Officer's Coborn and McHugh responded to the Sherman County jail where Jailer/ Dispatcher Jennifer Spurlock had requested assistance. Upon arrival, they were informed that an inmate was attempting to hang himself. Officers Coborn and McHugh entered the jail and observed a male inmate hanging inside the cell. Both officers entered the cell and the inmate was cut down. The officers began life saving measures which resulted in saving his life. The inmate was then transported to Dumas Memorial hospital for treatment.

Your quick actions prevented a fatal incident, thus crediting you with the saving of a life.

Therefore we give you this Commendation so that all will know your service is appreciated. In addition we would like the citizens of this community to know that your actions provide a valuable service, which prevented a tragic loss of life.

# Dear Stratford Residents and General Contractors:

Please be advised that per Section 13.01.038(b) of the City of Stratford's Code of Ordinances, only regular household waste is to be disposed of in the dumpsters provided by the City.

Section 13.01.038(b) - Materials prohibited in containers. The following shall not be disposed of in city containers: hazardous waste, liquid waste, used motor oil, used oil filters, lead acid batteries, yard waste (grass clippings, leaves, yard/garden debris,

construction/demolition/remodeling debris, shingles/roofing material, chairs/furniture, mattresses/box springs, waste tires (automotive/implement/truck/tractor), major appliances/fixtures, and dead animals.

Section 13.04.041 - Dirt, concrete and rocks prohibited in containers.

The disposal of dirt, concrete, and rocks in city trash containers is hereby prohibited. (Ordinance 970519, sec. 9, adopted 5/19/97)

Grass dumpsters are for grass only.

A fine or penalty for the violation of a rule, ordinance or police regulation that governs fire safety, zoning or public health and sanitation, including the dumping of refuse, may not exceed two thousand dollars (\$2,000.00).

# USDA Seeks Grant Applications to Provide Development Support to Rural Cooperatives

TEMPLE, TEXAS, March 29, 2016 - The U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) has announced that \$5.8 million in competitive funding is available nationwide to help start, improve or expand cooperative businesses in rural areas.

"Cooperatives have long been a key resource for small and midsized producers working together to access new markets or to market value added products," said Under Secretary for Rural Development Lisa Mensah. "This funding helps them continue their crucial role supporting farmers and other businesses that create jobs, provide services and improve the quality of life in rural America." "USDA Rural Development's mission is to provide assistance that will increase

the economic conditions of rural communities," said Texas State Director Paco Valentin. "These funds will promote start up, expansion and operational improvements as cooperatives work to grow and strengthen their businesses and provide sustainable, well-paying jobs to rural residents."

The Rural Cooperative Development Grant (RCDG) Program provides funding to nonprofit cooperative develop centers and institutions of higher learning. Grants may be awarded for up to \$200,000 and matching funds are required equal to 25 percent of the total project cost.

## **ATTN: FARMERS & LANDOWNERS**

If you have land that came out of CRP in 2015 you need to contact the Appraisal District now.

The land classification may need to be corrected and could reduce your

taxes. You will need to complete a new ag form prior to June 30, 2016 for any land reclassifications to take effect for the 2016 tax roll. Sherman County Appraisal District, 402 N 3rd Stratford TX or call 806-366-5566.

### Multi-use exemption applies to some self-employed taxpayers.

The passage of Proposition 6, which amended the state constitution under House Bill 1022, provides for an individual to exempt one passenger car or light truck from personal property taxes if the vehicle is used for both business and personal purposes.

To qualify for the exemption individuals need to fill out an application form available from the appraisal office at 402 N. Third Street in Stratford. The exemption form must be filed prior to April 30 each year.

A vehicle is not eligible:

1. If you work for someone else.

- 2. If you use your vehicle to commute to and from work.
- 3. If you are a retired person with no production of income.
- 4. If it is registered in a business name.

Income producing vehicles are and continue to be taxable. The law allows the local taxing jurisdictions to choose to tax personal vehicles. The legislature did not exclude the multi-use exemption in jurisdictions that tax vehicles for personal use.

# There Are Already Too Many Driverless Cars on the Road! April is National Distracted Driving Awareness Month

When we think of driverless cars, we think of new technology that will enable a car to drive without input from the driver. But, unfortunately, there are already too many cars traveling down the road without input from the driver right now. At 55 miles per hour, during the four to five seconds that it takes to send or read a text message, your car is traveling the length of a football field without a driver in control. Multi-tasking is thought of as a useful skill, but it gets a lot of people into trouble behind the wheel. Most of us incorrectly assure ourselves that we can multi-task and use the cellphone while we drive. After all, we can walk and chew gum at the same time, right? When we stop and think about those activities — chewing gum and walking — we have to admit that walking is one of those things we do that requires very little brain power. In fact, it's subconscious and nearly automatic. Unlike walking and chewing gum, both driving and using a cell phone requires higher cognitive thinking. Your brain simply cannot perform two higher cognitive tasks at the same time. Instead, it must switch between tasks. With technology at our fingertips, drivers are constantly faced with distractions, such as talking or texting, which places their safety and that of others at serious risk

Although cell phone use is not the only distraction in the car, it is one of the most common and is a leading cause of distracted driving traffic crashes and fatalities. Text messaging is particularly dangerous. Research conducted by the Texas A&M Transportation Institute (TTI) found that reaction times double when drivers are distracted by text messaging. Driving requires the use of our visual, manual and cognitive abilities — texting takes away all three of these at one time. According to the Texas Department of Transportation (TxDOT), in 2015 driver distractions killed 463 people and seriously injured an additional 3,076 people on Texas roadways. In 2015 there were 103,576 traffic crashes related to distraction, which is an increase of 3 percent from 2014. Distracted driving-related crashes are highest among younger drivers ages 16 to 34.

April is National Distracted Driving Awareness Month, and TxDOT is launching the *Talk. Text. Crash.* campaign to raise awareness of the dangers associated with distracted driving and to encourage Texans to put down their cell phones while driving. With more than 100,000 traffic crashes in Texas each year involving distracted driving, TxDOT is reminding drivers that using a mobile phone when behind the wheel is a risky habit that they should break. In 2015, 38 percent of Texas drivers admitted to talking on their mobile phone while driving at least some of the time, according to a survey conducted by TTI, and more than 21 percent of drivers said they read or send text messages, and emails, when behind the wheel.

The Talk. Text. Crash. campaign aims to reduce distracted driving, not only for National Distracted Driving Awareness Month, but throughout the year. Texas A&M AgriLife Extension Service agent, Jill Killian, from Sherman County reminds drivers to put away their cell phones and wait until they arrive at their destination to use their phone. Although cell phone use is the most easily recognized distraction, all in-vehicle distractions are unsafe and can cause crashes or fatalities. Keep your eyes on the road and arrive alive!
