WASHINGTON (AP) -Romanian gymnast Nadia Comaneci, who fled her homeland for Hungary earlier this week, traveled to the United States today after being granted political asylum, U.S. officials said.

Justice Department spokesman David Runkel said Comaneci, a former Olympic star, had been granted refugee status and was "in the air on her way to this country.

U.S. officials, who asked not to be identified, said Comaneci, who complained of repression in her homeland, was granted refugee status by U.S. consular officers in Europe.

CRMWD schedules December 7 meeting

BIG SPRING-Financing of a \$6,000,000, and work is due to \$28,000-ac. ft. water quality commence in the spring of 1990. reservoir designed to upgrade surface water quality will be decided by directors of the Colorado River Municipal Water District at their meeting Dec. 7.

The proposed lake will be built in western Mitchell County to hold excess poor-quality water diverted from the Colorado River and tributaries above Lake E. V. Spence. Two existing sidestorage reservoirs have proven inadequate to handle the volume of poor-quality low-flow of the river and tributaries. This, plus unprecedented spillage from a since-enlarged natural dam lake west of Big Spring, compounded the quality problem at Lake Spence.

Plans are being completed by Freese and Nichols in Fort Worth for the new reservoir which will be located on an existing pipeline system capable of transfers from one reservoir to another. The project is estimated to cover over

Directors also will consider a resolution revamping recreational regulations at Lake J. B. Thomas and Spence, and the upcoming lake at the Stacy site. Also on the agenda are naming of an additional member of the legal staff, selecting an auditor for the annual check of the district's books, and authorizing year-end inter-fund transfers.

Action is due on authorizing five annual payments of \$47,219 to take care of water royalty under-payments from May 1979-89, and an additional \$23,150 to the U.S. Geological Survey for two more rain gauges above the Stacy reservoir site and \$10,000 toward a continuing water quality study.

Resolutions are expected to bring the Employees Pension Trust documents in compliance with latest federal regulations, and for continuation of the self-

insured health insurance plan.

DEAR ABBY: Last year you solicited contributions for the Korean War Veterans Memorial. Your readers responded with a total of more than \$350,000. You are to be congratulated.

Abby, the Korean War has a very special meaning to me because I am a Korean man who fought in that war. I was a young medical student when the united forces liberated my small town in North Korea in 1950. quit medical school to join the Korean army. (We North Korean refugees were forced to fight for South Korea on the front line.) Miraculously, I was one of only 26 survivors from the refugee forces.

When I left my home in North Korea, I promised my mother that I would return in three days. Little did I dream that 33 years would pass before I could return to my home-

After the war ended, I found myself on the streets of Seoul, broke, with little hope of fulfilling my dream of returning to North Korea and becoming a doctor. Then fate intervened when a former professor, whom I accidentally met on the street, offered me a job and the opportunity to apply to a local medical school in Seoul!

If the old saying "Adversity builds character" holds true, I am a prime example, because I not only graduated from medical school magna cum laude, I was offered an internship at Barnes Hospital in St. Louis, Mo. half a world away, in the United States of America!

Today, I am a well-established physician and have authored several textbooks on cardiology, which is my specialty. I have a thriving office practice and am enjoying a splendid home life with my wife and our two sons in Long Beach, Calif.

I salute all American servicemen and women who participated in the Korean War, which gave freedom to hundreds of thousands of refugees like myself. That war was not forgotten — those of us who fought in it will never forget it.

FBI agents from Dallas arrested Veleff Wednesday near Fort Worth after he had driven to Texas with an undercover FBI agent, who he thought was going to help him, the FBI said.

The arrest came after Veleff had taken pictures of City Place, a 33-story office complex built by the Bass family where Robert Bass, 41, has his office.

Andre said Veleff had never met Bass and had no connection with him. He had made Bass the target of the kidnapping plot after reading about him in a business magazine, Andre said.

"He was trying to pick someone that had a lot of money, it appears," Andre said.

Andre said the Bass family was told of the investigation. He said the Bass' private security team said. led by a former U.S. Secret Service agent cooperated with authorities in the investigation.

A woman who works at City Place who asked not to be identified said security seemed to be tighter this week.

'They've (security guards) been driving around, parking, using their binoculars, a lot of increased surveillance," she said.

Investigators searched Veleff's residence Thursday and seized two rifles, a pistol and a stun gun, which Veleff allegedly intended to use on Bass if he resisted during the abduction, officials said.

FBI Special Agent William Fallin in Memphis said Veleff had purchased some night vision goggles and a device that would detect another tracking device or electronic surveillance equip-

Although federal authorities had been aware of the plot only since May, Andre said Veleff told the undercover agent he had been planning the abduction for seven years.

Dee Kelly, a lawyer for the Bass family, declined comment, but a source close to the family referred to Veleff as "a crank" who did not have a chance of succeeding in the alleged plot.

Veleff, an advertising salesman for the Memphis Commercial Appeal newspaper for about 20 years, had operated a swimming pool business for more information.

years and a fine of up to \$250,000. FBI agents said an informant told them about the plot after being asked to help in it. The informant introduced the undercover agent to Veleff on Nov. 16.

Andre said that in addition to \$5 million ransom, Veleff had talked about filming Bass "in distressing situations" and asking for an additional \$20 million.

