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## THE RIGHT TO CHOOSE!

Politics is one of the principal occupations in a free nation. But a nation will remain free only so long as the voters control the politicians. The people of the United States have no conception of what fear of government officials means. They have never been herded into obitvation by state police for expressing views in opposition to dictators in power. As a result, U. S. citizens have never lived in fear of officialism. Under our Constitution, they have enjoyed the right to choose ... the greatest civil right. But politics has been whittling away at that right and steadily restricting the individual's right of choice in the U. S. Therefore, it is well to read the words of one who remembers living in fear ... where the individual was the plaything of officialism ... where he had no choice. The following letter "To The Editor" appeared in the Portland Oregonian recently. It said in part: "Although my age was only eight when my father was forced to leave Russia because of persecution, my memories are very vivid of the tribulations endured under governmental controls. Because of these unforgettable experiences, the constitutional rights and liberties are treasures worthy of preservation regardless of cost." When you see a candidate for public office, or an elected official advocating policies that undermine constitutional safeguards, states rights and individual opportunity, turn thumbs down on him while you have a vote and a choice.

## TAILORED LIVESTOCK

Americans are eating more meat than ever before, and beef tops the list. The beef we consume today is a very different article from that of yesteryear. Nowadays, the housewife insists on high standards of flavor and leanness. Demand has increased for the choicer cuts of beef. This has posed a problem for producers and the other elements involved in the big job of turning livestock on the range into meat in the butcher's cabinet. But they are solving it. For instance, selective breeding practices and scientifically balanced diets make it possible to tailor the animal to our wants. The whole meat industry provides an excellent example of technological progress. Packers and processors, like producers, pursue a never-ending search for better, more economical methods, with the demands of the consumer always in view. The result is an improved product which reaches us at a price within the means of the average family's income. Another point that can't be emphasized too strongly is that meat is an example of highly competitive free enterprise at its best. The meat people have always strongly opposed government subsidies and controls even when the going had been hard. They are content with taking their chances in the free market. And that is one big reason why the industry is so sensitive to public needs and desires.

With five lettermen available, Monday was inaugurated here by Coach Bill Richey. Jack Kimbrough, back; John Kimbrough, back; Artie Pippen, end, but now being changed to back; Ernest McMillan, guard; and S. A. Moser, center, were the lettermen ready to go. A number of hustling lads from the 1934 squad are bidding for a place on the regular team. First call found Weldon Smith, tackle; Eugene Rose, guard; Lloyd McMillan, tackle; A. J. Pinkerton, end; Albert Barnett, back; Claude Jenkins, back; Duffer Crawford, center; Thomas Kaigler, end. Mr. and Mrs. Ralph Duncan returned Wednesday afternoon from a trip to San Antonio, Austin, and Carlsbad, N. M.

Three straight — and the champions of the Wichita Valley League, baseball fans of this section were treated to a baseball game Sunday afternoon—14 innings, which saw the Haskell Braves beat out the Hamlin Pied Pipers by a score of 5-to-4 behind the combined pitching of Tanny (Dipper) Jones and Gaut (Lefty) Hambricht. Haskell citizens were awakened Wednesday morning by the "clicking" of thousands of crickets which seems to fancy this city.
