Flag Returns to Murdock School

The last day of school was May 19, 1950 the last day the students said the Pledge of Allegiance to a Flag that would be placed in a paint can and hid from sound and light for 60 years. With respect of the flag someone took the time to clean the can before placing the properly folded flag in a quiet dark library (known to the students as the book room).

The Flag stayed hid until 2010 when out of curiosity someone found the can and wonder why the paint can was so clean. Why and who would clean a paint can when doing so was quite a chore, someone wanted to hide or preserve something. After opening the can part of the question was answered, but who would have placed the flag in the can, perhaps Evelyn Barker the last teacher? Finding the flag was quite a treasure, but we will never know who honored the flag enough to preserve it in a can with an air tight lid.

According to the Texas Teacher's Daily Register 1949-1950, the last students to see the Flag was Leon Eden, Billy Sanderson, Ronnie Outhier, Billy Bob Armstrong, Henry Purnell, Lynda Brewster, Joan Ford, Linda Taylor, Sue Martin, Mary Janice Boren, Mary Alice Davis, Patricia Armstrong and Betty Sanderson.

After finding the Flag the students and/or students family was approached, giving them the opportunity to pay for having the Flag archived. The joy they had of the Flag being found and the opportunity to save the old Flag was just over whelming, the money for the archiving came in quickly. The Flag journeyed to Amarillo for archiving in April of 2011 and will return to the school on the 19th of August, Roylynn Evans with the Colony will deliver the Flag and prepare the wall for the Flag.

On Saturday, August 20 at 1 P.M. there will be a dedication ceremony to bring the Flag back into the School. Howard Norvell, Green Post 262 of the American Legion will dedicate the Flag to the School, Mary Crabtree Olson will accept the Flag in behave of the Murdock School.

FSA Administrator to Tour Areas of Texas Struck by Worst Drought in State History

FSA Administrator to Tour Areas of Texas Struck by Worst Drought in State History WASHINGTON, Aug. 10, 2011 - Farm Service Agency (FSA) Administrator Bruce Nelson traveled to Texas today to tour areas of the southern parts of the state devastated by drought and wildfires. Nelson said that USDA would continue to work to deliver assistance to those impacted by drought and encouraged producers to contact their local county or state USDA Service Center or Farm Service Agency office. Nelson also highlighted an announcement made earlier this week that will offer additional flexibility in the Conservation Reserve Program to assist producers struggling from drought.

"Our top priority is to make sure that all farmers and ranchers know that we are here for them and that FSA provides programs to help them through one of the worst disasters in this state's history," said Nelson.

Nelson was escorted by Texas State Executive Director and acting Deputy Administrator for Farm Programs Juan Garcia.

"As a native Texan, I have experienced extremely high temperatures and relatively dry conditions, but never anything of this magnitude," Garcia said. "I have no doubt that with Season Football Tickets on Sale Now help; Texas producers will bounce back and continue to be one of the driving forces in

American agriculture." In June, the drought - which has plagued the state since January - caused Agriculture Secretary Tom Vilsack to name 213 counties in Texas as primary natural disaster areas. In an effort to further help producers, Vilsack relaxed rules governing the Conservation Reserve Adults-\$20.00, Child/Student-\$10.00 Program (CRP) earlier this week by extending the emergency grazing period to Oct. 31, 2011, without an additional payment reduction. Generally, land enrolled in CRP cannot be waiting list. Office hours are Mon-Fri. 8 a.m. to 4 p.m. Go Elks!! used for grazing unless special circumstances warrant the land to be opened for that purpose. Texas, along with Colorado, Kansas, New Mexico and Oklahoma has been approved for emergency grazing. So far this year, producers nationwide have received \$693 million in indemnity payments to help recover from disasters, including more than \$520 million to those affected by drought. Additional assistance for livestock producers affected by the drought comes from the Livestock Forage Program which has already provided over \$50 million in Texas. This timely assistance helps ranchers purchase feed for their livestock when they need it most.

