Councilman Reece Bowen, 67, was found dead of a bullet wound to the head in a bedroom of his home at about 3:30 p.m. Christmas Day.

His wife, Lottie Belle, 69, was found next to him, also with a gunshot wound to the head. She died Tuesday.

"If they surrender voluntarily, with their weapons, they will be tried and the death penalty will not be applied," said a communique read on Bucharest radio Wednesday.





Women are not recognized as truly equal individuals

dian women have constitutional guarantees of equality, but they are often trapped as second-class citizens because of laws rooted in their religions.

'We are so steeped in patriarchal culture that the role of a woman as an individual is not recognized," says Amarendra Sharan, an attorney who presents cases before the Supreme Court. "She is always somebody's daughter, wife or mother.

Article 14 of the Indian Constitution guarantees equal rights for all citizens, regardless of sex or creed

But Article 25 guarantees freedom of religion, and this means everyone is subject to the personal law of the community into which he or she is born.

Hindus are governed by Hindu law, Moslems by the Shariat laws of the Koran, and Christians by their own laws.

'Personal laws, dating from mythology and religious scrip- constitution said granting women tures, are based on inequality Elisabeth, an activist with a women's resource center called Saheli, or friend. In keeping with the center's policy, she declined to disclose her surname.

NEW DELHI, India (AP) - In- women the right to inherit property, she says.

Rukmani, a lawyer with Saheli, lists several anomalies in personal laws:

- A Hindu woman cannot head a household or inherit ancestral property. She can inherit her father's or her husband's personal property only if it is in a will.

- A Moslem man may have up to four wives at once, divorce at will and not be forced to pay alimony. A Moslem woman cannot initiate divorce in India, and she is entitled to only half the amount of property her brother can inherit.

Christian women can only divorce spouses who commit incest. They do not have equal inheritance rights.

There is no uniform civil code, although the criminal code is common to all Indians. Nandita Haksar, a lawyer and women's rights activist, says this is because the framers of the 1949 equal rights within the family terfere with r

head of the Center for Women's **Development Studies. "But when** a woman is murdered by her husband and in-laws for money or dowry, that is treated as a special category, a dowry death."

Yet a dowry is illegal. The Dowry Prohibition Act of 1961 makes the giving and taking of dowry an offense punishable by fines, imprisonment and confiscation of property. The law is widely ignored.

P. Chidambaram, minister of state for home affairs, recently told Parliament that dowry deaths were increasing. At least ,572 women were killed in 1987 for not bringing in enough dowry, compared with 1,323 in 1986.

Last year in New Delhi, police received 3,700 dowry-related complaints ranging from harassment to murder, but records show they investigated only 358. The number of trials and convictions was so small that police did not record them.

BIRMINGHAM, Ala. (AP) - Clarkston Hines, 20th-ranked Duke's "Frequent Flyer," holds the NCAA record for career touchdowns, 38, has three 1,000-yard receiving seasons and is sixth in career yardage with 3,318.

So, how will No. 24 Texas Tech handle the All-American receiver in tonight's 13th All American Bowl?

'Our defense bends but doesn't break," said Tech linebacker Charles Rowe.

"We'll give Hines a few catches here and there but we don't want him to break a long one," he said. "We don't believe anybody can drive the ball down our throat. That's the way we've played all year and that's the way we're going to play Duke.'

Coach Spike Dykes of Tech (8-3, as is Duke) said he knows how to defend against Hines: "Just hope. He's a great player."

Hines said he is glad to be playing for Steve Spurrier, an offensiveminded coach whose passing won him the Heisman Trophy at Florida in 1966.

'His passing offense is the dream of any wide receiver,'' Hines said. "He employs an explosive attack, and if used properly, it's almost unstoppable."

Hines has played with two quarterbacks this season, Billy Ray and Dave Brown while Ray was hurt, and said he has no preference.

Neither does Spurrier, who plans to start Ray and then insert Brown in the second period and "see how it goes."

Dykes said that facing a good passing attack will be nothing new for his team, which gave up 475 yards to Houston's Heisman winner, Andre Ware. "We've seen a few passes," Dykes said.

Tech, though not immune to passing itself, relies largely on the running of James Gray, fifth-leading runner in the nation this year with 1,509 yards.

"He's scored more points than anyone ever in the Southwest Conference," Dykes said, "and some pretty good players have come out of our conference."

Gray, the coach said, "fakes hard, runs hard and blocks hard. A lot of the things we do depend on him.'

Duke linebacker John Howell said Gray "has very strong legs. He is quick on his moves and a great cutback runner. It will be a defensive showdown for Duke."

