

In the State of Texas we have a Legislature which meets every other year, and as some have observed, then we spend the middle years trying to undo what the Legislature did the preceding year.

This year looks like no exception.

Except, this year we have noted that down in Austin a fellow named Goodman has really upset some members of that august body. It seems that Goodman has filed suit for the removal of all lawyers from the State Legislature on the grounds they are all members of the State Bar of Texas which has always tried to claim that it is an extension of government in our

We have always maintained that the State Bar of Texas is just a trade association of lawyers, no different from our own Texas Press Association. But, lawyers have maintained differently.

Now, Mr. Goodman has taken them at their own word and lodged this suit because the Constitution of the State of Texas states emphatically that no member of one branch of state government may serve, at the same time, in another branch! Therefore, lawyers, who are members through their State Bar of the Judicial Branch, are illegally serving in the Legislative branch and should get out of one or the other.

Since Mr. Goodman is not a lawyer, and probably doesn't have one to represent him, probably won't get far with his suit, but we sure hope he does.

We have written in this column before that we believe there are already lawyers writing our laws now. Then it takes another lawyer to interpret the law and so on and on to infinity!

We would point out there are currently 31 State Senators in Texas and 21 of them are lawyers, and of the 150 members of the House of Representatives in Texas 58 are

lawvers. In all seriousness, Mr. Goodman is right. Something has to be changed. Either the State Bar of Texas should quit calling itself a branch of government or the lawyers

should all resign their positions. Frankly, we would rather the lawyers all resign. Then perhaps some laws could be written in language that you and me could understand without

the help of a lawyer. We notice that we are not alone in our thinking about lawyers. President Jimmy White. Carter has stated in an Executive Order to heads of government agencies that they reduce the size of their legal



AUSTIN — Texas homeowners may be in for an increase in their insurance rates.

Insurance companies, at a hearing last week, asked for an eight per cent statewide average raise in homeowner policies, citing costs of construction and general inflation.

Board of Insurance statisticians will present their own recommendations at a March 9 hearing.

New rates would become effective with policies written or renewed in July.

In the past, the board usually has adopted rates lower than those sought by the industry.

Lumping fire, homeowners and extended coverage together, the industry seeks a 6.6 per cent average hike in premiums charged building owners.
