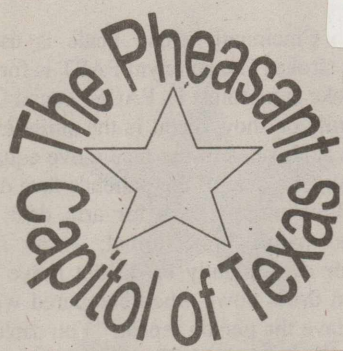

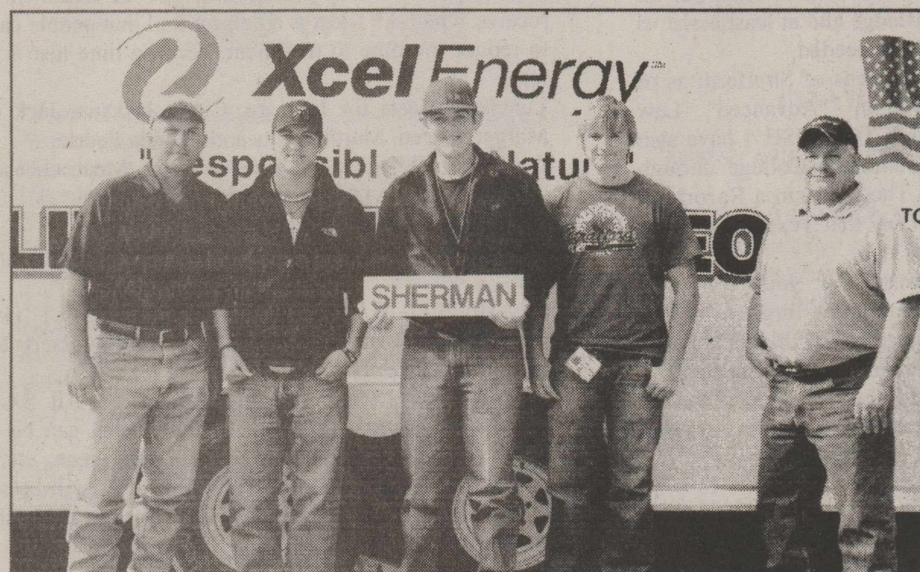

USDA Announces Last Call for Producers to File AGI Forms with the IRS-

Failure to do so Will Result in Interruption of Program Payments

(Stratford, TX) — July 25, 2011 - Sherman County USDA Farm Service Agency (FSA) Executive Director Rebecca Hemphill, reminds producers that they must submit an Adjusted Gross Income (AGI) verification consent form (CCC-927 or CCC-928) to the IRS as soon as possible in order to maintain eligibility for 2009 and 2010 program benefits.

The consent form authorizes IRS to verify for FSA whether a payment recipient's AGI meets the eligibility requirements for FSA programs. The form became a requirement for payment eligibility beginning with the 2009 crop year, however many program participants have not yet submitted this form for 2009 and 2010 program benefits.

"Producers who fail to file these forms before Sept. 2011 will receive a notice from the National Office stating that the producer is ineligible for 2009 and/or 2010 payments," said Hemphill. "The producer will be responsible for fully refunding all payments received under programs subject to AGI limitations," she said.

IRS requires written consent from all individuals or legal entities before verification of the average AGI can be provided to USDA. Individuals must submit form CCC-927 and legal entities must submit form CCC-928. Without these forms on file, eligible producers will not receive USDA program payments.

Hemphill further clarifies that these consent forms are required for payments received from the Natural Resources Conservation Service (NRCS) as well as those received through FSA. Completed forms must be returned to the IRS.

Public Notice

As you all know, this year hasn't been the best in terms of getting some good west Texas rain showers that we all enjoy and are used to. In fact, we have been dry as a bone. In drought conditions like this, we all are exposed to many unpleasant circumstances, one being the lack of rain water to supplement the need for water on our lawns and in other locations. Because of this, water customers tend to use more water from the public water supply. With such an influx of use, stress is often placed on the equipment and facilities of a city's water distribution system.

At this point in time the City of Stratford's water system is not experiencing difficulties in keeping up with the demand of our customers, but our equipment has had to work extra hard to keep water levels and pressures at sufficient levels. In an effort to reduce the stress on the City's water distribution system and to help reduce the exposure of an equipment outage, the City Administrator has issued a memorandum to all City employees asking them to practice water conservation at work and at home. Practices the City is going to implement include minimal watering of the City's park system, quicker response and resolution of water leaks, working with contractors to practice water conservation, etc...

