



Down Main Street with Middle School Principal, Clint Seward. Michael Glenn, a paraplegic, spoke to the students about rising above the adversity of an automobile accident and accomplishing a dream through hard work and tenacity. He is the first paraplegic to receive a license to pilot a hot air balloon.



Pursuit of Happiness: What is Love? Part Four

"Love the Lord with all your heart, mind, soul, and strength" and "Love thy neighbor as yourself!" "All the Law and all the Prophets hang on these two commandments." With these words, Jesus silenced the religiosity of the Pharisees, a prominent religious sect of his day. They went away stunned because they planned to trap him in a lengthy debate of which Jewish law was greatest. Romans 13:8-10 explains how loving God and others sums up all the law:

"... for he that loveth another hath fulfilled the law. Thou shalt not commit adultery, Thou shalt not kill, Thou shalt not steal, Thou shalt not bear false witness, Thou shalt not covet; and if there be any other commandment, it is briefly comprehended in this saying, namely, Thou shalt love thy neighbour as thyself. Love worketh no ill to his neighbour: therefore love is the fulfilling of the law." Verse 10 explicitly explains that your actions reveal the condition of your heart. If you deceive, betray, envy, kill, or harm your neighbor, obviously you do love him. In Matthew 5:17 Jesus clearly admonished his listeners that he did not come in opposition to the teachings of Moses nor planned to erase one period or comma from the writings of the Prophets concerning him. To those seeking to place him in opposition to the earlier prophets, he wanted there to be no misunderstanding that he came to bring to fruition their prophecies regarding himself.

Christ came to release us from the ritual binds of the Mosaic Law, grant us grace to cover our sins and give us the Holy Spirit for guidance away from sin. Romans 10:4 states Christ is the end of the law, Galatians 3:23-25 adds the law was our guardian until Christ came, and Ephesians 2:15 explains Christ abolished ritual commandments of the Mosaic law. However, his commandments to love him and love others remains the same in both the Old and New Testament. Although grace replaces ritual cleansing, in Matthew 22 and Mark 12 it's crystal clear that God's commandments for Christians to love himself and others continues. Through filling our hearts with love, we worship him by keeping our hearts pure. "Blessed are the pure in heart: for they shall see God." (Matthew 5:8 KJV)

If I am loving God with all of my heart, mind, soul, strength, I am a changed and continuously changing person. My heart's desire to love God above all else is the foundation for my gradual metamorphosis from selfish to selfless. This spiritual growth is spurred by situations where I sometimes take a mental step back and demonstrate a willingness to say "you first" to another person. It's a simple concept, but it's not easy. Although I desire to please God, often my ego looms tall, blocking the sunlight of the Holy Spirit which nourishes my growth. Whenever I slip and fall into that "me first" attitude, I refuse to accept defeat, I must press on toward that mark. My Heavenly Father promises to give me the desires of my heart-loving him with heart, soul, mind, strength, and loving my neighbor as myself. The anticipation of one day reaching this perfection in Christ, fills my soul with unrestrained hope and happiness.






J.V. Elk Luis Mendoza breaks free of Panhandle defense to score for the Elks.



Justin Duran #12 gets set for the play in the J.V. Elks win over Panhandle on Thursday, October 15, 2015.






