

You must have proof that you reside in Sherman County by first showing a current driver's license or a utility bill with your current address and a picture identification card. Once you have your library card, you can use your card at any library in the Texas panhandle, if you are in good standing at your home library, that is, you can't have any fines or overdue books. This service is made possible through agreements among members of the Harrington Library Consortium. Your library card can also allow you to check out e-books and audio books on you iPhone, iPad, kindle, nook or other device. Your library card can even let you start learning another language by accessing the library's webpage and clicking on Muzzy Languages. Other databases accessible on the webpage, she rmancountylibrary.org, are Tumble Books, Britannica School, Britannica Public Library Edition, Britannica Academic Edition, Britannica Enclopedia Moderna, Britannica Escolar Online, World Vital Records, 3M Download eBooks, Global Road Warrior, Columbia Granger's World of Poetry, AtoZ the USA, LearningExpress Library, Word Stash, Job & Career Accelerator, Cypress Resume, TexShare Databases. Your library card is only good for one year and must be updated yearly. If you haven't used your library card in three years then it is deleted in the database, so use it or lose it. Your library also allows free use of computers and WIFI. Patrons come to the library to apply for jobs, social security, income tax returns, to apply to colleges, and even to continue their education.



TXDOT REMINDS **MOTORISTS** WINTER WEATHER

AMARILLO - The Amarillo District of the Texas Department of Transportation is preparing equipment and crews for expected winter weather events.

TxDOT reminds motorists to be ready for extreme weather conditions when traveling in the region this winter. Motorists also need to be aware of TxDOT snowplows and other heavy equipment operating during a winter weather event.

"Safety is the number-one priority at TxDOT, both for our employees and motorists during winter weather events," said Ron Johnston, District Engineer for TxDOT's Amarillo District. "If you follow too closely to an operating snowplow, you risk not only damage to your vehicle,-but also injury to yourself and the plow operator. Stay back a minimum of three vehicle lengths, but at least 150 feet is best."

Drivers are also urged to check road conditions before deciding to travel. Those who must get out during a winter storm event should follow these guidelines:

Reduce speed. Speed limits are based on normal road and weather conditions, not winter-road conditions. Also, stay off your cruise control. Cruise control can quickly turn into "lose control" if you hit black ice or other-areas that affect your vehicle's

Maintain at least three times the normal following distance on snow or ice.

Watch carefully for trucks and equipment treating roadways, and keep your distance. Use extra caution on bridges, ramps, overpasses and shaded areas as they tend to freeze first.

If you start to slide, ease off the gas pedal or brakes. Steer into the direction of the skid until you feel you have regained traction then straighten your vehicle.



USDA Announces Investments in Rural Community Facilities To Enhance Rural Health and Public Safety

TEMPLE, TEXAS, Nov. 24, 2015 – Agriculture Secretary Tom Vilsack has announced investments to improve rural community infrastructure, provide essential services and improve access to health care across rural America through Rural Development's Community Facilities (CF) program. These investments in health facilities and support for first responders come as the department celebrates National Rural Health Week.

"Rural America deserves quality, affordable health care, but too often local communities lack the capital to invest in improving the facilities that deliver that care," Vilsack said. "I am especially proud of the role that USDA plays in addressing the critical needs for health care facilities, including mental health facilities."

With this announcement, Secretary Vilsack said that the department has eclipsed a goal, set in December of 2013, of investing up to \$50 million in CF funds over the subsequent three years to develop or improve mental health facilities and services in rural areas. CF funding in 2015 more than quadrupled that goal in just two years, funding more than \$213 million in 80 projects in 34 states.

Among the awards announced to support health care services, \$42,451,000 will be awarded to five projects located in rural Texas communities. Funding of each grant and loan announced is contingent upon the recipient meeting the terms of the funding agreement.

"We are pleased to support rural Texas communities in providing modern medical facilities and emergency response equipment for their residents," said Tom Hannah, USDA Rural Development Acting Texas State Director. "Providing quality healthcare locally saves critical time and the lives of rural residents."

Since 2009, USDA has awarded \$9.7 billion under its Community Facilities programs, including \$4.9 billion for 1,052 health care projects; \$266 million for improvements to 206 public schools; \$133 million for 555 libraries; \$39 million for 240 day care centers; and \$791 million to support 4,876 public safety facilities in rural areas.

President Obama's plan for rural America has produced historic investments in rural communities. Under the President's leadership, these investments in housing, community facilities, businesses and infrastructure have strengthened America's small towns and cities and helped improve the nation's economy.

USDA, through its Rural Development mission area, administers and manages housing, business and community infrastructure and facility programs through a national network of state and local offices. These programs are designed to improve the economic stability of rural communities, businesses, residents, farmers and ranchers and improve the quality of life in rural America. The new joint, called a prosthesis, can be made of plastic, metal or ceramic. It may or may not be cemented into place, and your bone will grow into it. New joints generally last at least 10 to 15 years.
