Reverend C. Jones, Baptist Minister And Business Man, Dies At Age of 86

The Rev. C. Jones, 86, died at 1:15 a. m. Tuesday at his home here, He was a Baptist minister Iom Alvis in Jones and Son Sheet Metal Works of Haskell.

Funeral was held at Trinity Baptist Church here at 3 p. m. Wednesday, with the Rev. Ed-gar Tatum, Tabernacle Baptist pastor, and the Rev. K. R. Blair, Trinity Baptist pastor, officiating.

Burial was in Willow Cemetery with Holden Funeral Home in charge. Masonic rites was by Haskell Lodge No. 682,

Rev. Jones was idensed to preach by the California Baplist Church in Young County, May 8, 1904. He was ordained by the Proffit Baptist Church in Young County.

His first pastorate was the Bush Knob Church, Throckmorton. He was missionary of the Macedonia Association, embracing Throckmorton and Young counties, for four year. Rev. and Mrs. Jones moved to this county in 1910 and he became pastor of the Roberts Baptist Church 10 miles northcast of Haskell. He was pastor there 12 years.

Since then he has pastored the Rochester, O'Brien, Cottonwood Baptist churches in this county, Gillispie church in Knox county. Dry Lake, Soldier Mound and Espulah in Dickens Curry Chapel, Rockdale and Pinkerton churches in Haskell county.

He then organized the Fundamental Baptist Church here in 1939 where he was pastor until retirement in 1957.





"Because of the change in adverse effect rates announced by the Secretary of Labor on Dec. 19, 1964, it has become necessary to adjust the wage rates set out in my policy statement of March 16, 1964, to conform to the Secretary's regulations.

Accordingly, effective April 1, 1965, the following policy will be in effect:"

This is to advise agricultural employers seeking an endorsement of Form ES-320 that this office will certify adverse effect in accordance with Section 212 (a) (14) of the Immigration and Nationality Act of 1952, as amended, when the job offer (Form ES-320) shows a wage rate less than the following :

(a) For Farm Hands, General -Not less than \$1.25 per hour for any kind of general yearround farm work. The job offer must guarantee the worker \$50.00 per week. All hours in

While the Employment Service is expected to cooperate fully with the employer, in the final analysis the employer is responible for obtaining the worker.

In the event that a sponsoring employer contemplates protesting a "labor available" certification, he is hereby advised that the Employment Service is responsible for assisting him, but is not obligated to recruit the workers. The concern of the Regional Administrator at this point would be the adequacy of the employer's efforts to ob-tain domestic workers. The employer's efforts will not be considered adequate if they do not include at least the fol-

Soil, water and air are among the most important considerations when growing plants indoors for long periods of time. The roots can't grow under improper soil conditions, and

the leaves will not develop properly if the atmosphere is Past research conducted at the Texas Agricultural Experi-

ment Station shows that the best growing medium for indoor plants is a mixture of 50 percent horticultural grade perlite and 50 per cent coarse peat moss by volume, to which the proper nutrients have been added.

This mixture can be prepared for home use by uniformly mixing one and one-half bushels of horticultural grade perlite, one and one-half bushels of peat moss and four ounces of complete all-purpose rose fertilizer

Be sure that the mixture is thoroughly wet before potting planting.

When indoor plants are grown in this mixture, watering once a week and feeding once every three months will be sufficient. To feed the plants, apply the all-purpose fertilizer at a rate of one tenspoon for each sixmeh pot or one-half pound for each 100 square feet of surface

soll. Indotr plants do best when an air temperature of 60 to 70 degrees F. is maintained at night. During the day, temporatures can be as high as 85 to 90 degrees without serious problems

Light is also an important factor to consider when growing indoor plants. However, the maintenance of minimum light requirements for satisfactory growth of indoor plants is not is exacting as is usually supposed.

The brighter the natural light during the daylight hours, the shorter the period of artificial light that will be required. Also, the brighter the artificial light provided the shorter the period of illumination required. Artificial light should not be provided for longer than a total of 16 hours per day, because