With this in mind, the City is asking you to be aware of your usage of water this summer as well. The Public Works Department is in need of your assistance in conserving water. During these extreme conditions we are asking that you be conscientious about lawn watering and not water during the heat of the day when much of the water will evaporate before the soil can absorb it. Early morning and late evening watering is more beneficial to your lawn and our water system.

Some more tips can be found below from an article titled "Watering Lawns in the Summer" written by Gabby Hyman, All About Lawns Columnist.

Water is the elixir of all life on earth. In the heart of the American summer, water becomes the paramount issue in lawn care. Surprisingly, most people kill off their lawns through over watering during the hot summer.

We waste a lot of ground water through run-off from poor, hard soils or by simply watering the lawn in the afternoon heat, when it evaporates before the soil can absorb it. Knowing when to water your grass, how often, and how much can help you maintain a luxuriant lawn through the hottest season.

Diagnose Your Lawn

Not all lawns need the same amount of water. It's important to know that your lawn's health depends as much on soil conditions as on the kind of seed you use.

In worst-case water-shortage scenarios, Centipede grass, Bermuda grass, and Bahia and St. Augustine grasses have relatively modest needs. These varieties, depending on summer temperatures, can actually survive quite well if left un-watered up to three weeks -- not that you need to wait that long. Carpet Grass, Tall Fescue, Fine Fescue, Kikuyu, and Zoysia grass are moderately tolerant. If you've planted any of these grasses, you can stop watering for a week without damaging your lawn.

Kentucky blue grass, Bent grass, and Perennial rye grass are guzzlers. Don't let them go without water for more than four or five days in hot weather.

Watering

Watering at daybreak can be up to ten times more effective as any other time of day, so start early, before the heat of the day can burn the water off.

Ed Sanders

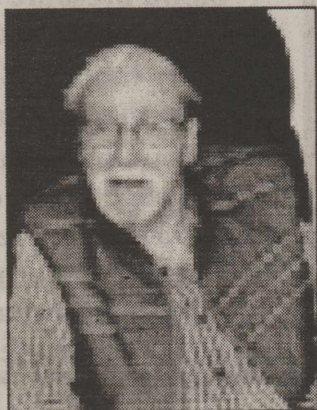
Ed Sanders, 91, of Stratford died on Wednesday, July 20, 2011.

Survivors include his wife, Liz Sanders of the home and a brother, Jerry Sanders of Levelland.



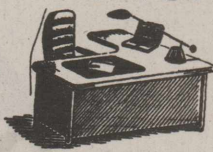
Albert Ray Sims

React FAST- The Cincinnati Stroke Scale is used by EMT's to identify a stroke. The acronym FAST is for quick identification of stroke symptoms: F- FACE- Facial Droop: Have the person smile or show teeth. Is the smile even or lop-sided? Normal: Both sides of the face move equally or not at all. Abnormal: One side of the patient's face droops. A- ARM- Motor Weakness: Check for arm drift: close eyes, extend arms, palms up. Normal: Arms remain extended equally, or drift equally or do not move at all. Abnormal: One arm drifts down when compared with the other. S- Speech- Have the person repeat, "You can't teach an old dog new tricks". Normal The phrase is repeated clearly and correctly. Abnormal: Words are slurred, abnormal, or can't speak. T- Time- Last seen. Normal This is important in determining the type of treatment they receive. The FAST test is a helpful tool that people can use to reduce the time to treatment, because time lost is brain lost.

