Participates in UIL Concert Band Contest
Stratford 6th Grade Band

On Wednesday, April 15, the Stratford combined 7th and 8th Grade Band traveled to Canyon High School to participate in the UIL Regional Concert and Sightreading Contest. The band played three prepared pieces on stage in the Concert portion of the contest receiving all Division I (Superior) Ratings from the three judges. Following their Concert performance the band students moved to the Canyon High School Band room for the Sightreading portion of the contest. Students were handed a piece of music they had never seen before and had 7 minutes of explanation before playing the selection for the three judges. Again, as on stage, all three judges rated Stratford Division I (Superior). By receiving Division I ratings in both Concert and Sightreading Stratford earned the UIL Sweepstakes Award for Junior High Bands.

Some comments from the judges were "Lots of nice, full sounds coming from all sections. You play with a lot of confidence." and "Very good note accuracy". The band then sightread a piece of music they had never seen before and all three judges gave them a Division I rating. Comments from the Sightreading judges were "Band plays with a big full sound. Overall the band plays with very good intonation and balance." "Band plays with a strong rhythmic pulse and style." "Very well done band". "Good focus and concentration by the students." "Nice job overall.

Of the 8 Conference C Varsity Junior High bands performing at the UIL Contest only 3 bands (Stratford, West Texas, and de Zavala Middle School/ Amarillo) received Division I ratings from all six judges. Obviously the judges had a very high performance standard that day. Of the 7 conference C Junior High bands that feed Class 2A high schools only Stratford and West Texas received Division I ratings from all six judges.

Jack Calvin Gilley July 25, 1924 - May 9, 2015

Jack Calvin Gilley, 90, of Stratford passed away Saturday, May 9, 2015. A Memorial Service was held at 1 o'clock in the afternoon on Tuesday, May 12, 2015 at the First United Methodist Church in Stratford with Rev. Steve Ulrey officiating. Jack was born July 25, 1924 in Dawson County near Lamesa, TX to James and Josie Burnett Gilley. He proudly served his country in the Navy during World War II as a torpedo man on the USS Stockdale. He attended Panhandle A&M College on basketball and baseball scholarships. He received his Master's in Education from West Texas State University in 1965.

Jack was united in marriage on August 25, 1951 in Raton, NM to Donna Mal Oldaker. She preceded him in death in April 2010.

Jack was involved in the teaching profession from 1951 until his retirement in 1985. He taught in Foss OK, Manchester OK, Reed OK, Channing TX, Goodwell OK, Texhoma TX, Stratford TX, and Plainview Schools in Cimarron County, OK. Following his retirement, he began a second profession of painting houses, refinishing furniture, and carpentry.

He was a loving husband, father, and grandfather. He was a member of the First United Methodist Church of Stratford as well as the American Legion Post. He loved hunting pheasant and quail, eating breakfast with friends at the local cafe, drinking coffee with his buddies at Gophers," all things rodeo, and all sports (especially Duke Basketball).

One day soon they will fly on their own wings of wax.



Legacy Contests Concluded

May 2 was an important day at Legacy Assisted Living. This day happened to conclude 2 of our contest, Guess the Birth Date of the New Royal Baby and the Kentucky Derby. The purpose of these contests is to help keep residents informed about current news events; plus it is plain FUN!

Our longest running contest - Guess the Birth Date had been running since the end of March. No one correctly chose May 2 as the date the new princess would be born. The guesses for the gender of the baby were 17 for a girl and 10 for a boy. Each participant at the celebration party held on Monday, May 4, 2015, received a candy pacifier. Also on Monday, during the Challenge time, a discussion of the royal titles, history of some of the royal princesses and a review of the names of princesses since 1687 was discussed. Some princesses have just one name like Anne (1709-1759); and the one with the most names was: Frederica Louisa Thyra Victoria Margareta Olga Cecilie Isabella Christa (1917-1981). The new baby's name is Charlotte Elizabeth Diana. Her royal name is Princess Charlotte of Cambridge.

The other contest was the Kentucky Derby. Each resident had the opportunity to draw a horse from the official lineup listing. At the party, everyone was served Kentucky Derby Pie (a type of pecan pie but with chocolate chips added) and Banana Punch.

The next contest at Legacy will be a Container Garden contest. Each resident will select a staff member to form a team. Each team will choose a theme for their garden such as salad garden, butterfly garden, or salsa garden. Plants will be selected, and then the gardens will be judged in late June by the Garden Club. Get A Handle On Household Leaks

(NAPS)—Over 1 trillion gallons of water are wasted in the United States every year from easy-to-fix household leaks. That is the amount of water used by more than 11 million homes every year!

Leaks can be a real drain on resources and occur in a number of places at home, including faucets, showerheads, toilets, and outdoor spigots and irrigation systems. Stretched State Budgets Require More School Choice

(NAPS)—The population of the U.S. is aging in a way that may present some challenges for public education in the near future.

Fortunately, according to a new report published by the Friedman Foundation for Educational Choice and the Foundation for Excellence in Education, school choice offers a way to address those challenges.

The report, "Turn and Face the Strain: Age Demographic Change and the Near Future of American Education," by Dr. Matthew Ladner, contends the aging of the U.S. population between now and 2030—what Ladner refers to as "Hurricane Gray"—will profoundly impact all aspects of the financing and operation of American social welfare functions.

He points to the fact that:

• Every day between now and 2030, 10,000 members of the baby boom generation will reach the retirement age of 65.

• The U.S. Census Bureau's 2012 National Population Projections indicate the country will gain over 4.6 million residents ages 5 to 17 between 2010 and 2030.

• By 2030, 45 out of the 50 states will have a higher percentage of their population aged 65 or older than the oldest state (Florida) did in 2010 and all 50 states' elderly populations will be higher than they were in 2010, also according to the Census Bureau.

All of which means that the percentage of those receiving state benefits is growing while the percentage of those who are working and can be taxed to fund benefits, such as public education and senior health care, is shrinking.





The age-dependency ratio of taxpayers "pushing the carts" of Americans dependent on government services will reach historic proportions over the next 20 years.


Ladner argues that this reduced funding base will make it difficult for public schools to prepare all students adequately. Private and charter schools of choice, he says, can help at a fraction of the cost.

Ladner contends that expanding school choice for all families would reduce the cost of public education and allow government to increase funding for other services, particularly for seniors.

He further argues in favor of shifting how states fund public education, from sending tax dollars directly to public schools to a system where families receive those tax dollars in governmentauthorized education savings accounts, or ESAs. In Arizona and Florida, parents can use ESA programs to pay for their children's school tuition, tutors, therapists, online courses, curricula or a combination of each. Because students receive 90 percent of their dedicated public funding, ESA families actually save the state

Sherman County was represented at the District 1 4-H Roundup in Canyon on April 24 by Levi Springer, Max


Engelbrecht, Bryce Killian, Payton Berry and Katelin Berry.


Bryce Killian, Payton Berry and Katelin Berry met at West Texas A&M University to compete with their educational presentations and public speaking pieces.
