## EULA WATER SUPPLY CORP. GETS SUPPORT FROM CITIZENS

EULA — A meeting was held in Eula High School Cafeteria Tuesday night concerning the Eula Water Supply Corporation. There were 140 interested persons present at this very important meeting.

Officials present were: Leon Decker, Engineer; Jim Cross, Attorney; Foy Brown, FHA Co. Supervisor; E. L. Foster, District Supervisor for FHA; and M. M. Tabor, Clyde City Council.

Mac Coppinger, Superintendent of Eula School, called the meeting to order and explained the goals of the corporation to the group.

E. L. Foster explained the FHA's place in the program. They loan \$1,900 to \$1,200 per customer. He gave several interesting examples of this type program.

Foy Brown, FHA Agent, said his main responsibility is to work with the board of directors of the corporation.

Leon Decker, Engineer, said his role is to work with FHA to see that all state and local requirements are met.

Jim Cross, Attorney, said his firm would handle all the legal work for the corporation.

M. M. Tabor, representing the City Council of Clyde, reported that progress is being made on plans for the treatment plant and system.

A question and answer period was held and many questions were explained to the group.

Five men were elected as a Steering Committee to work until a Board of Directors is formed. They are: Lloyd Barr Jr., Jack Farmer, Gerald Holcomb, Weldon Edwards and Winford Gardner.

## Omar Burleson Announced 20,000 Will Receive New Mail Delivery

Congressman Omar Burleson today announced that nearly 20,000 families - about 60,000 individuals - have been provided with mail delivery services for the first time under a recent order from the Postmaster General.

The order benefits those persons served out of about 17,000 first, second and third class post offices that do not have city delivery services.

Where they live more than a half mile away from the post

office they have been eligible for rural delivery services all along. However, under this new order, they will need to live only a minimum quarter mile away to get the service.

Many additional persons are qualified but service has not yet been extended because the advantages of the new program are not full understood in some communities. For this reason, the Post Office Department has distributed information on the program widely.

Under the new order, those desiring the services in qualified areas need only contact their postmasters.

A total of 841 post offices have already provided mail deliveries under the new liberalized standards.

At Clyde, six families and 22 individuals have benefited.

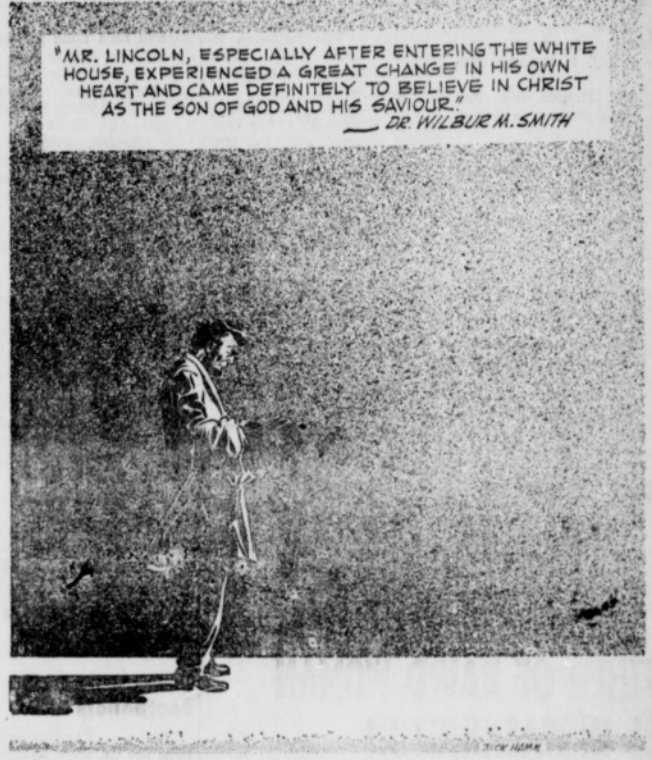

**PUBLIC NOTICE**  
Proposed **CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT**  
NUMBER SEVEN ON THE BALLOT (HJR 22)  
General Election Nov. 3, 1970

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:  
Section 1. That Subsection (a), Section 64, Article III, of the Texas Constitution, be amended to read as follows:  
"Section 64. (a) The Legislature may by special statute provide for consolidation of governmental offices and functions of government of any one or more political subdivisions comprising or located within any county. Any such statute shall require an election to be held within the political subdivisions affected thereby with approval by a majority of the voters in each of these subdivisions, under such terms and conditions as the Legislature may require."  
Sec. 2. NUMBER FIVE ON THE BALLOT (HJR28)  
General Election Nov. 3, 1970