FSA administers several important programs that help producers recover from disaster damage and livestock deaths. Among the key programs available to address impacts from disasters are the Emergency Conservation Program (ECP), the Livestock Indemnity Program (LIP), the Emergency Assistance for Livestock, Honeybees and Farm-Raised Fish Program (ELAP), the Noninsured Crop Disaster Assistance Program (NAP), and the Supplemental Revenue Assistance Payments (SURE) Program.

USDA will continue to work with state and local officials, as well as federal partners to ensure that producers have the necessary resources to recover from these challenges.





Time nears to update brand registrations

The Texas and Southwestern Cattle Raisers Association is reminding ranchers that brand reregistration opens Aug. 30th and runs through February 29th. Registration in the county or counties where a producer operates is required by state law. The association maintains a database of the brands to aid in recovering stolen cattle and arresting

Stratford ISD today announced its policy for providing free and reduced-price meals for students served under the National School Lunch Program and/or School Breakfast Program.

Each school or the central office has a copy of the policy, which may be reviewed by any interested party.

The household size and income criteria will be used to determine eligibility for free and reduced-price benefits. Students from households whose income is at or below the eligibility guidelines are eligible for free or reduced-price meals. Foster children who are the legal responsibility of the state agency or court may also be eligible for benefits regardless of the income of the household with whom they reside. Eligibility for the foster student is based on the student's income.

Application forms are being distributed to all households with a letter informing households of the availability of free and reduced-price meals for their children. Applications also are available at the administration office in each school. To apply for free and reduced-price meals, households must fill out the application and return it to the school. Applications may be submitted anytime during the school year. The information households provide on the application will be used for the purpose of determining eligibility and verification of data. Applications may be verified by the school officials at any time during the school year.

For school officials to determine eligibility for free and reduced-price benefits, households Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP) benefits (formerly Food Stamps)/Temporary Assistance for Needy Families (TANF) only have to list their child's name and SNAP or TANF case number. An adult household member must sign the application.

Households that do not list a SNAP/TANF case number must list the names of all household members, the amount and source of the income received by each household member, and the Social Security number of the adult household member who signs the application. If the adult who signs the application does not have a Social Security number, the household member must indicate that a Social Security number is not available by writing the word "None," "No Number," or some indication that the person does not have a Social Security number. The application must be signed by an adult household member.

Under the provisions of the free and reduced-price meal policy, Lanette Nordyke will review applications and determine eligibility. Parents or guardians dissatisfied with the ruling of the official may wish to discuss the decision with the reviewing official on an informal basis.

Parents wishing to make a formal appeal for a hearing on the decision may make a request either orally or in writing to Jerry Birdsong, Superintendent, Stratford ISD.

If a household member becomes unemployed or if the household size increases, the household should contact the school. Such changes may make the students of the household eligible for benefits if the household's income falls at or below the level in the eligibility guideline.





CASA 69 Recruiting Volunteers

Picture yourself making the difference in the life of a child.

Child abuse is an epidemic in the state of Texas. Last year 66,817 children were confirmed as victims of abuse and neglect in Texas, according to the Texas Department of Family and Protective Services. CASA 69 served over 40 children this past year who were the victims of child abuse or neglect. We have seen a steady increase in the number of child abuse cases in the last few weeks. We want to make sure all children coming into the foster care system have a well-trained CASA volunteer to speak up on their behalf.

CASA 69 is now recruiting community volunteers who can advocate in the court system for abused and neglected children. CASA volunteers are appointed by a judge to guide one child or one set of siblings though the system to safe permanent homes as quickly as possible. CASA volunteers are everyday people—teachers, business people, retirees, stay- at-home moms, and grandparents—who are committed to making a difference for children who might otherwise slip through the cracks in our overburdened foster care system.