The All American Bowl is Duke's first posteason game in 29 years. "It will be good to let the nation know we've got a football school as well as a basketball school," Brown said.

A spokesman for the secretary of state repeated allegations Wednesday that Rodgers met directly with Ware, a junior, and offered \$20 million if Ware would sign a professional contract.

CLUTE, Texas (AP) - A day after being beaten in the head with a baseball bat, a 23-year-old Clute man whose 2-year-old daughter was kidnapped was improving, his mother said.

Tommy Creekmore, who was being treated in the neuro intensive care unit of Methodist Hospital in Houston, was faring better late Wednesday, said his mother, Dorothy Creekmore, also of Clute. Doctors have said he will remain hospitalized at least another week, she said ...

"He's improving," she said from the hospital. "The doctors seem to feel like he's doing very good."

Although her son does not remember the attack and has times when he doesn't recognize family members, Mrs. Creekmore said doctors told her that could be due to swelling of the brain.

"Sometimes when we ask him question he understands, and sometimes he doesn't." she said. "But they say that's because of the swelling.

Seventeen-year-old Randale Lynn Martin of Paris is accused of kidnapping Creekmore's daughter and beating him with a bat. Martin remained jailed in Clute Wednesday on an aggravated kidnapping charge, authorities said, with bond set at \$100,000.

Death row inmate claims her death would aid lawyer

ATHENS, Texas (AP) — Betty has not been able to gain access Lou Beets, condemned to death to Andrews' files. for the murder of her fifth husband, has filed a motion to have holds the movie and book rights to her story, release his files on her case.

Ms. Beets, 53, also filed a motion requesting a 30-day extension to file affidavits in connection with her writ of habeas corpus

The motion, filed Dec. 21 in Austin, was received in Henderson County District Attorney Billy M. Bandy's office Wednesday, officials said.

The Henderson County grandmother and former barmaid was convicted Oct. 11, 1985, of murdering Jimmy Don Beets, 46, her fifth husband, whose body was recovered from beneath a fake wishing well next to her mobile home near Cedar Creek Lake.

Her execution date, originally set for Nov. 8, was postponed by State District Judge Jack H. Holland. The postponement, granted in early November, was to allow Ms. Beets' current attorney, Eden Harrington of the **Texas Resource Center**, to gather information for a writ of habeas corpus.

However, Ms. Harrington said she has not had enough time to collect information she needs and

Ms. Harrington wrote in the motion, "Current counsel has her former attorney, who also repeatedly asked Mr. Andrews, who was lead counsel, to release his trial file in this case, both orally and in writing. Mr. An-Ms. Beets told the Tyler drews has not returned counsel's numerous telephone calls and has never delivered the file.

> Mr. Andrews' performance without examining his file, which should detail what he knew, and when he knew it."

> Andrews was not available for comment Wednesday.

The defense counsel has until Jan. 15 to prepare the writ of habeas corpus, unless Holland grants the 30-day extension, officials said.

Andrews also represented Ms. Beets daughter, Shirley Stegner, who was arrested and charged with murder along with her mother.

The arrests came after the bodies of Beets, a Dallas Fire Department captain, and Doyle Wayne Barker, Ms. Beets' fourth husband, were unearthed at Ms. Beets' mobile home.

At her mother's trial, Mrs. Stegner testified she helped her mother bury Barker's body. Ms. Beets' son, Robert Branson, testified he helped his mother bury Beets' body.

Ms. Harrington wrote in the motion that Andrews' arrangement of simultaneous representation of the mother and daughter was an "obvious complication."

Ms. Beets contends Branson killed Beets during an argument.

CONROE, Texas (AP) -Neither the facts nor the law support an appellate court's decision that Clarence Lee Brandley was denied a fair trial in the 1980 rape-strangulation of a teenager, the Montgomery County district attorney says.

In a motion filed Wednesday with the Texas Court of Criminal Appeals, District Attorney Peter Speers asked the court to reverse the 6-3 ruling that overturned the former Conroe High School janitor's conviction and death penalty.



"Peter Speers apparently has a personal desire to see Clarence executed and apparently will go to any length," Nugent said. Retired state District Judge

Perry Pickett of Midland, who reexamined the Brandley case for the Court of Criminal Appeals, concluded after an evidentiary hearing in October 1987 that Brandley's conviction by an allwhite jury was racially motivated. Brandley is black. Ms. Fergeson was white.

The Court of Criminal Appeals seldom reverses its decisions, 'but it does happen," said Speers, who has not ruled out the possibility of appealing to the U.S. Supreme Court if his motion is denied.


And another thing: Could we all lighten up on phrases such as "adopt a whale," or "adopt a zoo animal"?


