O'Brien School Employs Land Appraisal Firm

The Board of Education of Carney High School at O'Brien, meeting last week, voted unanimously to hire Southwestern Appraisal Company of Stamford to re-value land and personal property for the school district tax rolls.

Work of reappraising property is expected to be started around March 1, and should be completed in time for an early board of equalization meeting, school officials said.

This action has been considered by the school board for

some time. Pressure was put at both the 1960 and 1961 board of equalization meetings by representatives for a revaluation of land property. The representatives, speaking for the payers of 78 per cent of local taxes in the district, declared they are paying a much greater proportion than landowners.

The school board had hoped that the Haskell County Commissioners Court would take some action, but decided to make the move alone when it became evident that the present commissioners would not make the move, a spokesman for the school said.

The new church replaces the mission building which Haskell Catholics had used for several years. It is mainly a stone structure of modern design. In front is erected three crosses. Pastor of the church is Father James A. Meuree, Stamford. His associate is Father Ralph A. Goddard, Stamford. They offer Holy Mass each Sunday morning at 11:00. First Friday Devotions to the Sacred Heart of Jesus are offered each first Friday of the month at 7:00 a. m. On Wednesday evenings Father Meuree directs the teenagers Catechism classes and offers Holy Mass at 7:30. Masses are also offered on any Holy Day of Obligation. From 10:00 until 10:45 on Sunday mornings, Catechism classes are taught for all of the parish young people not enrolled in the Wednesday classes.

It was the annual Boy Scout First Aid Contest for this area. Designed to test the extent in which Scouts put to use their first aid skill in emergencies, five problems were staged in which persons were injured in theoretical accidents.

Supervising the program was Dr. T. W. Williams, chairman of health and safety instruction in the Northern District of Chisholm Trail Council, and Troy Boone, district Scout executive of Abilene. Ernest Pittman of Anson was scorer.

Taking part were Troop 47 of Stamford, the Beaver Patrol; Troop 36, Haskell, the Snake, Owl and Eagle Patrols; Troop 28, Weinert, Wolf Patrol; Troop 48, Paint Creek, Badger, Ants, Coyote and Eagle Patrols; Troop 38, Anson, Beaver and Bob White Patrols. Troop 44, Rule, was present but did not participate.

Problems given the Scouts included: A hunter who had been bitten by a copperhead snake; a boy unconscious after

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An Important Message To All Taxpayers Interested In The Future Of Our Community

This message is prompted by the belief that every sensible person in Haskell deprecates the state of affairs now existing in our community as a result of continued controversy.

Isn't it time for some clear-headed, sober thinking as to what we may be getting into? Isn't it time to put aside personalities and fancied grudges and base our thinking on facts and facts alone?

Regardless of individual opinion as to the merits or demerits in the "water squabble," here are the cold, hard facts:

Both the City of Haskell and the North Central Texas Municipal Water Authority are governmental taxing agencies, distinct and apart from each other.

Here's what that means: Every property-owner — we repeat, every property-owner — in the City of Haskell is a taxpayer in the NCTM Water Authority. All property taxed by the City of Haskell, whether it is the modest home of an elderly couple, or corporate property of the telephone, gas or utility company, or the modern new bank building, if the property is taxed by the city it is also taxed by the Water Authority. That was made distinctly clear by Judge Ben Charlie Chapman in a recent court statement.

Now, consider this: When either of the above taxing agencies files a lawsuit against the other, the agency being sued must of necessity defend itself in court. Naturally, lawyer's fees and court costs are involved.

We now come to the important point: WHO PAYS THE BILL?

The answer is simple: To pay its lawyer, and any other legal costs involved, the City uses part of the money paid by the elderly homeowners, the bank, the telephone, gas, and utilities companies and other taxpayers. The Water Authority does likewise, with its lawyer getting as

his pay part of the taxes paid on the modest home, the remainder out of taxes from the bank, utility corporations and other taxpayers.

Read the answer again. It sounds unbelievable at first, but if you will consider it carefully you will find that every word is true. Every taxpayer in Haskell—individual or corporate, from the smallest to the largest—pays the lawyer's cost and all other court fees on BOTH SIDES when the City of Haskell and NCTMWA start suing each other!

Furthermore, Haskell citizen-taxpayers entered into legal and binding obligations with our three neighboring towns of Rule, Munday and Goree in confirming and creating NCTMWA and in authorizing a \$3,800,000 bond issue by the Authority. From the founding of the community more than 80 years ago until the present time, Haskell has never repudiated or failed to meet any obligation it has made.