CASA volunteers research case records and speak to each person involved in a child's life, including family members, teachers, doctors, lawyers, and social workers. They monitor the progress of the child and family throughout the case and advocate for the child's current and future needs in court, in school, and in agency meetings. Their independent evaluations allow the court to make better informed decisions.

Because CASA volunteers serve on one case at a time, they truly get to know the child and can give each case the sustained, personal attention it deserves. There is a high caseload and a high turnover rate among CPS caseworkers. These state employees are hardworking and play a crucial role, but to many children have multiple caseworkers and are one of many on a case load. In this-situation, the work of a CASA becomes even more important. These dedicated and caring volunteers are often the most stable adult influence during a child's time in the foster care system. USDA Seeks Comments on Animal Disease Traceability Proposed Rule

The U.S. Department of Agriculture's Animal and Plant Health Inspection Service (APHIS) issued a proposed rule on August 11 to establish general regulations for improving the traceability of U.S. livestock moving interstate if an animal disease event takes place.

Under the proposed rule, livestock moving interstate would have to be officially identified unless specifically exempted. The proposed rule encourages the use of low-cost technoliN specifies approved forms of official identification for each species, such as metal eartags for cattle.

"The ability to track where diseased or at risk animals have gone or been moved from, is critical in ensuring a rapid response should an animal disease event take place," Dr. Dee Ellis State Veterinarian, said. "We encourage all interested stakeholders to comment on this proposed rule Ellis stated.

An efficient and accurate animal disease traceability system helps reduce the number of animals affected by the disease itself or movement restrictions. A traceability system also reduces the time needed to control the spread of the disease and ultimately decreases the cost to producers.

This notice will be published in the August 11 Federal Register.

Food Safety HELPFUL HINTS FROM EXPERTS

Bring On The Barbecue But Remember Food Safety

(NAPS)—Whatever you serve up at your next barbecue, don't add a side of bacteria. To help prevent harmful bacteria from multiplying and causing foodborne illness, follow these tips from the USDA:

From the Store: When shopping, buy cold food such as meat and poultry last, right before checkout. Separate raw meat and poultry from other food in your shopping cart. To guard against cross-contamination, put packages of raw meat and poultry into plastic bags. Drive directly home and refrigerate perishable food within two hours, one hour if the temperature is above 90° F.

Thaw Safely: Use the refrigerator for slow, safe thawing or thaw sealed packages in cold water. You can thaw food in the microwave just before putting it on the grill.

Marinating: A marinade is a savory, acidic sauce in which a food is soaked to enrich its flavor or to tenderize it. Marinate food in the refrigerator, not on the counter. Poultry and cubed meat or stew meat can be marinated up to two days. Beef, veal, pork and lamb roasts, chops and steaks may be marinated up to five days.

If the marinade is to be used as a sauce on the cooked food, reserve a portion before putting raw meat or poultry is to be reused, boil it first

first. **Transporting**: When taking food to another location, keep it cold to minimize bacterial growth. Use an insulated cooler with sufficient ice or ice packs to keep the food at 40° F or below.



Before grilling, completely thaw meat and poultry so it cooks more evenly.

Keep Cold Food Cold: Keep meat and poultry refrigerated until ready to use. When using a cooler, keep it out of the sun and avoid opening the lid too often.

Keep Everything Clean: To prevent foodborne illness, don't use the same platter and utensils for raw and cooked meat and poultry. Harmful bacteria present in raw meat and poultry and their juices can contaminate safely cooked food. Bring water for preparation and cleaning. Or pack clean cloths and moist towelettes for cleaning surfaces and hands.

Precooking: Precooking food partially in the microwave, oven or stove is a good way to reduce grill time. Make sure that the food goes immediately on the pre-

heated grill to complete cooking.

Cook Thoroughly: Meat and poultry that are cooked on a grill often brown very fast on the outside. Use a food thermometer to be sure the food has reached a safe minimum internal temperature. For more tips, visit www.fsis.usda. gov/factsheets/barbecue_food_safety/index.asp.


