

Joachim Treptow Treptow-new wildlife biologist

Joachim Treptow is a new wildlife biologist working for Texas1351-ks and Wildlife in the Panhandle district. Although he will assist on wildlife projects across the entire 56-county district, his primary area of responsibility Dallam, is Sherman, Hartley, Moore, Oldham, Potter, Carson and Deaf Smith counties.

He studied forestry and wildlife management in Munich, Germany. He's worked on a variety of large mammal projects, from surveying chamois in the Bavarian Alps to radio-telemetry of grizzly bears in the Canadian Rockies. He comes to Texas after working for the Wildlife Division of the Michigan Department of Natural Resources.

"I am not originally from Texas, but I got here as quick as I could. I really appreciate the warm welcome I've received so far and am looking forward to serving this region.

Joachim is based in Dalhart and will conduct annual wildlife surveys and research projects associated with wildlife species and habitats in the northwest Panhandle.

He will also provide technical assistance and public outreach programs to the general public, sportsmen, private landowners and land managers.

USDA Farm Service Agency urges farmers and ranchers to vote in County Committee Elections before December 5, 2011

Washington, Nov.3, 2011 - The U.S. Department of Agriculture's (USDA) Farm Service Agency (FSA) Administrator Bruce Nelson announced today that the 2011 FSA county committee elections began on Nov. 4, with USDA mailing ballots to eligible voters. The deadline to return the ballots to local FSA offices is Dec. 5, 2011.

"The role and input of our county committee members is more vital than ever at a time when our country faces important choices regarding the funding and operation of our government," said Nelson. "New county committee members provide input and make important decisions on the local administration of disaster and conservation programs. With better participation in recent years, we have also seen promising increases in the number of women and minority candidates, helping to better represent the richness of American

County committee members are an important component of the operations of FSA and provide a link between the agricultural community and USDA. Farmers and ranchers elected to county committees help deliver FSA programs at the local level, applying their knowledge and judgment to make decisions on commodity price support programs; conservation programs; incentive indemnity and disaster programs for some commodities; emergency programs and eligibility. FSA committees operate within official regulations designed to carry out federal laws.

To be an eligible voter, farmers and ranchers must participate or cooperate in an FSA program. A person who is not of legal voting age, but supervises and conducts the farming operations of an entire farm may also be eligible to vote. Agricultural producers in each county submitted candidate nominations during the nomination period, which ended on Aug. 1.

Eligible voters who do not receive ballots in the coming week can obtain ballots from their local USDA Service Center. Dec. 5, 2011, is the last day for voters to submit ballots in person to local USDA Service Centers. Ballots returned by mail must also be postmarked no later than Dec. 5. Newly elected committee members and their alternates will take office

Close to 7,700 FSA county committee members serve in the 2,244 FSA offices nationwide. Each committee consists of three to 11 members who serve three-year terms. Approximately one-third of county committee seats are up for election each year. More information on county committees, such as the new 2011 fact sheet and brochures, can be found on the FSA website at



Currently, more than 111,000 people in the United States are on the waiting list to receive a lifesaving organ. Last year, organ donors made more than 28,000 transplants possible. And the need for organ donors grows each day.

Here's how you can register to

become a donor: •Enroll with Your State Registry. Signing up to be a donor is a state-specific process, and laws related to donation vary. You can learn more about the donation process in your state and sign up on your state's registry by visiting www.organdonor.gov.

• Indicate Your Consent on Your Driver's License. Most states allow you to declare your organ donation status on your driver's license. The next time you renew your license, you may be able to register as an organ donor on the spot. Check with your state's department of motor vehicles to see if this is an option in your state. In some states, you can also sign up online.

·Notify Your Family and Friends. If you want to make the

From the Bird's Nest-November, 2011 By Jerry Birdsong Superintendent-Stratford ISD

The school year has reached about a third of the way through another school year. Our district functions very well in complex situation with nearly 600 students and over 110 employees. Throw in the external factors such as school finance and new state assessments, the district has plenty on its plate in providing each of our kids a quality education.

This year will be our first in the STAAR assessment system. The campuses are working diligently to discover what will be on the new test and preparing our students. The state has promised a more rigorous test with career and college readiness on the table. I am not against testing or accountability, but I am concerned that it is being overdone. It is like food – I am not against it, but you can get too much.

On the financial side the district has been cut about \$350,000 for the 2011-12 school year. Our district maintains its financial stability. We have prepared for the cuts and we may utilize some of our fund balance to offset the cuts. In the recent Financial Integrity System of Texas (FIRST) report, the district received a superior achievement rating which is a tribute to the Board of Trustees and their oversight of the public funds. We will continue to prepare for additional funding cuts as the district is expected to receive approximately \$525,000 less next year from 2010-11.

The school Veterans Day assembly was a great success for another year. It has become one of my favorite events for the school district. It is important that we teach our kids that the freedom that they enjoy was bought with the sacrifices of others. Having military personnel in the family brings an appreciation and understanding for the sacrifices that have been made for me.

The district also enjoys hosting the annual Thanksgiving lunch at the school cafeterias. We had a great turnout last week and our cafeteria staff outdid themselves again.

