## City Council Race Draws 4 Candidates

An eleventh hour flurry of political excitement the last two days before the filing deadline last Saturday noon stirred interest here in the April 6th municipal election when two seats on the City Council will be filled. Virtually last-minute announcements by four candidates for the two seats assure Haskell's voters of choices at the polls. H. A. (Alvin) Sherman and E. J. Stewart, both Haskell businessmen and owners-operators of establishments here, filed for places on the ballot Friday and Saturday before noon, respectively. Their action followed that taken last Thursday when John Thomas, incumbent, and Virgil H. Wall, longtime pipeline company employe here, both offered themselves as candidates. Thomas is seeking a third consecutive term in office. Bob Sego, the other councilman whose term expires in April, did not file as a candidate for re-election. She was awarded a loving cup contributed by the Haskell Free Press. The Weinert School seventh grader edged a stubborn sixth grader competitor, Kay Newsom, 12, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Grady Newsom, of Rochester, in the 42nd round of words given by a distinctively enunciating pronouncer, Reverend Douglas Finch, in Haskell Elementary School Tuesday night. Bette went on to spell "aggravate" after Kay had faltered by placing an "i" in the middle. Then, to win the bee, Bette, according to the rules correctly negotiated "approbation" to win the title. This was the climax of the annual Haskell Jaycee sponsored spelling competition directed by Past Jaycee President Allen Rieves, chairman of this year's spellingdown. Haskell Jaycee President Jesse Priest, and a group of six members of the organization helped stage the annual event. The Weinert girl, by virtue of her win over the best speller in six other Haskell County schools, now advances to the district spellingdown on the campus of Midwestern University in Wichita Falls Saturday, April 3. In addition to the cup given by the Haskell Free Press, plaques contributed by the Jaycees, M&F Pharmacy, Western Auto Store, Harris Slaughter Service, and J. E. **Special Venire For Mullins Trial Set For Monday**

A special venire of 144 Haskell County citizens was in the process of being summoned by Sheriff Garth Garrett Tuesday for possible jury duty in the murder trial of J. W. (Johnny) Mullins, scheduled to start before Judge Ben Charlie Chapman in 39th District Court here at 9 a. m. next Monday, March 15. Mullins, 60-year-old retired farmer, of Haskell, was indicted January 5 in a three-count true bill returned by the grand jury here on a charge of "murder with malice aforethought" in the stabbing death last December of C. F. White, 55, a farm laborer here. White, who was slashed across the belt line in an altercation in the yard of his home on South Avenue F here about noon on December 12, 1964, died early Tuesday morning, December 22, of the knife wound, according to the report of an Abilene pathologist after an autopsy had been ordered. He was a member of a well known family of athletes here and was a member of the Haskell High School football team for several years. He operated a company franchise in Haskell and owned automobiles here in Haskell and before his retirement he had a car.

He was married to Iola Taylor October 1928, in Stamford, Texas. She survives. Other survivors include his wife; his mother, Mrs. R. W. Taylor, Bronkville, N. Y.; one daughter, Mrs. E. B. Carl, Sam Wallace, and Wallace, all of Fort Worth; one son, R. C. of Odessa; one half-brother, Jack of Haskell; and five grandchildren, Bob, Teresa, and Scott and Betsy.

**The Threat to Family Farming**

"Don't let them sell us out!", a farmer recently wrote to Texas' able Panhandle Congressman Walter Rogers.

Like many of our people, he senses a developing crisis in American agriculture. The crisis is developing because more and more non-farm Americans apparently are becoming convinced that the United States can get along very well without farmers. We are told that farmers as we have known them are not needed, that flesh-and-blood farmers, farmers with families and farmhouses and a mortgaged tractor, are inefficient, unproductive, a drain on the American taxpayer. We hear increasing talk that the solution to what these "experts" term the "farm mess" is to promote corporate farming. They say, in effect, that all of our farm problems could be solved if agricultural production were handled by corporate farms of vast acreage, their policies set by absentee boards of directors, their operations directed with cold and scientific efficiency by hired managers overseeing crews of specialists.

They prescribe the doom of rural America—not only of family farms and family farmers but also of the cities and towns which now serve primarily as the distribution and trade centers for the Nation's farming areas.

The exodus from the farms of America has been going on for a generation. In 1940, there were 6,250,000 farms in our country. Now there are 3,500,000 farms. In ten years, the number of agricultural workers employed and the number of farms in the U. S. have declined by almost a third, and the decline in farm numbers has been mostly in small farms. In the past decade, well over half of all rural counties experienced a net loss of population. We all have seen this trend in our own Central West Texas.


