Texas Registration and Inspection Stickers are Partnering Up in Sherman County

Sherman County is gearing up for a new Texas Two Step. Beginning March 1, 2015, the state will no longer issue vehicle inspection stickers and will move to a "Two Steps, One Sticker" program. Under the new system, Texas vehicle owners will need to pass inspection prior to renewing their registration. The familiar blue-bordered Texas Department of Motor Vehicles (TxDMV) registration sticker will serve as proof of both inspection and registration.

"Sherman County is prepared to make this transition as smooth as possible for our residents," said Sherman County Tax Assessor-Collector Valerie McAlister. "During the first year of the program beginning March 1, 2015, all you will need to do is make sure you already have a valid passing vehicle inspection before you renew your registration in our office, online or by mail."

When vehicle owners renew their registration, the system will automatically verify whether the vehicle has a valid inspection: Without a passing inspection, the vehicle will not be eligible for registration renewal.

During the second year of the program, beginning March 1, 2016, vehicles' inspection and registration expiration dates will align to the date that is on the registration sticker. Once the expiration dates are aligned in that second year, you will have a convenient 90day window to pass inspection first and then renew your registration before the end of the month listed on your sticker.

"When the 'Two Steps, One Sticker' program is fully implemented, Sherman County residents will appreciate having just one sticker in the corner of their windshield and only one expiration date to worry about," said TxDMV Executive Director Whitney Brewster. "And because a passing vehicle inspection will be a requirement to renew your registration, more vehicle owners will comply with inspection requirements leading to safer and more environmentally sound cars on Texas roads."

The implementation of "Two Steps, One Sticker" is a result of House Bill 2305 which passed during the 83rd Legislative Session in 2013. The program is joint effort by the TxDMV, the Texas Department of Public Safety (DPS) and the Texas Commission on Environmental Quality, in collaboration with the 254 county tax assessor-collector's offices which process vehicle registrations and vehicle inspection stations across the

Our goal is for you to understand these basic concepts: Economics, Plant Growth and Physiology, Basic Ecology, Animal Reproduction and Nutrition, Matching Animals to the Forage Resource, Grazing Behavior and Diet Selection, Tools, Rules and Guidelines, Strategic Planning (mostly fencing and water development guidelines), Annual Grazing Planning, and Drought Management and Monitoring. As each session builds on one another, you will be able to evaluate your own land and practices, and then be able to build your own rangeland management plan specific for your needs.

Karen Ann Pulliam April 21, 1947-January 30, 2015

Karen Ann Pulliam passed away on Friday, January 30, 2015. Born to Raymond and Ava Keener on April 21, 1947, in Dalhart, Texas, she was the second youngest of six children and lived in Stratford for most her life. Growing up, Karen was a definite tomboy, often picking on her younger brother and refusing to wear dresses. She loved playing basketball and was part of the ending era of women's half-court basketball. She married Johnny Oscar Pulliam at the age of 15, secretly running off to Clayton, New Mexico, fibbing a little bit about her age and returning home to her rather disgruntled parents (to put it mildly). They had two children, Ronald Dean ("BR" or "Bee") and Johnny Wayne ('Jocko"), by the time she was 18 years old. Karen worked various jobs throughout her life, working mostly as a bookkeeper, up until the time she retired in April 2012. In the early 1970s, Johnny became involved with the Volunteer Fire Department and Karen was soon to follow, becoming involved with the Ladies Auxiliary, where she stayed involved for more than 8 years. Karen confessed Christ as her Savior and was baptized in 1958 at the age of 11 at the First Christian Church where she was a life-long

Early on, Karen's jobs consisted of helping out her folks on harvest and, after getting married, moving to Dalhart for a short time and working at a drive-in car hop. Later employment included G&G Grocery, Olson's Automotive Machine & Supply, the General Store, Coldwater Manor and the First State Bank of Stratford, after which she retired. She was President and Vice President of the Ladies Auxiliary Fire Department, and was named Businessperson of the Year in 1998. A hard worker, busy mom, and wonderful sister and friend, Karen often would put the needs of others first. Those that knew her loved her sense of humor and her laugh. She loved to sing and participated as a tenor in the choir and as a ringer in the FCC Bell Choir. Although she was most active in the church in the 1980s and 90s, her faith and love for the Lord continued and remained strong to the end of her earthly life. She loved kitty cats, butterflies and angels, and in her last year she pampered herself, and became addicted to, pedicures!