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:  
Section 1. That Section 52, Article III, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended to read as follows:  
"Section 52. (a) Except as otherwise provided by this section, the Legislature shall have no power to authorize any county, city, town or other political corporation or subdivision of the State to lend its credit or to grant public money or thing of value in aid of, or to any individual, association or corporation whatsoever, or to become a stockholder in such corporation, association or company."  
(b) Under Legislative provision, any county, any political subdivision of a county, any number of adjoining counties, or any political subdivision of the State, or any defined district now or hereafter to be described and defined within the State of Texas, and which may or may not include, towns, villages or municipal corporations, upon a vote of two-thirds majority of the resident property taxpayers voting thereon who are qualified electors of such dis-

trict or territory to be affected thereby, in addition to all other debts, may issue bonds or otherwise lend its credit in any amount not to exceed one-fourth of the assessed valuation of the real property of such district or territory, except that the total bonded indebtedness of any city or town shall never exceed the limits imposed by other provisions of this Constitution, and levy and collect taxes to pay the interest thereon and provide a sinking fund for the redemption thereof, as the Legislature may authorize, and in such manner as it may authorize the same, for the following purposes to wit:  
(1) The improvement of rivers, creeks, and streams to prevent overflows, and to permit of navigation thereof, or irrigation thereof, or in aid of such purposes.  
(2) The construction and maintenance of pools, lakes, reservoirs, dams, canals and waterways for the purposes of irrigation, drainage or navigation, or in aid thereof.  
(3) The construction, maintenance and operation of macadamized, graveled or paved roads and turnpikes, or in aid thereof.  
(c) Notwithstanding the provisions of Subsection (b) of this Section, bonds may be issued by any county in an amount not to exceed one-fourth of the assessed valuation of the real property in the county, for the construction, maintenance, and operation of macadamized, graveled, or paved roads and turnpikes, or in aid thereof, upon a vote of a majority of the resident property taxpayers voting thereon who are qualified electors of the county, and without the necessity of further or amendatory legislation. The county may levy and collect taxes to pay the interest on the bonds as it becomes due and to provide a sinking fund for redemption of the bonds."  
Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1970, at which election the ballots shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition: "The constitutional amendment authorizing any county, on the vote of a majority of its qualified property taxing electors, to issue road bonds in an amount not to exceed one-fourth of the assessed valuation of the real property in the county."

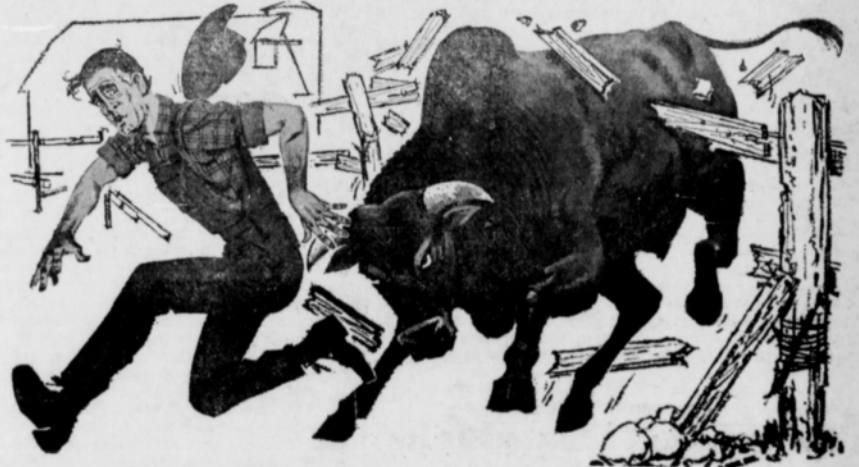

## TEXAS WATER QUALITY BOARD PROPOSES REGULATIONS

AUSTIN — Commercial hog lots located near public flowing streams of surface water supplies will be placed under regulation in the near future by the Texas Water Quality Board. Notice of public hearing has been published in 12 daily newspapers across the state. The hearing is set for 10 a. m. August 4 at the Terrace Motor Hotel in Austin.

Also, any swine producing operation may be required to comply with regulations if it is located over a sensitive groundwater area where seepage may cause contamination of wells or other water supply in the neighborhood. Hog farms are subject to regulation if they cause a nuisance or appreciable damage to public waters in the state.

The regulation does not apply to small-farm hog producers unless they are endangering some public water supply. It is primarily written to cover units with 50 or more breeding animals. Five hundred pigs under 50 pounds would also be under regulation.

Anyone interested in receiving a copy of the proposed regulation can get one by writing to the Texas Water Quality Board, 1108 Lavaca, Austin, Texas 78701. All concerned are invited to write their comments to the Board, or to appear and testify at the hearing.