Should it continue at this pace, encouraged and accelerated by a combination of economic punishment and unwise government policy, the depopulation of rural America would be completed as would the corporate transfer of American agriculture, in the lifetimes of boys now busy in 4-H and FFA activities. Because, today, only one of every ten boys growing up on farms can expect to earn his living as a farmer.

The challenge is to preserve and develop economic opportunity in rural America. The challenge is to enable people who want to stay on the farm and in their home communities in rural America to make a decent living there. Farm programs enacted by the Congress have been designed to this end, in recognition of the fact that our free enterprise system is best exemplified by the family farm. Congress has NOT enacted farm programs as a handout, or as welfare programs. The purpose has been to assist that segment of our economy most vulnerable to the abuses of industrialized segments to attain and maintain fair levels of income. And yet, each passing election returns to the U. S. House of Representatives and U. S. Senate fewer and fewer members with any real comprehension of the meaning, worth, and problems faced by our farmers. The shift of population has shifted representation to the cities and suburbs and away from rural America. In the current 89th Congress, fewer than one-third of the membership of the House of Representatives speak for districts in which more than half the population is classed as "rural."

The farmers, and the folks who supply their goods in nearby cities and towns, are suffering a loss of voice in Congress and their State legislatures. Recent Supreme Court rulings on legislative apportionment hasten this trend. Therefore, fights in behalf of the farmer are becoming more and more difficult to win in Congress. The days of the famous Congressional "farm bloc" of the 1930's are dead and gone... and the Congress is now dominated by the "big city bloc" with little sympathy or understanding for our rural people.

Thomas Jefferson called farmers "the chosen people of God." Would that more Americans could see the farmers in that light, could appreciate the wonderful bounty in food they provide, could help preserve strength, stability and opportunity at the grassroots in this great land of ours.

# Prattle

Juvenile delinquency is a much discussed subject nowadays. But the real root of the problem is generally soft peddled.

Where does the blame lie for juvenile delinquency? It would seem that a major share of it can be charged to parents and schools. Both fail to teach and emphasize the importance of courtesy and the observance of the rights of others.

One simple rule of conduct, if impressed on the children by parents and on students each day by teachers, from the first grade in public schools to graduation in college, would help.

That rule would be: Keep your hands off other people and other people's property. Such a rule of action instilled into the young mind could save untold misery and heartaches for young and old alike.

Teaching this simple rule of action would be fulfilling an obligation which adults owe the young and would relieve the elders of serious delinquency on their part. And it wouldn't take a new law or more taxes to accomplish results.

I saw this sign at Letz Builders and Supply: "Never argue with a fool... people might not know the difference."

It pays to advertise: Recently Bob Dulaney ran an ad in the Free Press announcing that his grocery store would be closed each Sunday morning for church services. Two days later he received a letter through the mail addressed to "Reverend Bob Dulaney."

Since this scribe prefers inclement weather such as cloudy, rainy, sleet, snow, foggy,

with an occasional sandstorm thrown in... perhaps I should write to Ann Landers and find out what is wrong with me. On bright, sun-shiny days of Prattle is usually on the droopy, melancholy side... but come overcast, dark skies, I seem to perk up. Even on weekends when writing this column, reading, etc., I want the curtains and blinds drawn to keep out any sunlight. A good duster perks me up even more, so I am sure Ann Landers would find something wrong with me.

A recent Gallup Poll indicated that a majority of Americans favor medicare. But of great significance, the same poll found that a very large percentage just don't know what the scheme would and would not do. They believe that it is far more liberal and inclusive than is actually the case. To take one important example, 40 per cent think it would cover the fees of doctors, surgeons and dentists... which it would not.

The fact is, as many observers have pointed out, that the very term medicare is a misnomer. It suggests broad program for meeting all the health needs of those coming under it. Instead, it is essentially a hospital and nursing home program, and even in those areas, the benefits are strictly limited.

So, if medicare should become law, millions of people will be due for a grave disappointment. Along with that, the heavy cost—which in all probability would be larger than the estimates... would have to be paid by substantial boosts in the social security tax rates.

We might have to accept these dangers and disadvantages if medicare was the only way to deal with the medical problems of the aged. But there are other and better ways. What seems to be the best of these is a plan proposed by the American Medical Association.

