



AUSTIN - New federal judgeshins may be raining on Texas if a court bill passed by the U.S. Senate and approved (in slightly altered form) by the House Judiciary Committee becomes law.

Both versions of the legislature would create more than 100 new federal district courts and 35 additional circuit judgeships.

Ten of the district courts recommended by the Senate would be assigned to Texas. The Senate bill further recommended splitting the Fifth Circuit Court of Appeals, to provide a new Eleventh Circuit for Texas and Louisiana, and that would mean still more appellate judges for

The House committee bill would set up 110 new district courts, allocating nine of them to Texas.

Under the Senate bill. Texas' big southern district could get five district courts. The same district would get four in the House version. Both bills would provide three district courts for the northern district and one each for the western and eastern districts.

New courts mean a major patronage plum for President Carter - and Democratic U.S. Sen. Lloyd Bentsen who will recommend appointments of Texas judges to the president

The State Board of Insurance has agreed to hold the line pending a new hearing in July. The decision meant rates

would remain \$193 million below those requested by insurance companies and \$112 million below original board staff recommendationsbased on about \$1.1 billion in annual private passenger car premiums. Board actuaries originally recommended a 10.1 per cent hike, after the industry last summer asked 17.4 per cent more. A special rate consultant to the regulatory agency later suggested 1.8 per cent was adequate. Meanwhile, State Farm Insurance Company announced its profits justified a rebate of \$7.5 million in excess premiums to state

Land Sale Set

A lease sale next month of nearly 750,000 acres of state owned land may bring another \$7 million to the state's public school fund.

The School Land Board has advertised for bids February 7 on the lands, which include 510,000 acres in the Gulf of Mexico.

The state leases the land to oil companies and individuals for a minimum of \$25 an acre, plus a one-fifth royalty on any production.

Good Industry Year Preliminary statistics indicate 1977 was a banner year for industrial development in

Texas. More than 210 companies announced plans for a Texas location last year, with a month yet to be accounted for. And plants are hiring more people.

While plants locating in 1976 hired an average of 38 people, the same plant in 1977 employed 54.

The Supreme Court twice refused to interfere with a recount of a Panhandle State Senate District 31 runoff after Secretary of State Steve Oaks ordered it.

A Waco intermediate court's decision that may force an insurance company to pay \$11,500 on a burned rural house in Navarro County which witnesses said was worth no more than \$3,000 will be reviewed by the Supreme Court.

Sealcoating Plans Made By Court

Plans for sealcoating county roads, naming members of the salary grievance committee, purchase of culverts for the county and amending the budget highlighted this past Monday's meeting of the Commissioners Court held in the Court House.

The Court authorized the advertisement for bids for culverts for use during the year by Judge W. S. Frizzell. The legal notice for this purpose may be found in this issue.

The Court also ordered that all county officers be paid on a salary basis for the year and a copy of the order sent to the State Comptroller.

The Court named members of the Salary Grievance Committee for the year. They shall consist of Sheriff Clois Vaughn, Marguerite Terrell, Marillyn Albert, Dale Summa, Ernestine Almquist, Louise Evans, Joan Bell and Eugene Sadler.

The salary of County Attorney Dale Summa was approved in the amount of \$650 per month.

In other business the Court amended the budget to include a number of increases for the year that were not included earlier. The amount includes a number of construction contract totals, auditor's salary, tax suit costs, court reporting costs and miscellaneous office supplies.







FB Prexy Reports On Bergland Visit WASHINGTON, D.C.--Texas

Farm Bureau President Carrol Chaloupka said that Secretary of Agriculture Bob Bergland has promised a number of actions to help alleviate the current farm income depression. Chaloupka, a beef and grain

producer from Dalhart, met Jan. 5 for an hour Thursday in Jody Richardson and the Elks, private audience with the they really put out and I for one Agriculture Secretary in Wash-The Texas farm leader said

Secretary Bergland promised to move on a number of fronts--including increased farm credit, expanded dollar exports, more food for peace shipments, and changes in the meat import law--to help farmers and ranchers during the present income crisis. "Secretary Bergland felt that

the best way out of our current problems would be expanding farm exports and the movement of surpluses overseas under Public Law 480, the food for peace program," Chaloupka The TFB president said ***

Secretary Bergland promised his administration would do everything within reason to make available Farmers Home administration loans to keep farmers in business. Chaloupka said that Bergland

agreed to have the USDA work with Farm Bureau and other organizations to expand dollar sales abroad. The secretary reported that the United States is now working to lower tariff barriers on American beef coming into Japan. Under Public Law 480.

American farm products-primarily surplus grain--is moved to needy nations on a subsidized basis. Chaloupka said Secretary Bergland agreed to step up such shipments. Chaloupka said Bergland agreed to help get legislative

changes in the meat import law to assist cattle producers. The Texas farm leader said what is needed is a formula that reduces red meat imports during periods of high beef production in this country and that Secretary Bergland agrees with this. Chaloupka said Bergland expressed the desire for farmers to get their income in the

marketplace because he said the alternative is total domination by the federal government. "I told him that we would appreciate it very much if he would take a real strong stand for the farmer instead of being a champion of the consumer, and

he agreed with me," Chaloupka said. "He understands our problems, and it's nice to talk with a farmer who heads up the Department of Agriculture.'

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




