



TxDot, Texas high schools focus on saving teen lives

'Click It or Ticket' campaign aimed at increasing seat belt use among teens AUSTIN - Vehicle crashes are the leading cause of death among teenagers. In an effort to curb this deadly trend, the Texas Department of Transportation is partnering with

more than 900 Texas high schools to remind teens to "Click It or Ticket." "All traffic fatalities are tragic, but it's especially difficult to hear about teenagers having their lives cut short," said TxDOT Executive Director LtGen Joe Weber, USMC (Ret). "We're asking families, teachers and peers to remind teens to buckle up every time they get in a vehicle. It's the law and it can save their lives. Don't let your child be

In 2014, 293 teen drivers and passengers (ages 15-20) died as a result of traffic crashes in Texas. Of those fatalities, 134 (46 percent) were not wearing their seat belts at the

To help raise awareness and save lives, TxDOT is sending free "Teen Click It or Ticket" educational toolkits to high schools across the state. Each kit contains banners, posters, brochures and parking lot signs reminding students to wear their seat belts or face costlý tickets, injuries or even death.

Throughout the spring, TxDOT also will promote "Teen Click It or Ticket" at University Interscholastic League (UIL) competitions. A real-life, mangled truck display and an audio recreation of what happened to the teens who survived it, will be set up at boys' and girls' state high school sports tournaments in San Antonio, Georgetown and

According to the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration (NHTSA), properly worn lap-shoulder belts reduce the risk of fatal injury to front-seat occupants by 45 percent. Texas law requires all vehicle drivers and passengers to be buckled in a seat belt or face fines and court costs up to \$200.





A New Creation: Change Begins in the Mind

Do not be conformed to this world but be transformed by the renewing of your mind, so that you may discern what is the will of God—what is good and acceptable and perfect. (Romans 12:2 TLV)


Have you ever tried to control your thoughts? Put down the paper and do this little experiment. Take a moment, close your eyes and listen to your thoughts. You might start out thinking about your thoughts and controlling what you think, but just wait a few moments longer. The very next thing you will do is form a plan of action. You have resolved a problem in your mind, but that is just the beginning. You exert all of your power putting your plan into action. You don't stop until you accomplish that thing you imagined in your mind. You have turned thoughts into action.


Thus the proverb: as a man thinks--so he is.

In Romans 12:2, Paul is reminding us that as God's new creations we must work to reject focusing our thoughts on fascinations in this fleeting environment (Earth). We should NOT be transfixed on its temporary things. We must change our way of viewing life. We need to acquire a new mental perspective. The word "transformed" is from the Greek "metamomorphoo" meaning we must undergo a metamorphosis. Simply put, Paul is saying we must change our thinking. From the little experiment we just did with our thoughts, we realize that changing our thinking definitely leads to changes in our behaviors. What is now our goal for Christian thinking? Ultimately a Christian's main objective is to leave behind the yearning for things of this world and set our sights on our Heavenly Father. How do we change the focus of our thinking? Actually it's easier than you might think. We already know how to center our thinking on a particular problem seeking an inspiration. We must now train ourselves to use that same energy focusing on God's word and praying, thus allowing him to guide our inspiration. Inspirations from the Holy Spirit reveal God's will for us straight to us. Focusing on God transforms our thoughts and our behavior.






Elk Yadhira Chavoya goes up with the lay-up in the Lady Elks bidistrict loss to Wheeler on Tuesday, February 17, 2015.






Lady Elk #11 Allie James Wheeler shoots over defender in the Lady Elks bi-district loss on February 15, 2015.