The plot called for the \$5 million to be flown toward Fort Stockton from the Dallas-Fort Worth area. Then, the pilot would be informed to drop the money on a specific mountain about 45 miles south of border, Andre

DEAR DR. GOTT: My husband was diagnosed as diabetic five years ago. He's been able to control this through diet. Now he's experiencing substantial pain in his hands, arms, legs and feet; yet his doctor doesn't want to perform surgery at this stage. A neurologist wants to cut all the nerves in his legs to alleviate the pain. To further complicate things, at 46 he's become impotent, and its caused major problems in our marriage. What's your advice?

DEAR READER: One of the major complications of diabetes is neuropathy, the malfunction of various nerves in the body. This can lead to weakness, numbness and tingling of arms and legs. Neuropathy is believed due to poor blood supply to the nerves, resulting from the premature arteriosclerotic blockage that is common in diabetics. Impotence and constipation are additional consequences of this metabolic abnormality

Your husband should be under the care of a diabetes specialist who will be able to offer advice about how to cope with this problem. For example, certain medicines - such as Dilantin, anti-depressants and carbamazepine may help to improve nerve func-

tion and alleviate symptoms of

Although an operation to sever the nerves (sympathectomy) may be necessary in advanced cases marked by intractable pain, I believe this treatment should be a last recourse, to be

used only when other, less drastic medical therapies have failed. Despite the advanced stage of your husband's diabetes, there is much he can do to help the situation. A diabetologist is his best resource.

DEAR DR. GOTT: My fiance and I are excited about purchasing a wonderful piece of property - wonderful except for the fact that due east, across the wide Intercoastal Waterway, sits the St. Lucie Nuclear Power Plant. What are the effects caused by residing near a nuclear plant? Is there a higher rate of birth defects and is gardening safe? Your help would be appreciated.

DEAR READER: As far as I know, properly operated and maintained nuclear power plants represent no hazard to people living in close proximity to these installations. Specifically, gardening is safe, and there is no proved increase in birth defects.

As most people know, potential danger does exist if the power plants experience problems with their reactors, leading to leakage of radioactive material into the environment. Although this is a theoretical threat, it could be a real danger, as most Amercans know from reading about the difficulties caused by faulty powerplant management in other parts of



Thwarting the defense

The defense did a good job, but they could have been put to a difficult test. West led the queen of hearts, taken by the ace in dummy. South led dummy's jack of spades, finessing, and West won the king. West now led the heart three to East's king. East might have tried to cash another heart, but that would only be three tricks for the defense. So East led the diamond three. Declarer could do no better than rise with the king. West won the ace. Be cause West knew that East would not have led a low diamond at this particular point without an honor, he was safe in leading the jack of diamonds. That was four tricks, setting the contract.


This was precise work for the defenders, but what would have happened if declarer had refused to win the heart ace at the first trick? Of course East can overtake with the king and lead back a diamond for two tricks, and later West will take the setting trick with the spade king. But would he? It's a little unnatural to make a play that will give declarer a finessing position with dummy's A-10 of hearts over West's remaining jack. If declarer does duck the heart ace at trick one, he can win the second heart. When declarer loses the spade finesse, West will not be able to get East on lead to come through the king of diamonds, and later the fourth club will provide a parking place for declarer's potential losing diamond.

Philippines' president MANILA, Philippines (AP) — U.S. warplanes today joined the strongest bid yet to topple her. President Bush authorized military assistance to back Mrs. Aquino's government after rebels also seized two air bases. including the air force headquarters, and were moving artillery and armor into the capital.

The mutinous soldiers, also seized two television stations. By sundown, military chief of staff Gen. Renato de Villa declared the coup attempt had failed and that loyal troops had recaptured one of the bases seiz-

ed by the rebels. He said 30 rebel officers and 300 enlisted men had been captured:

But sporadic fighting continued, and the mutineers were still in control of the government television station and parts of Villamor air base, the air force headquarters. Rebels were transporting large amounts of ammunition to Villamor from nearby Fort Bonifacio.

The extent of U.S. involvement was fighter jets flying over the rebel-held Sangley and Villamor air bases near Manila, a U.S. official in Washington said. "Even now, U.S. fighters are joining the fight to give air cover to our ground troops," Mrs. Aquino said. "Once more, two Pacific democracies stand shoulder-toshoulder in the defense of freedom.

"The fight is joined in earnest," she said. "The outcome is assured."

"They fly up high and watch for any hostile airplanes and if necessary, engage (fire) if they pose a threat to Philippine forces," Oborn said in Washington. He reported no fire

At sunset three U.S. military helicopters landed at the seaside U.S. Embassy compound. Later, more than 20 armed American troops in full battledress could be seen milling around the compound.

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Hepatitis B more common among blacks

ATLANTA (AP) - Hepatitis B, suspected for years to be more common among blacks than whites, strikes blacks at a rate four times higher than whites, according to a new statistical analysis from health researchers.

In the first nationwide scientific survey for hepatitis B infection, covering more than 14,000 people over five years, 4.8 percent showed signs in blood tests of having been infected with hepatitis B virus some time during their lives.

Among blacks, 13.7 percent tested positive, compared to 3.2 percent of whites, the national Centers for Disease Control reported Thursday.

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


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