Since the City of Haskell is the only town spending taxpayers' money for the avowed purpose of nullifying and repudiating the City's pledged obligations, this action is creating distrust and ill-will toward Haskell, not only in member towns of NCTMWA but other neighboring towns as well. These are the same communities upon whose friendship and patronage the future growth and progress of Haskell depends!

Surely there is a more sensible solution to the controversy than the needless expenditure of thousands of dollars of taxpayers money in long drawn-out litigation.

Without being arbitrary, we believe there are in Haskell enough sound-thinking, reasonable and civic-minded taxpayers, both men and women, whose opinion and influence can put a stop to this continued bickering and controversy with a solution that would be in the best interests of our community and its future.

- 1. A special election is hereby ordered to be held in the City of Haskell, Texas, on April 3, 1962, to determine the wishes of the qualified voters of the City of Haskell on the proposition set forth in Section 2 of this ordinance.
2. The ballots to be used in

said election shall be printed and furnished by the City of Haskell, and upon each ballot shall appear substantially the following:

SPECIAL ELECTION Held in the City of Haskell on April 3, 1962 Each voter shall scratch out one expression thus leaving the other expression as indicating his or her vote on the proposition.

PROPOSITION

Should the City of Haskell get out of the Millers Creek Project?

4. A substantial copy of this ordinance signed by the Mayor and attested by the City Secretary shall serve as a call for and be proper notice and proclamation of the said special election. The Mayor is authorized and directed to have a copy of this ordinance posted at the City Hall and at each of the voting places provided for above at least twenty days before the date fixed for the said special election, and this ordinance shall be published in a newspaper of general circulation in the City of Haskell at least once a week for not less than two consecutive weeks prior to the date set for the said special election.

20 Weather Bureau Men Receive Commerce Gold Medal for Hurricane Flights

A. B. Arnett Jr., son of Mr. and Mrs. A. B. Barnett of Rule, received a certificate and lapel emblem as a member of the Research Flight Facility Staff when the Fourteenth Annual Honor Awards Program took place at the Department of Commerce Auditorium in Washington, D. C. on Feb. 14, 1962.

A Department of Commerce Gold Medal for outstanding contributions to the advancement of science was presented at that time to 20 Weather Bureau men who fly into hurricanes and severe storms to gather information for use in atmospheric research. Mr. Arnett was meteorologist with the group. Chief Carl M. Reber accepted the award on behalf of the Research Flight Facility from the Secretary of Commerce, Luther H. Hodges. Only one medal was given for the

group, individual members receiving the certificate and lapel emblem.

The Research Flight Facility has a fleet of four planes, filled with the most up-to-date instruments for measuring weather elements. The 20 men cited in the award are responsible for the meteorological aspects of the flights, collecting the data, and maintaining the equipment.

Originally formed as part of the Weather Bureau's National Hurricane Research Project, the Research Flight Facility became a separate bureau unit in 1960. At the same time, the scope of its activities was broadened to include atmospheric investigations of all kinds throughout the year.

The establishment of the facility meant the realization of a goal long held by Weather Bureau scientists, who looked forward to the day when the Bureau would have its own

specially instrumented aircraft and trained personnel available for weather research.

In the spring of 1961, the Research Flight Facility was based at Oklahoma City, gathering information on severe storms for the Weather Bureau.

After this grueling assignment, the equipment aboard the planes had to be repaired and within a month and a half, to be ready for the hurricane season. This was a tremendous job, involving many extra hours of work at night, weekends and holidays.

Throughout the hurricane season, the men made repeated flights into extremely hazardous weather. They made six flights into Hurricane Carla in eight days. The data obtained from Carla also contributed to the excellent warnings issued by the Bureau.

The men of Research Flight Facility must leave their home base in Miami for weeks at a time to accomplish their assignments. Often they work around the clock at a job that is much more than normally hazardous.

Mr. Arnett, his wife and four daughters, are now living at Kansas City, Mo. He is a graduate of Rule High School. He has served 18 years in the United States Navy. He was meteorologist on his six months trip to the South Pole. He has been with the Weather Bureau for the past four years. He has his degree in Meteorology from the University of Monterey, Calif.

Mrs. Mary Ann Peters, a native of West Pakistan and a student at Mid-Western University in Wichita Falls, visited in Rule Monday where she spoke with school groups during the day. She was the dinner guest of the Rule Rotary Club and spoke to the group.