I was pleased with the Seven Project programs the district recently hosted. They were straight forward and matter-of-fact when it came to some of the decision making our young people face. I am sure that we will not cure all of the ills of society, but if we can help a bunch of kids avoid self-destructive behavior, it is all worth it

Congratulation to the Stratford ISD Foundation grant recepients. The foundation had four outstanding grant proposals to consider – Rachel's Challenge, Headphones for Keyboard Lab, Kindle E-Readers, and Jr. High Band trip to see the musical "Shrek". Over \$10,000 were given for these grants. Many of our kids have had once-in-a-lifetime experiences through the generosity of the Foundation. Since its founding in 2002, over 35 grants have been awarded at a cost that exceeds \$60,000. Many of these opportunities would not have been possible through normal school funding. I am looking forward to seeing the impact of these grants on student learning.

The younger students have begun their WOWW trips. These trips give tremendous opportunities to experience things beyond the classroom that enables us to produce well-rounded students. However, I am concerned about the future of these types of activities. In our current educational climate, the State of Texas continues to require more from classroom curriculum and state assessments. Money continues to tighten for education. As long as our students must pass state assessments to receive a diploma, preparing students for these requirements will be the main driver for our time and resources.

Believe it or not, the primary season for the state legislators is just around the corner. Educational issues are political whether we are talking about finances or accountability. How much funding does it take to get a student a quality education and

how does more state assessments help accomplish that goal? There is a wide range of opinions. Our representatives need to hear how we feel.

Some of our students have stepped it up in the giving of themselves for those in need. The high school raised \$675 for the fire victims in central Texas. The student council has also instituted a no texting and driving campaign. The cheerleaders also raised \$2511 during "pink out" week for breast cancer awareness. It is refreshing to see our kids give back to the community and show concern for others.

Think I laughed so hard that I was nearly crying...the Fall OAP Production really brought a smile to the audiences last month. The kids did a great job performing on stage and I appreciate the time and effort that the directors put in to make it a success. The fall production is such an important part of the One-Act Play program. It gives a lot of kids a chance to show the abilities on stage without the high stakes of the UIL competition. I am thankful that we have staff members willing to put in the extra time to ensure that we have a quality program.

Speaking of quality programs, we have a couple of other that have brought honor to our school and community – band and cross country. The band competed in the area competition against twenty-two of the top bands from Van Horn to Stratford. The Big Blue Band performed well in the prelims and advanced to the finals before its great run came to an end. Great accomplishment!

Our cross country program produced our first state qualifier this school year. Congratulations to Grayson Gonzalez for his accomplishment and thanks for representing SHS well at the state meet in Round Rock. The Lady Elk cross country also had a successful campaign as they pulled off an upset at the district cross country meet. Our district has 11 schools and three of those were ranked in the top 10 in the state. Our girls knocked one of the state-ranked out and advanced to the regional competition. Proud of the great efforts.

The transportation department has begun the process of moving into another facility. With the widening of 287 in front of the existing facility, the safety of our employees became a concern for the district. In response, the district recently acquired the Ivesco building at good price for over 17,000 square foot of indoor space. We will set up our transportation and maintenance departments in the facility over next few months.

Football season came to an unexpected early end. Maybe we have been spoiled by our past successes and have forgotten that it is tough to win championships. I feel the disappointment for the seniors - they have represented us well. The work needed for a successful season next year has already begun - we will be back.

Basketball is in full swing. The Lady Elks finished third at the Highland Park Tournament last weekend and the Elks opened their season with two wins. The junior high girls opened their season last weekend at Hooker. Lots of basketball to be played. I encourage you to come out watch these young kids represent our community.

Topping Trees Can Be Deadly

Topping is a kind word for the indiscriminate butchering of a tree, and yet it is the most harmful tree-pruning practice known, and still very common. In usually well-intentioned efforts to prune back or reduce the size of a tree, tree trimmers and homeowners sometimes go overboard, leaving nothing more than the tree trunk and a few stumps branching from it. The entire crown of a tree, the area that contains a tree's leaves, is chopped off and hauled away. When people indiscriminately cut large branches at midstream and leave a large stub of a branch behind, they are doing great harm to the tree that could lead to decay and eventually kill the tree. When a spring flush pushes tiny branches out of the ends of those stumps, they are very weakly attached to the branch, he explained. A strong wind, insects or disease can easily wipe them out, leaving the tree without a food source and susceptible to decay.

Topping a tree reduces the value and longevity of that tree. A valuable shade tree is gone and we need to protect all of the shade trees that we can. Less is better when pruning a tree. Try to never remove more than 25 percent of the crown, the leafy area of the tree. And when you do trim off a branch, don't cut it flush to the trunk, but don't leave a big stump either.

Lion-tailing or mule-tailing is another no-no. This is when a homeowner will strip all the leaves off a limb except those at the very end. That leaves a branch looking like lion's tail. This is as bad as topping a tree. Those leaves closer to the trunk are there for a reason and should not be removed. They serve as a second line of defense of a tree, protecting its trunk from sunburn. They also help strengthen the entire limb from wind damage and serve as a tree's food source. If a tree's outer leaves are removed by insects, ice or wind, the interior leaves become the food factory for the tree. Trees live off its inner leaves. They are important for the long-term life of the tree.

So, what is the proper way to trim a tree? Proper tree pruning is difficult to explain without using illustrations or photos. Try hiring a qualified tree trimmer certified by the International Society of Arboriculture, or visiting ISA's Web site at http://www.treesaregood.com.

The trees of a community or a city are considered an urban forest, and when even one tree is damaged or lost, it hurts everybody's property. Proper tree care is everybody's responsibility because we all benefit from healthy trees. Turn away tree trimmers who offer tree topping. Find a qualified tree trimmer who knows what he or she is doing. It could mean the difference between a thriving, beautiful tree and a dead one. 