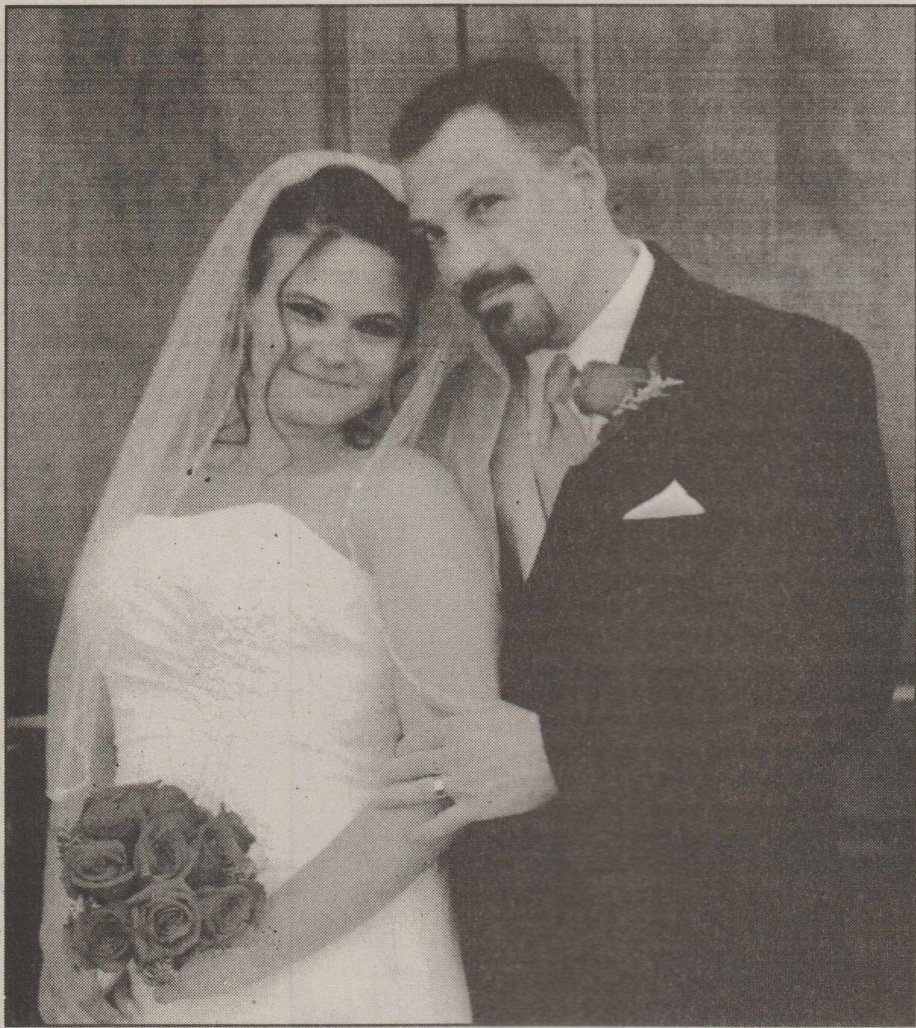

Forage Testing for Nitrates and Prussic Acid

The current drought has many producers attempting to salvage failed corn, sorghum and similar crops by grazing or baling the stover for later use as animal feed. The Texas AgriLife Extension Service Soil, Water and Forage Testing Laboratory (SWFTL) has received numerous corn and sorghum samples containing highly elevated nitrates, often at levels significantly high enough to prevent safe use of the forage. Agricultural producers can follow several steps to minimize nitrates in the baled forages, including raising the cutter height to leave the high nitrate lower stalk in the field.

Since nitrate accumulation and prussic acid formation occur in different parts of the plant, no one sample will adequately address both potential threats. Producers should sample multiple plants and segregate the lower stalks into ground-8" and 8-16" samples. The cutting heights are only suggestions and should be based on the producer's equipment and ability to bale the hay in standing stalks. The more aggressive sampling protocol will allow a producer to better understand the concentrations of nitrates in the lower stalk and then raise or lower the cutter bar to maximize forage baled or minimize the nitrates in the baled hay. While stalk nitrate levels are highest in these lower stalks, a producer may elect to measure the nitrate concentrations in the remaining plant to provide added assurance that it is safe for grazing, in the event the lower 16" of stalk is highly elevated with regard to nitrates.

A number of sources can be located both on the web and through university publications citing defining safe nitrate levels. The cited values will vary considerably and are often significantly more conservative of the 1% nitrate value historically recognized by the Texas Veterinary Medical Diagnostic Laboratory (TVMDL). Producers should be cautioned that the TVMDL 1% level assumes that cattle are healthy, have good conditioning and have an overall high energy level in their diets. Prior to feeding forages with nitrate levels in the 0.5-1% range which are going to be fed to weak, lactating and animals with reduced body condition scores, producers should consult their veterinarian. Producers should also avoid using average nitrate values within the forage, as more timid or later feeding cattle will likely be exposed to a higher percentage of lower stalk material, thus resulting in the consumption of unsafe levels of nitrates. The use of a bale grinder can be used to reduce selective feeding. Grinding nitrate tainted forages with clean forages, thus lowering the nitrate levels to less than 1%, is another management option available to some producers.

Both the SWFTL and TVMDL routinely analyze forages for nitrates, while the TVMDL is the sole prussic acid laboratory within the Texas A&M University System. Both laboratories prioritize these samples during times of drought and attempt to provide next business day results.
