out of a field of six aspirants. Only 11,932 bales of cotton were ginned in Haskell from the 1934 crop compared with 55,-367 bales in 1933, according to W. P. Trice, of Haskell, special agent for the Bureau of Census of the Department of Agriculture. The 1934 crop was the shortest that has been harvested in the county during the past 15 years.


