ATTN: FARMERS & LANDOWNERS

If you have land that came out of CRP in 2009 or 2010, you need to contact the Appraisal District now.

The land classification may need to be corrected and could reduce your taxes. You will need to complete a new Ag form prior to June 29, 2011 for any land reclassifications to take effect for the 2011 tax roll. Sherman County Appraisal District, 402 N 3rd Stratford TX or call 806-366-5566.

Tax Deferral Available for Elderly Homeowners

Texans aged 65 or older can postpone paying delinquent and current taxes on their homes. They can take advantage of a tax option called "over-65 deferral" by signing an affidavit at the Sherman County Appraisal District office.

If the affidavit is on file, an older homeowner cannot lose a homestead because of delinquent taxes. Once a homeowner files an over-65 tax deferral affidavit with the appraisal district, no taxing unit can start or continue a lawsuit for delinquent taxes as long as that person owns and lives in that home. The tax deferral only postpones paying delinquent taxes on the home; it does not cancel them.

Exemption Information Available From Appraisal Office

Sherman County Appraisal District offers property owners a pamphlet called "Texas Property Taxes: Taxpayers Rights, Remedies and Responsibilities". Published by the State Comptroller's Office in Austin, The "Remedies" pamphlet explains how the Texas property tax system works, and offers ways for possible tax savings. The pamphlet also describes exemptions available such as those for disabled veterans, other disabled persons or senior citizens. The pamphlet and all exemption forms are available at the Appraisal District office, 402 N. 3rd in Stratford or by calling (806) 366-5566.

Homeowners may file for various property tax exemptions offered by taxing units on residence homesteads. In Texas, a homestead is generally the house and yard used as the owner's principal residence. The pamphlet explains each exemption and how to apply for it. Homeowners do not need to reapply for the exemption this year if they received the exemption last year.

For example, all homeowners may file for a \$15,000 general exemption from their principal home's value for school taxes. In addition, certain disabled homeowners and those aged 65 or older may qualify for an additional \$10,000 exemption from the value of their home.

Disabled Veterans with a service-connected disability may present the Appraisal District with proof from the Veterans Administration to qualify for exemptions based on their percent of disability.

Productivity appraisal is another type of tax relief available to agricultural landowners.

Appraisal District staff can offer more information about special land appraisal, tax rendition and exemptions. We urge all property owners to read the pamphlet and learn about all possible property tax relief. Remember, taxpayers must file an exemption application with the Appraisal District office no later than April 30.

Multi-use exemption applies to some taxpayers.

Texas Property Tax Code Sec. 11.254 provides for an individual to exempt one passenger car or light truck from personal property taxes if the vehicle is used for both business and personal purposes.

11.254. Motor Vehicle Used for Production of Income and for Personal Activities (a) Except as provided by Subsection (c), an individual is entitled to an exemption from taxation of one motor vehicle owned by the individual that is used in the course of the individual's occupation or profession and is also used for personal activities of the owner that do not involve the production of income.

(b)In this section, "motor vehicle" means a passenger car or light truck as those terms are defined by Section 502.001, Transportation Code.

(c)A person who has been granted or applied for an exemption under this section may not apply for another exemption under this section until after the application or exemption has been denied.

(d)This section does not apply to a motor vehicle used to transport passengers for hire.

To qualify for the exemption individuals need to fill out an application form available from the appraisal office at 402 N. Third Street in Stratford. The exemption form must be filed prior to April 30. Annual Renewal of this exemption is no longer required (Sec.11.43c). However the exemption is for a specific vehicle, so if you change vehicles or replace the tag you must file a new exemption form.

Income producing vehicles are and continue to be taxable. The law allows the local taxing jurisdictions to choose to tax personal vehicles. The legislature did not exclude the multi-use exemption in jurisdictions that tax vehicles for personal use.

Don't get hit with a penalty! "Render" your taxable property by April 15.

A "rendition" is a report to your county appraisal district that lists all the taxable property you owned or controlled on Jan. 1

Who must file a rendition?

You must file a rendition if you own tangible personal property that is used to produce income-such as the inventory and equipment used by a business. If you render late, don't render or file an incomplete or false rendition, a 10 percent to 50 percent penalty may be imposed.

In Sherman County all personal property must be rendered. Are there any advantages to you?

The advantages of filing a rendition are:

- You give your opinion of your property's value. The appraisal district must notify you in writing of any value change and explain how you can protest that value to the appraisal review board.
- You record your correct mailing address so your tax bills will go to the right address. If your bill is mailed to the wrong address, the law still holds you responsible for paying your taxes on time or paying extra charges for late payments.
- You can also file a "report of decreased value" to notify the appraisal district of significant depreciation of the value of your property in 2010. The district will look at your property before assigning a value in 2011.

What's the deadline?

The last day for filing 2011 renditions is April 15. You can get an automatic extension to May 15 (or the next business day if a weekend) if you ask for it in writing on or before the April 15 deadline. The chief appraiser may grant an additional 15 days after the deadline for an owner who shows good cause in writing,



Ditch the Junk and Whip Your Diet Into Shape By Richard N. Waldman, MD

It's no surprise that the American diet needs work: Our portion sizes are out of control, .our calorie intake is too high-and it shows. More than 64 percent of adult women in the US are overweight or obese. But despite eating more, we are getting less

Many American women are deficient in nutrients such as iron, potassium, and dietary fiber. This is understandable when you consider that the typical American gets roughly 35% of her daily calories from added sugars and solid fats (such as butter and shortening).

The top five sources of calories for the average adult (in order) are grain-based desserts such as cakes and cookies; yeast breads; chicken and mixed chicken dishes; soda and energy/sports drinks; and alcoholic beverages. These and other low-nutrient foods are loaded with excess calories, sugar, solid fats, and sodium. Overconsumption of these types of food contribute to some of the main causes of death and chronic illness in the US, including heart disease, diabetes, and high blood pressure.

To help get us back on track, the US Department of Agriculture just released revised Dietary Guidelines. They offer specific advice on how to eat a healthier diet and maintain a healthy weight to reduce the risk of chronic disease and promote overall wellbeing.

The recommendations include:

- Balance the calories you eat with the calories you burn. Depending on age and individual activity levels, women should eat between 1,600-2,400 calories each day. For example, a 35-year-old woman who gets 30-60 minutes of daily exercise should eat roughly 2,000 calorie a day. Women who move less should eat less.
- Reduce salt intake. According to the Guidelines, no one should consume more than one teaspoon (2300 milligrams) of salt each day. African Americans, children, people age 51 and older, and those with high blood pressure, diabetes, or chronic kidney disease should consume 1500 mgs or less each day.
- Replace solid fats with oils such as canola and olive. Eat more vegetables, fruits, fat-free and low-fat dairy products,
- and whole grains.
- Cut back on added sugars and refined grains.
- + Drink more water and avoid beverages sweetened with added
- + Increase seafood servings in your diet by choosing it instead of some meat or poultry servings.

Sticking to these guidelines may be challenging at first, but once you become used to eating fresh, tasty, and healthy foods, it will start to become second nature. Give it a try-your body will thank

you now and in the future!