It would expand the existing Kerr-Mills federal-state program and authorize people over 65 to buy private health insurance providing liberal hospital and medical benefits. Government would pay part or all of the premium of policyholders who could not afford the cost. If a policyholder's income was below a certain level, established by the state, he would pay nothing at all. A simple statement of income, filed with a state agency, would be all that was needed to qualify. This plan is based on actual

need, as any sound plan must be. It would not open the door to socialized, or politically dominated medicine, as many fear medicare would. It meets the problem... without creating new and serious problems in the process.

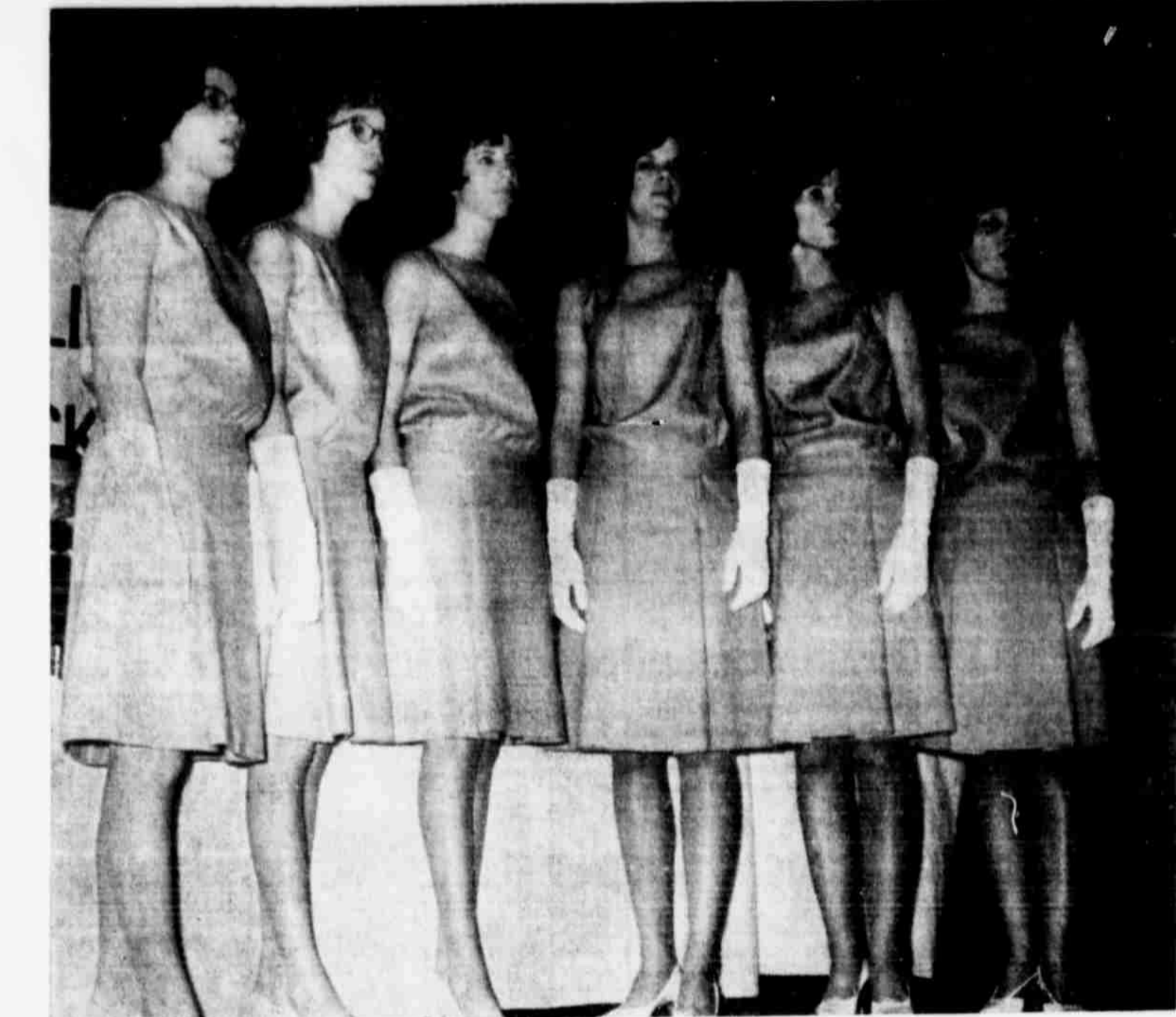