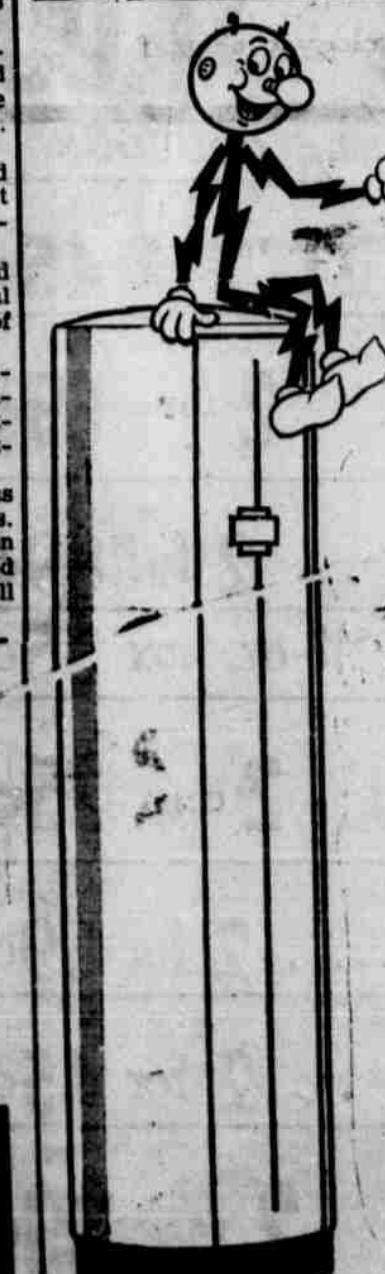

Health Department Citation For City Water Supt. Roy Oliphant

An official State Health Department citation was awarded this week to Roy Oliphant, superintendent of the Haskell municipal water and waste disposal plant, for proficiency in water plant management.

The impressively designed certificates of competence, designed by the state commission of health and authorities of the Texas Water and Sewage Works Association, credit recipients with having demonstrated "skill and knowledge" of water treatment plant management and an understanding of the public health importance of the work.

Under the State Health Department's operator certification program, operators are carefully examined on their technical ability and on their knowledge of their work's influence on community health. Each must pass a stiff written test to qualify for certification.

The Texas general sanitation law requires that at least one plant operator per shift be certified by the state health agency, but other plant personnel and persons related

fields frequently seek certification on their own time and at their own expense to advance themselves professionally and to increase their efficiency as vital public servants.

"The recipients of these certificates are a credit to their profession and to their communities," sponsors of the certification program said.

Points toward certification are earned through actual work experience and by attendance at annual district and state short schools sponsored and conducted by the Texas State Department of Health, the engineering extension service of Texas A&M College, and the Texas Water and Sewage Works Association.

School Textbook Group Makes '63 Selections

Members of the Textbook Selection Committee for the rural high schools of the county met in the office of the county superintendent on Wednesday afternoon, Feb. 28, for the purpose of selecting new textbooks for next year. The members of the committee and other teachers in the schools had previously had the opportunity to examine from three to five sample books in each subject, and all had made careful selections. The books selected will be requisitioned for next year through the county school office, and will be distributed from the county office to the schools next August. Earlier in the summer the out-of-adoption books will be collected at the county office and sent back to the State Textbook Depository. By having all the books for the county schools in one inventory, handled by the county office, the books can be passed from one school to another, if one school has a surplus and another school has a shortage. This saves the State from having to buy new books for one school while a neighboring school has extra copies on the shelf. It is often the case that whole sets of books can be transferred from one school to another, since some subjects are taught only in alternate years and another school can be using the books on their off years.

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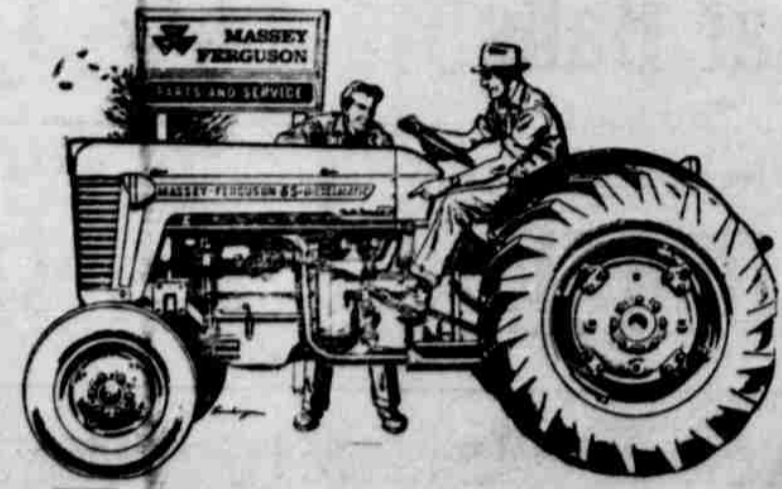
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
