ANNUAL STEAK EATING CONTEST SLATED IN AMARILLO

The ninth annual Texas State Steak Eating Championship will be held February 10 at the Big Texan Steak Ranch located on Interstate 40 East in Amarillo.

Contestants from the panhandle area will be participating in this state wide event which is scheduled to begin at 6 p.m. and end at 8 p.m. Judges for the contest will be Amarillo city dignitaries and state officials.

Last year's winner, Clem Novak of Amarillo became the steak eating champion by devouring 16 pounds of steak in two hours. He received a cashprize of \$100.

The steaks used in the contest are one-pound Kansas City strip steaks. At least 100 are prepared ahead of time to keep ahead of the eaters. The steaks are cooked to the preference of the contestants. Each contestant is assigned a table upon arrival and a waitress who will be his official score keeper. The contestant specifies how his steak is to be cooked and the waitress brings steaks as fast as one can eat them.

Those wishing to participate in the steak eating championship should contact the Big Texan Steak Ranch in Amarillo. A registration fee of \$7.50 is required of each participant.

Jim Allison gave a talk on demonstrations. Those wishing to give a demonstration should contact Jim or Blanche.

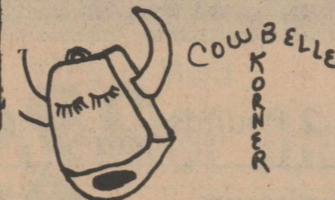

BEEF BROWNIES

1/2 c. finely ground beef [cooked and drained]

3 eggs
1 c. sugar
1/2 t. salt
1 t. vanilla
1/2 c. butter or margarine
2 squares unsweetened chocolate
3/4 c. flour
1/2 t. baking powder
1/2 c. chopped nuts
confectioner's sugar

Beat eggs, sugar, salt and vanilla together until fluffy. Melt butter and chocolate. Cool and add to egg mixture. Add ground beef and mix well. Preheat oven to 350 degrees. Sift flour and baking powder together and stir into beef mixture. Add nuts. Spread in an 8x8 inch pan lined with waxed paper. Bake 35 minutes. Cool. Sprinkle with confectioner's sugar, cut into squares and remove from pan.

VARIATION: Add 3/4 c. mince meat instead of ground beef

What's New In School.....

What is the Texas Handicapped Children's Early Childhood Program? Who can participate in the program? Where is the program carried out? When are the classes held? And the most important question of all, Why do we have this program?

The Texas Handicapped Children's Early Childhood Program, THCECP for short, is a Federally funded program for preschool aged children, age zero thru four, that has a handicap. This handicap might be a speech impairment, a visual impairment, a hearing impairment, a physical handicap, a learning disability, an emotional problem, mental retardation, or any combination of these.

Any child that has a handicap and meets the age requirement is possible candidate for the program. A psychologist from the Educational Service Center in Amarillo tests the child to determine the extent of the handicap. After the testing has been completed, the psychologist knows the needs of the child and she is able to give suggestions on teaching activities for the child.

Mary Allen Elementary School is the hub of activity for the program. The children come to the school classroom for part of their instruction and the teachers go into the homes for

part of the instruction. The major reason for going into the home is to help the parents become teachers of their own children. We show the parents how to work with their child, how to play with their child. We take materials and games into the home, we demonstrate how these are used, and we let the parents teach their own children different lessons.

Each child has an individualized schedule. Some of the children come every day, some come two times a week. Some children come for thirty minutes, others come for an hour. The program is structured so that the needs of each child can be met.

The most important concept of this program is that we must help our handicapped children as early as we possibly can. Early intervention and education is the most effective way to help the child. The earlier a problem is diagnosed and dealt with, the better the chances of helping the child. A child's world is full of new and exciting adventures, but if he can't see, or hear, or can't express himself, it loses much of the excitement and splendor.

Junior Livestock Show Set for Feb. 13-14-15

Sherman County Junior Livestock Show will be next weekend, February 12-13-14, at the County Barns in Stratford.

Over 150 head of livestock will be all pampered and primed for the big show by members of local FFA and 4-H Chapters.

County Agricultural Agent Jim Allison and FFA Instructors Richard Carter and Charles Roberts say they have a host of fine animals which will be up for the judges in the impending show and sale.

All animals will have to be in place at the County Barns Thursday so that weighing and sifting can get underway at 1 p.m. Swine will have to weigh at least 190 pounds and not over 240 pounds, cattle must weigh at least 850 pounds and not over 1,250 pounds. No weight limits are in effect for lambs.

Commercial steers beginning weight had to be between 475 and 525 pounds and these animals have been on pasture since September 1. These will be judged on a pen of 3 basis.

The Show itself will begin on Friday at 9 a.m. with the Swine Judging. They will be judged by Ike Trimble, ag instructor at Boys Ranch; with the lamb judging beginning at 2 p.m. on Friday with Bob Robinson, county agent from Potter County to judge.

Commercial steer judging will begin at 9 a.m. on Saturday with Ed Wright, Texas Department of Agriculture, Amarillo, and Ernie Heitschmidt, Guymon, to judge these animals.

Show steer judging will begin at 10 a.m. Saturday with Bob Skaggs, vo ag instructor at Pampa, to place these animals.

The annual Junior Livestock Sale will begin at 1 p.m. in the arena.

Entry fees will be \$2 per animal, the 4-H members must turn in entry fees by 5 p.m. on Tuesday, Feb. 10, along with their meat animal project form.

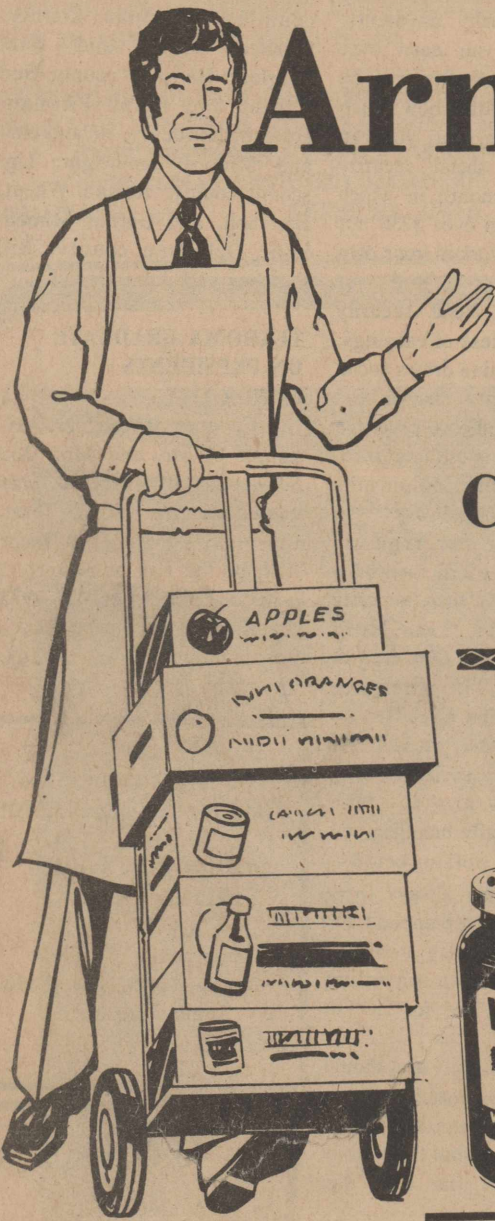
