

The Stratford Education Foundation received word from the NASA Astronaut Appearances Office on Nov. 26th that the visit by our NASA astronaut on December 9th will be postponed until the spring semester. The agency director explained that bad weather conditions across the U.S. over the past 3 weeks have caused numerous cancellations by astronauts. The agency would prefer to reschedule the appearance later in the school year when weather will be more dependable.

Jerry B. Johnson, 80, of Lubbock, went home to be with His Heavenly Father on Monday, November 24, 2014. A glorious reunion awaited him with his two sons, Taylor and Parker Johnson. Graveside services were held Saturday, November 29, at 2:00 pm at the Stratford Cemetery in Stratford under the direction of Ramage Funeral Directors of Olton. A memorial service to celebrate Jerry's life was held on Wednesday, December 3rd, at 11:00 a.m., at the Kent Hance Chapel on Texas Tech University campus.

Jerry was born on January 11, 1934, to Jack and Billie Johnson in Hale County. After graduating from Hale Center, Jerry attended Texas Tech where he played quarterback for the Red Raiders. He led the 1953 team to a victory over Auburn at the Gator Bowl, and was named All-Border Conference as a senior. He played in the Blue-Gray game and Skyline Border Conference All-Star Game and left TTU as the leading passer in school history. He graduated from

After college, he served in the Army and received honorable discharge in February 1958. Jerry went on to coach football at West Point, Georgia, Colorado State, and West Texas State. He later moved his family to Stratford, Texas, where he ranched and owned J Cattle Company. He was President of the Stratford school board for many years and retired to the Lubbock area to be close to his daughter Lane and her

Jerry was preceded in death by his sons, Taylor Johnson and Parker Johnson, parents Jack and Billie Johnson, and his brother, Jackie Johnson.

Jerry is survived by his daughter, Lane and her husband, Tom Kotara, granddaughter Landry, and grandson Kreed, all of Shallowater, Texas.

Jerry will forever be remembered for his quick wit and smile, his unique cowboy hat, his love for family and friends, and his perseverance in running the race God marked out for him.



Pursuit of Happiness: What is Philos Love? Part 6

Philadelphia, called "the city of brotherly love", gets its name from the Greek word philos.

In Greek, (philos) is "to love" and (adelphos) is "brother". We demonstrate "philos" love to those we hold dear in our intimate relationships. They are those whom we have a close bond of personal affection. They can be a relative, confidant, or trusted friend with whom we feel a special connection. Philos also describes the love between . Christian brothers and sisters.

Over and over we are admonished to show philos love to fellow Christians: Romans 12:10 "be devoted to one another in brotherly love, I Thessalonians 4:9 Now as to the love of the brethren, you have no need for anyone to write to you, for you yourselves are taught by God to love one another; Hebrews 13:1 Let love of the brethren continue. I

Peter 1:22 Since you have in obedience to the truth purified your souls for a sincere love of the brethren, fervently love one another from the heart, 2 Peter 1:7 and in your godliness brotherly kindness; and in your brotherly kindness love. John 15:12 This is my commandment, That ye love one another, as I have loved you.

John 13:34 A new commandment I give unto you, That ye love one another; as I have loved you, that ye also love one another." These scriptures remind us that the love between Christians is a unique ecclesiastical covenant We are commanded by God to hold one another in very high regard. Our relationships with fellow Christians are fastidiously shaped by care, concern and consideration. This love is not optional nor incidental. It is carefully and painstakingly crafted through acts of selflessness. Each act of love stretches us closer toward spiritual maturity. In his letter to the Corinthians (1 Corinthians 13) Paul provides a guide for spiritual growth through love. In Philippians 1:9 he said: I pray your love keeps increasing in spiritual knowledge and intelligence.

The more I study Gods commandments concerning purity of heart, the more inadequate I feel. I've gone to church and listened to a lifetime of preaching about loving others. I must admit that I put little effort into actually doing it. I thought I was doing okay just to believe. In fact, I was a lazy lover: if someone showed me love, I loved them back. On the other hand, I simply avoided those people that were difficult to love. I think I can say I did not hate anyone, however, neither did I make any effort to show love to those that did not show me love. Through the lens of retrospection it appears that I suffered from a love deficit. It was I who always wanted and needed to receive love. In my personal relationships, often I was seeking to feel loved. I choose to believe God made me love needy to teach me empathy for others seeking love. I'm grateful today for a bit of spiritual maturity that allows, me to feel the powerful love of my Father in Heaven. The love of my Heavenly Father wraps me in a security blanket gradually erasing all those feelings of insecurity. Secure in the agape

love of Christ I am now free to share his unconditional love with others. This capability creates joy and fills my heart with happiness.









Stratford Elk #11 Rett Schoonover is ran out of bounds on the carry by Canadian defense.




Stratford Elk quarterback Jack McBryde looks for a receiver in the Elks regional loss to Canadian on Friday, November 28.


