I had trouble figuring out what was going on. With her enthusiastic endorsement, I began slowly eliminating her drugs. The whole process took about four months. Since then, her pulse has stabilized at about 70, she is off all drugs, tells me she never felt better in her life and is looking forward to her 100th birthday. This approach isn't right for everybody, but if your doctor is willing to work with you, I say go for it.

DEAR DR. GOTT: My husband has a mole that started bleeding. It bled for a week, then stopped. Now it is sore. Also, his nipples bleed sometimes. Please advise us

DEAR READER: Any mole that darkens, bleeds or grows rapidly should be examined by a doctor.

I do not know why your husband's nipples bleed; this, too, is abnormal. He needs a medical checkup to make sure his mole isn't cancerous and that

Mechanic arrested for theft HOUSTON (AP) — An in-

vestigation into missing Houston Fire Department equipment has led to the arrest of a department mechanic who is accused of stealing thousands of dollars worth of equipment for use in his vehicle repair business.

Arson investigator Bruce Koger said Wednesday that Michael J. Baker, 40, was arrested and charged Monday with unauthorized use of a motor vehicle in connection with his use of a truck that might be connected to theft of city property.

Baker was later released after posting \$2,000 bond.

The investigation was launched in early March when Fire Department officials received a tip that Baker was taking auto parts from the department's maintenance facility, Koger said. 'We served a search warrant at his home and found about \$20,000 worth of items," Koger said.

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Recipe Box

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It's not often that you find a recipe that's as easy to fix as it is elegant, but here's a dessert that lives up to the claim. To keep the pastry from puffing during baking, prick it deeply enough to see the baking sheet through the holes.

COCONUT TART 1/2 cup sugar 3 tablespoons cornstarch 1¹/₃ cups milk 2 beaten egg yolks ¹/₄ cup toasted coconut 2 tablespoons coconut liqueur

or white creme de cacao 1/2 of a 171/2-ounce package (1

sheet) frozen puff pastry ¹/₃ cup fudge ice cream topping

For filling, in a small saucepan combine sugar and cornstarch. Stir in milk. Cook and stir over medium heat until thickened and bubbly; cook 2 minutes more. Remove from heat. Stir about 1 cup hot mixture into egg yolks. Return to mixture in saucepan. Bring just to boiling. Cook and stir 2 minutes more. Remove from heat. Stir in coconut and liqueur. Cover surface with clear plastic wrap. Chill, without stirring, about 6 hours or until cold. Thaw pastry according to package directions. On lightly floured surface lightly roll pastry p.m. sheet into a 10-inch square. Cut four 1-inch strips off one side, making a 10- by 6-inch rectangle. Transfer rectangle to ungreased baking sheet. Prick at 1-inch intervals, making definite holes in pastry. Trim 2 strips to 6-inch lengths. Gently twist all strips. Place on edges of rectangle to form a rim around edge. Moisten ends. Press together lightly to adhere. Bake in 375-degree F oven about 25 minutes or until pastry is golden brown. Carefully remove pastry from pan. Cool on wire rack. To serve, place pastry on serving platter. Heat fudge topping until warm. Reserve 1 tablespoon topping. Spread remaining topping in bottom of pastry. Beat filling until smooth; spread over fudge topping. Drizzle reserved topping over filling. Makes 6 servings.

Sound play for unsound slam

Everyone knows the old-fashioned way of showing a good hand with a long suit after partner opens with one no-trump: You jump in your suit. What is not so commonly understood is that after such a jump, opener has two ways of showing support for your major suit. He can simply raise it to game, or he can cue-bid a control elsewhere to imply interest in slam. When North failed to make such a cue-bid. South should have given up on slam. He either was greedy or thought his 100 honors would give him a profit regardless. So he asked for aces and bid six hearts, apparently not caring that the defenders might have two quick tricks.

There would be no story with a club lead, but West led the queen of diamonds. Declarer mentally scolded himself for sloppy bidding, but did not give up. He won dummy's diamond king, drew trumps, and then played the diamond ace and ruffed a diamond. He then played three more rounds of hearts, discarding a club and a diamond from dummy. His hope, not too far-fetched, was that East would hold the A-K of clubs and four spades.

Sure enough, on the last trump East had to reduce to five cards. If he kept four spades, he would have to throw a high club honor. In that event, declarer would give up a club to East, thus establishing a club winner for himself. If East threw a spade, South would play Q-K-A of spades and dummy's last little spade would be the 12th trick. What luck! South scored an unmakable slam and still got his 100 honors.

Battery sales are energized

NEW YORK (AP) - Spurred neighborhood stores account for by their growing infatuation with about 20 percent. electronic toys and games, hobby equipment and gadgets, Americans spend some \$2.3 billion each year for batteries, according to a report from a marketing communications concern.

Paradoxically, according to the New York-based Howard Marlboro Group, while electronic technological advances have accelerated battery sales, consumers do not buy their batteries in stores that sell electronic equipment.

The leading outlets for batteries are the nation's discount stores, with nearly 35 percent of total sales.

Supermarkets account for 27 percent of all battery sales, drugstores account for 18 percent, small independently-owned



Students will need to bring to class a sketch book, a kneaded eraser, a T-square, two pencils and rubber bands.




