Trinity Lutheran Delegates To Attend Convention

The Southern District of the American Lutheran Church will hold its Fifth Annual Convention at the Civic Center in McAllen, Texas, on April 27-30, 1965. Five Lutheran congregations in the Valley are hosting this year's convention. More than 500 pastors and lay delegates of the District's 259 churches in Texas, Arkansas, Louisiana and New Mexico are expected to attend the convention.

Rev. Allen Johannes and Mr. Leroy Haverlah, delegates from Trinity Lutheran Church will leave on Monday, April 26, and return Friday, April 30.

The inspirational speaker for the convention will be the Rev. Robert Gussick of Mexico City. The Rev. Gussick is pastor of a congregation which was formed by a merger of an American Lutheran Church congregation and a congregation of the Lutheran Church-Missouri Synod in 1964.

Dr. Norman Menter, vice president of The American Lutheran Church, will discuss the state of the Church in these troubled and challenging times. Other dignitaries will include Dr. Kenneth Priebe, Executive Director of the Department of Stewardship of The American Lutheran Church, Dr. Edward Schramm, editor of the Lutheran Standard, the national periodical of the Church, and a representative of the Board of American Missions of The American Lutheran Church.

The opening service of the convention will be held at 7:00 p. m., Tuesday, April 27, with Dr. Vernon A. Mohr, District President, in the pulpit. Assisting in the communion service will be the Rev. E. A. Heve, executive assistant to the District President of Austin, Dr. Roald E. Braulick, vice president of the Southern District, of San Antonio, the Rev. A. E. Rode, Secretary of the District, of Austin, the Rev. Paul Frank, of Dallas, the Rev. Robert Otterstad, of Waco, and the pastors of the five sponsoring Valley congregations: The Rev. Oskar Salge, of Edinburg, the Rev. William Putnam, of Westlaco, the Rev. Norton McCaughan, chairman of the convention committee, of San Juan, the Rev. Irvin S. Briese, of Elisa, and the Rev. Robert C. Taylor, of Mission.

Sideline features will be a conducted tour of the city of Reynosa in Old Mexico with a meal and opportunity to do some shopping, and on Thursday evening, members of the convention will have the opportunity to visit in the valley congregations and enjoy a meal there, giving the conventioners the chance to look into our work among the Latin American people.

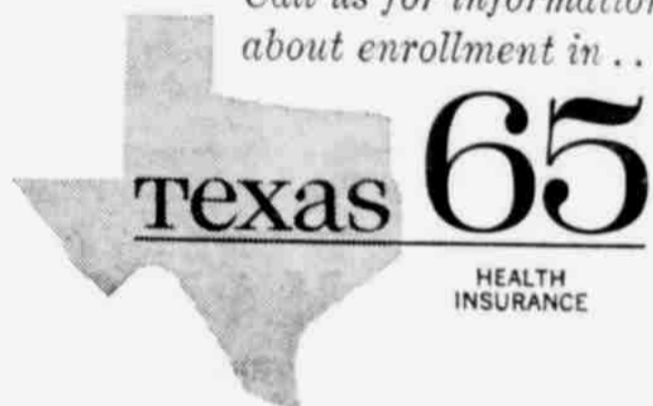

Mealy bugs: A white bug that leaves a white web on plants, is controlled with a white oil emulsion.

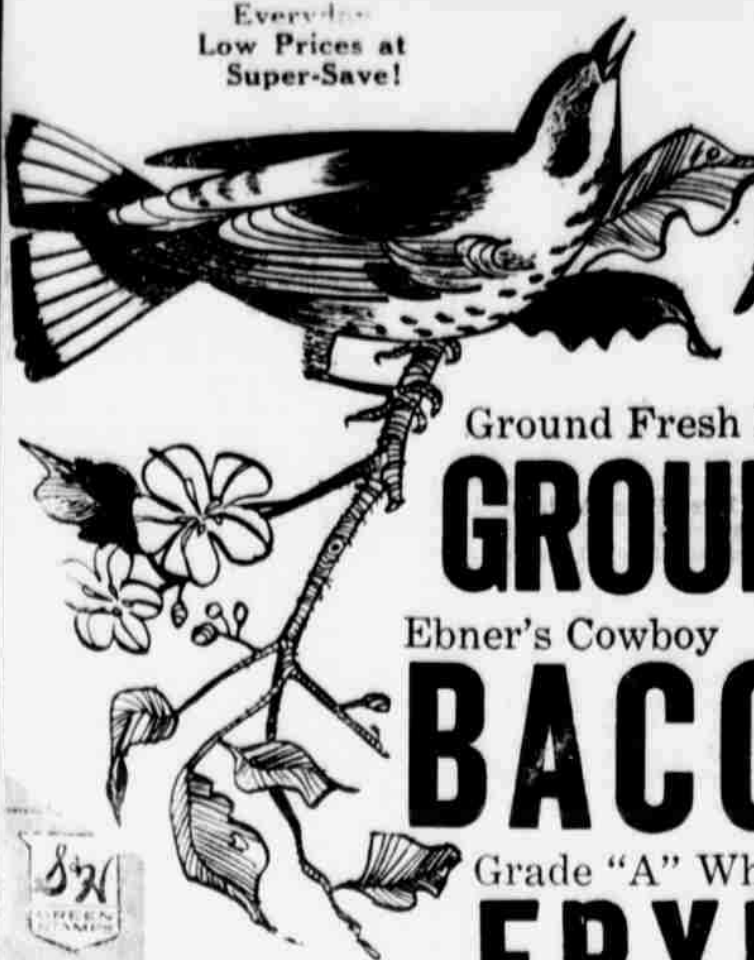
