

Give the small ones a little plot of land; and a few well chosen seeds. Let them have a garden all their own. Show them how to till the soil and plant the seed. Teach them how



If we would build a town, let us apply the proper tools. Let us plumb our actions on the known and admitted needs of the town, and not upon personal animosity and bitterness. Let us square our actions on the basic virtues of honesty and integrity rather than lies and deceptions. Let us level our thoughts so that they extend beyond ourselves and encompass the future generations who are to follow us... as well as those around us who need our help as much as we need their friendship and well-being. We will either stand together with our surrounding communities, or we will all fall together in a dead heap. Our concern must include all persons of all races, colors and creeds... and all persons should receive equal consideration and respect.

# RUSSIAN MIND ENSLAVED ROTARIANS TOLD

Rotarians and guests.

The Russians generally are warm, friendly people, Gatewood declared, and it is startling to see first-hand what an amazingly few members of the Communist Party have accomplished in poisoning the minds of so many.

He told of the yearning great hordes of people in Russia have for religion, and for religious literature, particularly Bibles. But there was an alarming lack of young people in the church he attended, so effective has been the schooling of younger aged Russians in Communism.

On the other hand, a 700-seat church was jammed with 1,500 Russians, more than half

of whom stood for a 2 1/2 hour service while he was there, Gatewood reported. Songbooks were practically non-existent, and one frayed example he saw in the possession of an elderly woman contained 600 songs, all written in English. The ACC student, who plans to enter the mission field, told an intrigued Rotary assembly.

Supplementing his talk with slides, Gatewood said that 15 Bibles in the Russian language were confiscated at the airport there by customs officials, who, by their quizzical expressions, indicated they never had seen a Bible before.

The purpose of the Gatewoods' visit was to make a religious survey with a view toward mission work in Russia in the future, he said. They sent Mr. Khrushchev a telegram asking an audience, and received a courteous reply of regret that he was going to be out of the country in Yugoslavia.

from Christian countries." The visiting Americans gleaned much from their Russian guides, who, when asked what they anticipated in the future if they didn't believe in life after death, always replied, "The year 1980." This is the year the perfect Communist state, "with everyone loving everybody else," is supposed to come into being, said Gatewood.

## 3 Hurt In Nine County Crashes During February

The Texas Highway Patrol investigated nine accidents on highways in Haskell County during the month of February, according to Sergeant Frank Jirick, state highway patrol supervisor for this area, headquartered in Haskell.

These wrecks resulted in injuries to three persons and an estimated property damage of \$4,610.00, Sgt. Jirick reported. There were no fatalities in Haskell County during February from traffic, but the county recorded its first motor vehicle death of the year in the extreme northeast corner last week.

The rural traffic accident summary for this county for the first two months of 1964 shows a total of 10 accidents with three persons hurt and property damage totalling \$5,100, Sgt. Jirick said.

The highway patrol sergeant from Haskell reminded Monday that Texas reached its darkest hour in traffic fatalities in 1963, with the preliminary death count standing at 2,703, which is 282 more lives lost than in 1962. Also this is 92 greater than the previous all-time high of 2,611 set in 1956.

A statement of policy and purpose concerning the operation of the five-county farm labor office of the Texas Employment Commission in Room 5, of the Haskell County Courthouse here, was released Monday by Bill Estep, the new manager.

This office, Estep said, has a main responsibility for "serving employers needing agricultural employees." Farmers and ranchers needing farm workers are encouraged to contact this office and list their needs, while applicants seeking agricultural work should register at the office for employment.

Estep declared his "prime interest" is to arrange inter-

views between employers and applicants regarding employment. The labor representative registers applicants and screens them for the employer to interview. The employer makes the final choice on who is hired.

There is no charge for the services of the Texas Employment Commission's Farm Labor Office here, Estep emphasized.

This office in Haskell has responsibility for five counties—Haskell, Stonewall, Throckmorton, Knox and Baylor. A Farm Labor day has been set each Thursday here to get employers and prospective employees together for possible employment. The worth of the office here is determined by employer-employee participation, Estep pointed out.



## WOMAN CHARGED WITH INTENT TO MURDER IN STREET AFFRAY

Echo of a single pistol shot fired less than a block from the Courthouse Square disturbed the calm in mid-town Haskell shortly after 9 a. m. Sunday and investigation by county officers led to the arrest of a woman in the apparent renewal of a long smoldering feud between two Latin American families here.

Mrs. Willie Castillo, 42, was taken into custody by Sheriff Garth Garrett late Sunday afternoon and brought to the office of District Attorney Royce Adkins, before whom a charge of assault with intent to commit murder was filed. Mrs. Castillo was placed in Haskell County Jail under \$1,000 bond. She later executed bond.

Sheriff Garrett said the woman allegedly "took a pot shot" at Manuel De La Rosa, Jr., 18, as he stood at the corner of the Smart Laundry, Avenue C and South First Street, just a block east of the Square. Young De La Rosa streaked for cover behind a nearby building in a move described by witnesses as "so fast it looked as if he might have out run the bullet."

The accused woman was said to have been standing in front of the United Industries, Inc., office here, less than 100 feet from De La Rosa at the time.

Records here show that the father of the supposedly intended victim of the Sunday affray here was charged with and tried for the murder of Mrs. Castillo's son, Florencio Castillo, 26, in front of the Tomche Cafe here on August 18, 1962. Manuel De La Rosa, Sr., was found guilty of murder by a jury in 39th District Court here on January 29, 1963, and received a sentence of 5 years, which was suspended.