She loved family, cherishing the times spent sharing a meal in large or small groups or just sitting on the back patio, always calling her loved ones by their nicknames. She was very proud of both of her boys and their families. And 52 years ago on July 7 1962, she married her best friend Johnny. This beeing 363 days before her first born, and not two days after as was often assumed.

Karen is survived by her husband Johnny; her son "Bee" or "BR" and wife "I-een" of Albuquerque; her son "Jocko" and wife Lanette of Stratford; her brother Bill "Bubba" Keener and his wife Joy of Sweeny, Texas; her sister Jean Beth "Big Sis" Boren of Ft Worth; her sister Katy "Gar" Lewis and her husband Bob "Bobito" of Stratford; her brother Grant "Boog" Keener and his wife Benita "Nita" of Weston

Colorado; and 4 grandchildren, 3 great grandchildren and many nephews and nieces. There were also numerous 'adopted' sons and daughters as Karen considered many of BR and Jocko's friends as her own.

Karen was preceded in death by her parents Raymond "Pappy" and Ava "GaGa" Keener, her brother Raymond "Butch" Keener, and her brother-in-laws Richard (Dick) "Cotton" Williams and Charles "Chas" Boren.

A memorial service will be held on Saturday, February 7, at 11am, at First Christian Church, 420 N. Main Street, Stratford, Texas. In lieu of flowers, donations can be made in celebration of Karen's life to First Christian Church of Stratford or to the Susan G. Komen Breast Cancer organization, a charity and cause close to her heart.



A New Creation: Putting Off the Old

I am particularly struck by the story of the rich young man who approached Jesus and asked, "Teacher, what good deed must I do to have eternal life?" I imagine a smug, self-assured, spoiled, brat thinking to himself, he use the vast resources at his disposal to easily accomplish any deed Jesus might assert. Jesus responded pretty much as he had expected: Don't rob, steal, cheat, or lie, respect your parents and love your neighbors as yourself. He thought, "That was easy!" He stuck out his chest, crossed his arms, and smirkingly responded; "I already do all of those things." I get the impression that Jesus was familiar with the type. He was quite accustomed to being approached by those who wanted him to tell them what they wanted to hear. I'm sure this young man had and army of "yes" men worshipping him. He was used to being told how wonderful he was. His inflated ego blinded him to the fact that Jesus was unimpressed. He stood there expectantly waiting for Jesus to chime in with the usual praises. He was shocked when Jesus matter-of-factly replied, "Go, and sell everything you own, give the money to the

poor, then come back and follow me."

Scripture says the young man walked mournfully away--I say, dragging his deflated ego behind him. Why was he sad? He was sad because he knew Jesus had asked him to do the one thing he was not willing to do. He could not let go of his wealth. It was the pedestal upon which he perched above the common people. On the surface he was keeping the letter of the law, but deep in his spirit, he was selfish, self-seeking, and self-absorbed. He said he loved his neighbor (as himself), however, in reality, his love of self would taint any good "deed" he might perform. Jesus knew he was rotten at the core.

Colossians 1:21 explains we were all enemies of God, "separated from him by our evil thoughts and actions." The death of Christ cleansed us, reconciled us, and presented us to God as pure. With the story of the rich young man, Jesus wanted us to understand that God is not impressed with superficiality. He does not want perfunctory obedience. He wants u to run, not walk, from our old ways of thinking and acting. Putting off the old requires conscious efforts to leave behind our excessive love of self, turn our focus toward him, and "think about the things of heaven, not the things of earth." (Colossians 3:2 NLT) Meditation: Am I putting off old ways?





Lady Elk #15 Yadhira Chavoya scores for the Lady Elks in their win over Booker.






