Waiting too long to irrigate the crop will cost the producer rather than paying a profit." Yeary says, "He must start in time to get over the land before the crop gets past the stage that it will benefit. Water after the crop is suffering usually gives much smaller benefits than watering in time to keep a crop growing well. It is wise to cut back to a smaller area during the period of highest water use considering the moisture requirements of the crop and the effective rainfall during the period between irrigations. "A farmer can best predict

when to irrigate his crops by digging holes to see how much moisture is left in the soil." Yeary concludes, "By watching this, he can judge when the crop will need water. The crop itself will not show lack of moisture in time for much area to be irrigated. When he watches both soil and crop, each inch of water from either rainfall or irrigation can be made to give the most satisfying and

Grasshoppers can be controlled with arsenate compounds, but they must be used with care. There are other products on the market such as Greenlight, that will control grasshoppers and are not as harmful to man or beast.

Tarnished plant bugs of yellowish brown often attack small young shoots, puncturing them with their long probosci. Hand

picking will eradicate this pest. Cutworms, controll with dieldrin. Slugs, snails, sowbugs and milipeds can be controlled with poisonous baits.






